Ayers, Commissioner of Precinct No. 3; and John Stork, Commissioner of Precinct No. 4; and there came on to be considered the matter of changing the election precincts in said county; and it appearing that there is a desire and request before the Court from the electors of voting precinct No. 7, and the electors of voting precinct No. 14, that said voting precincts be abolished and that they be combined with voting precincts in the City of Dimmitt, Castro County, Texas; and said requests having been duly considered, and it being the purpose and duty of the Court to make election places available for the various persons in the county, it was decided to grant said requests. It was moved by Andy Thompson and seconded by T. R. Davis that voting precinct No. 7, heretofore known as Cleo election precinct, be abolished and that the territory heretofore constituting said election precinct be combined with election precinct No. 1, being heretofore known as Southeast Dimmitt No. 1.  Election precincts Nos. 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13 shall remain as heretofore defined and numbered;
 Frio election precinct No. 15 shall be known as Frio election precinct No. 14; and
 Bethel election precinct No. 16 shall hereafter be known as Bethel election precinct No. 15.
