Oil Trials Set For October 2

AUSTIN, June 6.—Trial of the \$17,850,000 anti-trust penalty and ouster suits against major oil companies today was set for Oct. 2 by Judge J. D. Moore in district court here. The trial is expected to extend over three or four months. Fifteen major oil companies, the American Petroleum Institute and the Texas Petroleum Marketers association are accused of acting in restraint of trade in violation of Texas laws.

Veterans Schedule Hiked by President

WASHINGTON, June 6.—An executive order for a new and higher compensation level for service connected pensioners growing out of the World War and Spanish-American war was signed today by President Roosevelt. The levels are considerably higher than those proposed in the original regulations drafted to reduce veterans' compensation by a total of \$400,000,000 under the Roosevelt economy plan.

Road Commission Member Named

AUSTIN, June 6.—John Wood of Timpanua was today appointed as a member of the state highway commission by Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson. As the legislature is not in session the appointment will not need the approval of the senate.

LOS ANGELES, June 6.—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt was scheduled to complete the first transcontinental airplane trip ever made by a president's wife when she arrives here tonight.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla.—An oil field accident that caused the loss of one eye furnished Wiley Post, round-the-world flier, with the money to buy his first plane. The oil company for which he was working paid him \$2,000.

Illinois Joins In "Wet Parade"

CHICAGO, June 6.—Illinois, favoring approximately 3 1/2 to 1 in favor of a state of 50 delegates, pledged to repeal federal prohibition, joined with eight other states today to ratify repeal of the 18th amendment on the basis of returns from approximately 9 of the state precincts. Returns from 6,416 precincts out of a total of 7,248 precincts gave: For repeal, 1,110,553, against repeal, 250,891. SALARY CUT SAVED \$221,645

NEW YORK, June 6.—Charles E. Mitchell was practically broke in November, 1931, he declared today in continuing his defense against charges of income tax evasion. Mitchell concluded his direct testimony with a broad, general and vehement denial he had ever committed an unrighteous action to avoid payment of his income taxes.

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Reported Snub Is Denied By The Fergusons

AUSTIN, June 6.—Reports that the first lady of the land had snubbed the first lady of Texas at a Dallas airport yesterday were described as an "exaggerated lie" by former Gov. James E. Ferguson today. Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson said Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, whom she welcomed to Texas yesterday, was "very charming," their meeting very pleasant.

Most Rev. Gerken Made Archbishop of Santa Fe, N. M.

The Most Reverend R. A. Gerken, former head of St. Rita's church in Ranger and more recently bishop of the Amarillo diocese and president of the Price Memorial college of Amarillo, has been elected archbishop of Santa Fe, N. M., according to news dispatches from Washington. Ordained in 1917, Most Rev. Gerken was made pastor of the Abilene, Texas, parish a short time following. In 1929 he became head of the Ranger church, remaining here until April, 1927, when he was consecrated bishop of the newly created Amarillo diocese, where he founded the Price Memorial college in 1928. He has been head of the college since that time.

Three Are Victims Of Heat Wave

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 6.—A third successive day of blistering heat in the southwest brought reports of three deaths and a number of prostrations today. The life toll was added to excessive crop damage and widespread suffering. The deaths were those of Robert Conklin, 14, who drowned near Wichita, Kan., another boy who drowned near Omaha, Neb., and an elderly negro found dead at Omaha.

Japanese Approve Recent Peace Move

TOKIO, May 6.—President Roosevelt's recent appeal for world-wide peace encounters a "heartly response" from the Japanese government, the cabinet notified Washington tonight.

COMMITTEE TO ASK POWER TO WIDEN PROBE

WASHINGTON, June 6.—The senate banking and currency committee decided today to seek broader powers so that the investigation of J. P. Morgan & Co. may include evidence connecting sales of securities with payments of income taxes. The inquiry was resumed at 12:10 p. m., after the committee had discussed procedure in an executive session.

Four Are Freed of Kidnap Charge

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 6.—Two Oklahoma couples, arrested at Amarillo, in connection with the abduction of Miss Mary McElroy, daughter of the city manager of Kansas City, for \$30,000 ransom, were freed today. Mr. and Mrs. L. R. Gilbert were given car fare back to their farm home near Fargo, Okla., and Mr. and Mrs. Windell Johnson furnished transportation to Oklahoma City.

Drys of Senatorial District to Meet

DALLAS, June 6.—Plans have just been completed for two regional conferences on organization work for the dry forces in the 24th senatorial district, one to be held at Breckenridge on June 12 and one at Abilene on June 13. The mornings will be given over to a discussion of methods of organization, methods of campaigning, material to be used, and where to find it, under the direction of Dr. Atticus Webb. The afternoons will be given to organization work under the direction of the district chairman, Judge Otis Miller, and the vice chairman, Hon. Jesse R. Smith of Breckenridge, Hon. Thos. E. Hayden of Abilene, Hon. Warren Dodson of Snyder, and Judge John Lee Smith of Ehrckmorton.

HARDEST PART OF HIS TRIP LIES AHEAD

Matters halted here, however, while Post and Gatty did not. The Texas flier made the 1300 mile trip from Moscow in 9 hours and 15 minutes, compared with 8 hours and 5 minutes by Post and Gatty when they passed this point. When Mattern arrived, his elapsed time from New York was 70 hours and 14 minutes, compared with 74 hours and 9 minutes for Post and Gatty to this point. **COSTIGAN OF COLORADO CALLS FOR A SHOWDOWN**

Sen. Costigan is a Colorado democrat. He was high in the councils of Woodrow Wilson. The senate adopted a resolution introduced by the Colorado liberal calling on various government agencies for report showing the salaries of officers and directors of banks, public utility corporations and other corporations having capital or assets of more than a million dollars in value whose securities are listed on the New York stock or curb exchanges. As introduced by Costigan and adopted by the senate the resolution requested the federal reserve board, reconstruction corporation, federal power commission, and federal trade commission, to furnish the information.

Chairman Fletcher has stated that the president wants all the Morgan facts, that he approves the investigation and desires that it "go through to the limit." For all the latest developments in your local paper.

This gospel of the New Deal calls for straight facts and figures, the rehabilitation of all industries and the return of purchasing power of farmers and wage workers as well as the white collar contingent of the American social order. Ferdinand Pecora is directing the big American show under the dome at Washington. President Roosevelt and his advisers are pulling the wires for the two international shows—the first to take place in the city of London and the second at Geneva, where the so-called master minds of nations civilized or half civilized are going to foregather to dislodge Mars from his throne and Mammon from his lofty perch as the golden guide of the universe. Gigantic jobs, to say the least.

**MAIL SUBSIDY POWER GIVEN THE PRESIDENT**

President Roosevelt is to be a busy man during the dog day period of the year. In a double blow at federal aid and ocean mail subsidies, the senate voted to give him discretionary powers to annul existing mail contracts and to fix the salary limitation on companies holding such contracts. It authorizes the cancellation of any mail contract if the holder paid individual salaries to officers exceeding \$17,500 dollars.

Price fixing of wages must be on the way. Senator Hugo Black of Louisiana who led the successful fight cited many instances in which mail carrying contractors "received enormous grants from the government and at the same time paid exorbitant salaries." It is getting so when a gentleman thinks he has a good thing he hits a banana peel and it is all off.

**HOUSES FOR THE OWNERS OF SMALL INCOMES**

Place it in the record of the legislature that it approved a bill for the organization of corporations to build houses for rental to persons of small income; that corporations formed for this purpose would be permitted to borrow from the federal government. Is there a pressing need for the corporations proposed?
