AS TAX MIGHT FAIL TO PAY COUNTY BONDS

County Judge C. E. Garrett, County Auditor W. S. Michael and Commissioner A. N. Sneathy returned Friday from Austin where they went to confer with the State Board in charge of county and district road indebtedness. Judge Garrett stated that, in any way, their conference was an appointment, not from an inquiry on their part to convince the board of the county needs but of the financial inability of the county to meet their indebtedness.

Under the law which provided that tax on gasoline the state was permitted to assume payment of the county road bonds the proceeds of which had been applied to the state highway fund. In keeping with the provisions of this law the state authorities had agreed to assume the payment of 65.69 per cent of the unpaid and outstanding bonds the proceeds of which had been expended on the state highway fund. However, excepting, however, about \$140,000 dollars of bonds that had been repaid in 1932 and in 1933.

Judge Garrett said that they had hoped to get the state to assume the payment of this \$140,000. However, he received information that the state does not permit the state to assume the payment of bonds that have been repaid unless the counties have provided a fund sufficient to care for them at maturity. He further stated that the amount which the state should pay out of the receipts of the gas tax is about \$1,000,000, but that the amount actually paid is altogether contingent upon the amount of money received from the tax.

It is Judge Garrett's opinion that the gas tax receipts are not increasing over the state of 1933, the state will not pay more than 33-1/3 per cent of the amount assumed. In which event, under the law, the county will be compelled to pay the remaining part of all matured bonds or else be excluded from participation in the gas tax receipts in the future. The judge said he has based his assumption on what the state did for 1932, the amount paid for that year was two-thirds of the amount the state had assumed.

The commissioners court will probably take this matter up for serious consideration during the next few days. According to Judge Garrett a report is expected from the state before the August session of the commissioners court at which time the county tax rates will be fixed, thereby furnishing information from which the rates will be determined.

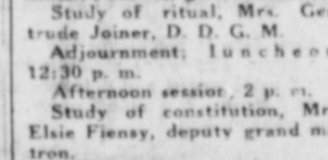

GUN BATTLE ENSUES WHEN ARRESTS MADE

One Boasts He Will Never Go Back To Kansas, So Jail Is Guarded.

Two escaped Kansas convicts were in jail here today after a gun battle with customs officers who captured the fugitives and two women, all heavily armed, near here.

Billie Woods and Clifford Dapson, convicts who escaped from the Kansas state penitentiary at Lansing during a Decoration Day ball game, were recognized by officers J. A. Tilley and W. E. Kilborn, when the sedan in which the fugitives were riding was stopped.

Sheriff J. C. Graham quoted Woods as saying he was under sentence of at least 40 years for various crimes which Dapson admitted having been sentenced to 15 years.

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GOV. BRYAN SENDS PATRIARCH TO THE SENATE

Governor Charles W. Bryan of Nebraska is a very shrewd practical politician. He is the brother of the lamented "Prince of Peace," Robert B. Howell, a republican senator, died.

After long meditation and no doubt pious praying Governor Bryan named a democrat to fill the vacancy. His choice is William H. Thompson, a former member of the supreme court of Nebraska. Thompson represents an almost forgotten period of history. He is nearing his 80th milestone. He is on his way to Washington to qualify. Then he will enjoy the distinction of the newest member in point of service and the oldest member in point of age.

Sen. Carter Glass of Virginia is 75. He is very brilliant, very aggressive, very conservative, and his recent performances demonstrate that he not only looks his age but is beginning to feel or show his age. He had a splendid record of service. He is unaware that a third revolution won at the ballot box last year.

A wise man, regardless of age, has golden memories of the past but lives and moves with procession of today. This is a new age. This is a new civilization.

Unless the signs are misleading the passing throng, the New Deal gospel is going to dominate the American, and perhaps the foreign, worlds.

WHAT HAPPENED TO MR. KYLE

Rep. Henry Kyle is a dashing young solon from Hays county territory. By a vote of 10 to 13 the senate killed his house bill requiring the state highway commission to obtain permission of the county commissioners court in re-routing highways before a highway can be moved away from a town of 350 population or over.

Now it is said that construction on Highway No. 2 is now in progress in Travis, Comal and Bexar counties, but the winding road across railroads is untouched in Hays county. Furthermore, that the highway commission's new plan reduces the distance between Austin and San Antonio as well as eliminates nearly all of the 13 main line grade crossings.

Really, the military road, as No. 2 is historically known, is one of the greatest routes of traffic and travel in the southwest. Rep. Kyle, a very youthful member, made a very aggressive and intelligent fight—and lost.

In political life, it is well "to take it on the nose and then come again" in the primary contests that are fought at the ballot box by the qualified voters of a commonwealth.

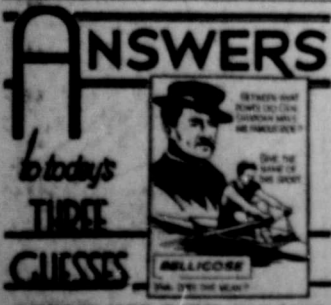
TOM CONNALLY AND THE INCOME TAX

Sen. Tom Connally of Texas has evolved a new tax plan under which income tax payers would be assessed a flat 10 per cent more than they now pay. All this as a means of financing the public works section of the industrial control bill. This plan would retain the same rates as are now in effect. Under the 10 per cent provision of the Connally proposal the person receiving the larger income would pay more wages, "where under the present plan approved by the house the man of small incomes would have his tax increased 50 per cent." The Texan will endeavor to obtain acceptance of his plan instead of the 2 per cent boost in the rate which was given approval by the house and the demo leaders.

He shied away from the sales tax proposal. He declared it was put forth merely as an excuse to escape income taxes. This is his interpretation of the plan he sponsored: "If a man pays \$30 income tax he would pay \$3 more or \$33; but if he paid \$10,000 now he would pay \$1000 more or \$11,000. He predicted that it would yield as much if not more than the house proposal."

That's what fashion says, or words to that effect. Which proves fashion does not originate in the Lone Star state. More politics...

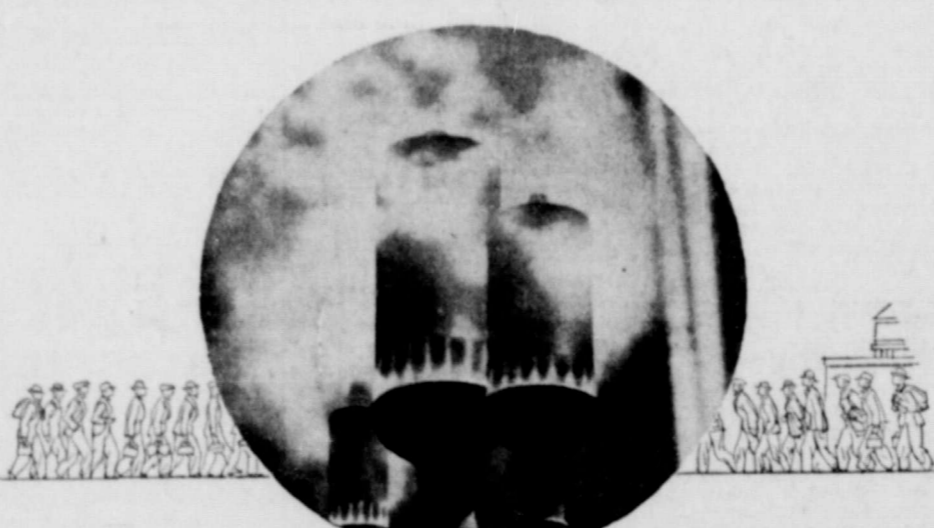

Things to Eat for the Things You Do During Leafy Month of June

June's a big month on anybody's calendar! Whether you mark your almanac in red on account of that certain wedding, summer picnics, the longest day of the year (21st), that well planned vacation, or whether you just let the page of days speak for itself. All manner of new things to eat are in season this month—from A for asparagus to the Z for zucchini (that's Italian squash if you didn't know).

Red letter days make things easier for the cook, so consider these seasonal suggestions.

Strawberries Are Ripe Strawberries, one of summer's favored berries, have you tried a strawberry cocktail? After the thrill of shortcake has worn away mix one pint of strawberries, two tablespoonsful sugar, one-third cup of orange juice, salt according to taste, one-fourth cup of grapefruit juice, one-third tablespoon lemon juice.

Let the washed and hulled strawberries stand for an hour with the sugar. Then add other ingredients: Mix. Season with cheese-cloth. Garnish with mint and serve cold with cheese wafers.

The asparagus in bunches to boil; you can lift it out without breaking. If possible, cook it standing up (the asparagus, not yourself). If you have leftover buttered or creamed asparagus tips just wash off the butter or dressing with warm water and serve as a salad combined with mayonnaise and pimientos. Some cooks like scalloped asparagus, baked in a cream sauce with curled flake crackers on top.






