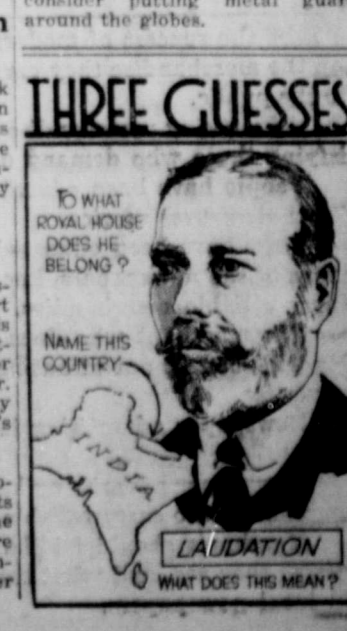

SECY. PERKINS SOUNDS A CHEERFUL NOTE
 Secy. of Labor Frances Perkins has let it be known that an increase of 4.8 per cent in manufacturing employment and 11.5 per cent in payrolls during May has aided in a nation-wide business upturn. Indeed, she says the gains in employment and payrolls reported the largest rise over preceding months since January, 1923. Reports came from 17,823 establishments in 89 manufacturing industries and employment increases were shown in 79. Speaking of the industrial regulation public works measure designed to accelerate the business upturn, Col. Hugh S. Johnson hopes his organization will be driving without delay toward early trade agreements within industry to bring higher wages and heavy disbursements through the public works section to give employment to a million workers now idle and to increase the purchasing power of the nation.

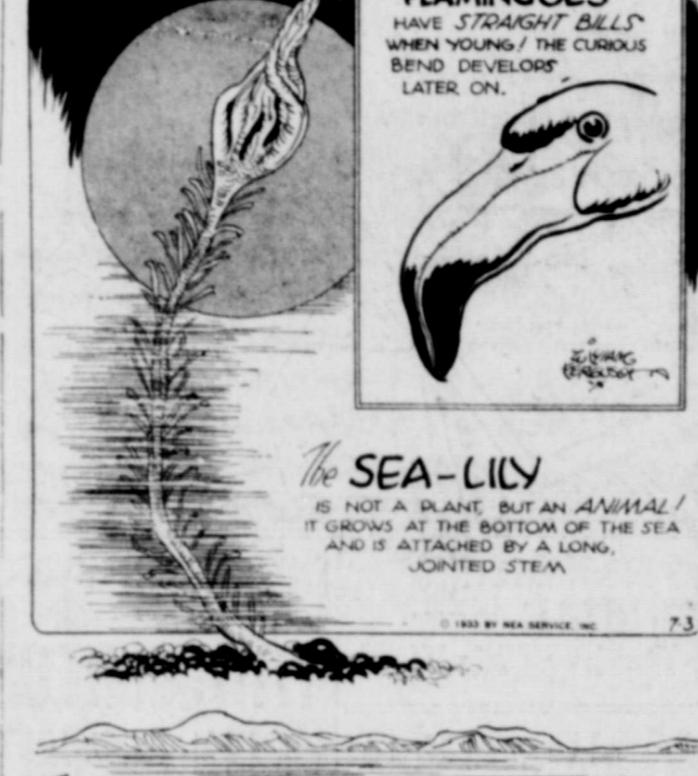

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON.—Roosevelt's sudden appointment of a special Industrial Recovery Board followed urgent representations from elements of both capital and labor that alarmingly enormous power over the national destiny was being left in the lap of Administrator Hugh S. Johnson.

The president was going off on a vacation at the critical time when the Industrial Recovery Act was to be organized. So he assembled the point, naming five cabinet members, the budget director and General Johnson to the board—which is to co-operate with Johnson, rather than supervise him.

Parious under-cover activity involving key posts in the new recovery administration had been in progress many days before the signing of the act.

Although organization charts call for equal and fair representation of industry and labor, some jobs—especially those of deputy administrators who must rule on controversies—are the objects of widespread wire-pulling and intrigue.

There's no lack of confidence in the general. The willingness of both capital and labor to accept him and to recognize his impartiality and good faith has been amazing. But as the folks most concerned began to comprehend the vast one-man power he would have ever industry some of them began to get the jitters.

THE contractors, who only did a \$1,500,000,000 business last year, are naturally excited over the prospective expenditure of \$3,360,000,000 for public works within two years. Some boom!

But many of them are also worried over probable price rises, wondering how safely they can make advance commitments at a time when there's little disposition to sell far ahead on the basis of existing prices.

CERTAIN senators strongly urged Roosevelt to appoint a congressional advisory committee which would stay on the job during the next six vital months of the recovery program.

They argued that his responsibility was too great for any single living man, that Congress should be allowed to help work the program out, that the White House should be kept advised of the sentiment of Congress while it was scattered over the country and that such a committee could reduce chances of serious clashes between the executive, and the legislature later on.

But Roosevelt and his advisers were unimpressed.

THE lobbyists will stay on the job, their numbers greatly increased by the many new relations which the federal government has with industry and agriculture. One result is to stiffen local purchasing power.

One of the assistant lobbyists in the unsuccessul "power trust" battle to keep the three per cent electricity tax from being shifted from consumer to producer was relieved \$50 a day plus liberal expenses.

It seems appropriate enough that President Roosevelt, who gave us beer, should take his vacation on a schooner. We presume, of course, that it is a vessel of light draught.

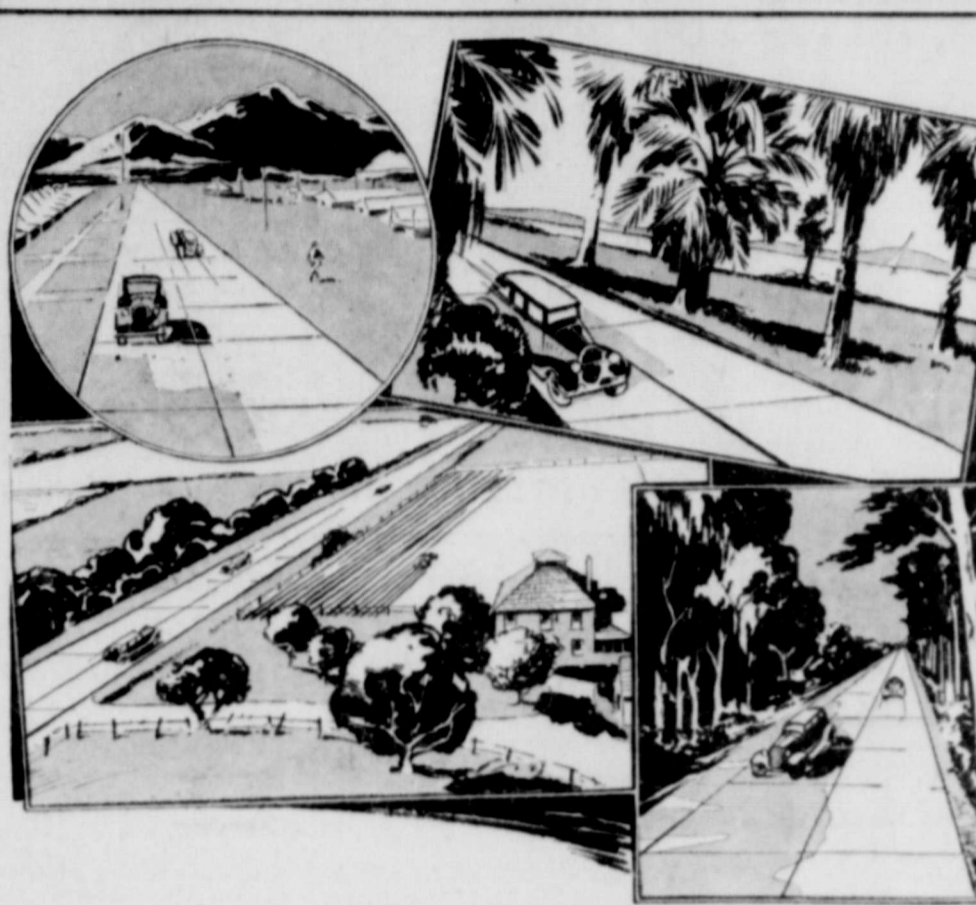

over, \$12 per acre.
As an example, if a man has 100 acres in cotton and retires 30 per cent, or 30 acres and it is determined that his land would yield one-quarter of a bale per acre or 125 pounds, he would be paid this summer \$7 an acre for the 30 acres or \$210. If the seven and one-half bales of cotton on which he had an option was sold at 10 cents a pound he would get 4 cents a pound, the difference in his option price and the selling price, on \$150, making a total of \$360 he would receive for the 30 acres he plowed under.

Under the second plan he would receive a little more per acre, the amounts ranging from \$7 per acre to \$20 per acre. Under the same conditions as above the same man, under this plan would plow up 30 acres of cotton and would receive \$9 per acre and would receive a total of \$270 in cash, but would get no more when the cotton is sold, because he would own no options.

It is estimated that if all the farmers in the county take part in the plan, it would bring something like \$40,000 in cash to the county this summer.

The two plans are to be explained in detail at the meeting at Alameda Wednesday and at the meeting in Ranger Thursday, when the farmers will have an opportunity to decide which of the two plans they wish to follow. All contracts are to be signed up this week and if the 10,000,000 acres is assured, Secretary of Agriculture Wallace will have a field representative in the county check up the land and the farmers can begin plowing up cotton soon after.

"Hell Below" Long-Awaited Cinema Event

One of these sequences, namely, a fight between Durante and a kangaroo, is reported to be the funniest spectacle ever to take place in a boxing ring.
