CLERK TELLS OF PAYING \$100 FOR STATE JOB

It surely is a job keeping track of football schedules this year. In fact we are going to try to get the business office to let us follow the plan used by Porter over at Breckenridge to a certain extent. He has a girl to keep track of points, another to watch for passes, a third to tabulate penalties and so on down the line. To where it looks like an amateur boxer entering the arena with his cohorts. Now if we just had someone who was good at keeping books to check up on the schedule each day we would be sitting jake.

Originally the Bulldog-Eagle battle was scheduled for Saturday afternoon, but it was played on Friday. We don't know when the switch was made. Then the Junior College had a game matched with Hillsboro on one schedule and with Sul Ross on another. They played Sul Ross. Yesterday a Fort Worth paper came out with a sports page runner about the most important junior college game of the week being between Ranger and T. M. C. this Friday, while the schedule furnished us by C. C. Davis (along with a press pass for the season) shows that Friday the Simmons University freshman team is to invade Lillard field and take on the Rangers. We hope to get it straightened out before the game is over, because we would not like to write up a nice story about the Rangers defeating T. M. C. and then learn it was the Simmons freshmen, or the other way around.

But, regardless of who they play Roy Weaver will probably not be in the lineup. He broke a collar bone in the Weatherford game and is going around with his arm in a sling. It isn't his passing arm, however, which is something. He told us yesterday that he thought he would be out about 10 days. He would be ready to play against Schreiner at Kerrville next week. And, to carry the schedule confusion further, the Oil Belt schedule has Eastland playing the Lobos at Cisco on Saturday, while the Eastland boys, some of them, inform us that the game is to be played this Friday. And, to back them up, the Cisco Daily News has a story to that effect on its front page in a recent issue.

The Bulldogs have a week off in which to get ready for the Cisco game on Nov. 11. The games with the Lobos have been so close of recent years that no matter what kind of a showing they make early in the season they are scheduled to be double tough by the time Ranger plays them.

Since 1928, when Ranger defeated the Lobos 13 to 0, the largest margin of victory has been three points. In 1929 the score was 14 to 12 in favor of Ranger; in 1930 Cisco won with a field goal and a score of 3 to 0; in 1931 the score was 13 to 13 tie in one of the best games we have seen and last year the Lobos were outlaws and did not play the Bulldogs.

In fact the games won and lost in the past nine years have been evenly divided. Cisco has won four, 1924, 1925, 1927 and 1930, while the other years Ranger won, with the exception of 1931 when the score was tied, which gives each team four victories and a tie. So, since 1928, the records show that Cisco has scored 28 points and Ranger 27.

Cisco has beaten Ranger by large scores on two occasions. In 1925 they won by a score of 24 to 0 and in 1927 they defeated the Bulldogs 22 to 0, while the largest score Ranger has piled up since 1923 was a 13 to 0 victory in 1928.

And, if our bookkeeping department has not made a mistake, in the years from 1924 to date Cisco has scored 80 points while Ranger was scoring 56, while the two teams were breaking even in games won and lost.

Confectionery Is Sold to Bill Allen

A deal was consummated today in Ranger in which Roy Stokes, who owned the Post Office confectionery, sold the business to Bill Allen, who took charge this morning.

OKLAHOMA CITY WELL BURSTS INTO FLAMES

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 1.—Bursting into flames following a mysterious explosion at daybreak, the No. 1 Reno oil well of the Frank Russell Petroleum company, about a mile from the city hall, was out of control here today as 150 firemen fought the liquid fire. Three oil tanks adjoining the well were in flames. About 50 other wells nearby were shut down. Camp house families were evacuated and guard lines set up as the flames shot into the air and heavy black smoke rolled over the eastern half of the city.

Millions of dollars of oil company property was imperiled. The well, with very high potential production, is located on the north end of the Oklahoma City field.

POST OFFICE SITE TALKED AT A MEETING

At a mass meeting called last night by labor interests in Ranger discussion of the various sites for a post office building were heard, speakers recommending three sites and everyone who wanted to do so being offered an opportunity to express an opinion.

The meeting was to be held in the basement of the First Methodist church, but the crowd was so large Rev. Bryan invited them to assemble in the main auditorium. Rev. Bryan opened the meeting with a prayer.

Henry Hannold, who presided as chairman of the meeting, called on L. C. Keel, who made an impassioned plea upon the sympathy of those present to support a movement which would put men to work.

Hannold then spoke briefly and introduced George F. McManus, owner of the building now used as a post office. Mr. McManus made a 45-minute talk in which he urged the people to recommend that the government buy his building for \$12,500.

Hall Walker was called upon by the chairman to address the crowd and he presented facts concerning the purchase and remodeling of the Commercial State Bank building giving estimates on the amount of work provided to the people of Cisco through the erection of a new building.

Others made short talks, pointing out the advantages to be gained in sponsoring one site or another, after which a vote of those present was taken. When the votes were counted the following results were announced:

McManus building, 11 votes. Commercial State Bank building, 13 votes. Times lot, corner Pine and Austin streets, 237 votes. It was announced at the meeting that the labor classes did not recognize the vote, ordered by Congressman Thomas L. Blanton and which the chamber of commerce had conducted, as official and said that the labor party would not consider it an election, but merely a straw vote. It was stated that the election of the laboring class would be conducted by petition.

It was agreed by the majority of those present, which did not represent a majority of the citizens of Ranger, that whatever site was selected would all get behind the movement and support it. Mr. McManus would not agree to this, stating he intended to keep on trying to sell his location and building to the government regardless of what the majority thought.

The following message, which had been sent to Congressman Blanton, was read at the meeting: "The citizens of Ranger are having a mass meeting tonight at 7:30 at the Methodist church to determine the location of a new post office, 1,000 citizens have signed a petition asking that this building be started at once to relieve the unemployment. We urge that you be present and explain to us what steps will be necessary to get prompt action on this building."

Congressman Blanton replied by wire that he was sorry it would be impossible for him to be present.

ROOSEVELT IS CONFIDENT OF NEW UPTURN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—President Roosevelt made clear today in the mist of developing criticism that he feels the drive for recovery is progressing, both in its monetary and re-employment phases. The president is hopeful, according to the white house, that gold purchases abroad will raise the general price level and while a seasonal shift may occur in employment along broad lines, the turn will continue upward. A report to the president by the secretary of labor today showed that average hourly wages, which increased in August, continued to gain in September. On retail trade a report showed that there had been a fair advance. It was emphasized these figures covered all parts of the nation. In the case of localities or commodities there might be variations below or above the figures.

Resolution Passed By Bar On Judge Conner's Death

The following resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote of the members of the Eastland County Bar association at a meeting held in the district courtroom at Eastland, Texas, on Oct. 27, 1933:

"It is with profound regret and deep sorrow that the bar association of Eastland county is called upon to record the passing of Honorable Truman H. Conner, chief justice of the court of civil appeals at Fort Worth, Texas, who on Oct. 26, 1933, after a long and fruitful life of service to his fellow men, fell gently to sleep. For many years he was a practicing attorney and later judge of the district court of Eastland county and for more than 20 years he has been a justice of the court of civil appeals of this state at Fort Worth, Texas. An efficient, safe and sound practitioner, he was a shining light in his chosen profession. Ever keeping in mind the relative rights and the justice to be attained in causes pending in his court, he was recognized and honored as an outstanding righteous and just judge of his generation. He was a true and faithful friend, a loyal and patriotic citizen, loved and admired by all with whom he came in contact.

His course is run. He has gone to the countless host beyond the stars, leaving to his family and other loved ones these priceless memories.

We extend to his beloved wife, his children, brother, sister and other kinsmen our heartfelt sympathy in this hour of their deep sorrow and join with them in mourning the loss of their loved one.

EVIDENCE IS BANK HELPED EVADE TAXES

Ferdinand Pecora, committee counsel, produced a letter written by "R. W. M." of the Chase-Harris, Forbes corporation, an affiliate of the bank. The letter invited William M. Kendall of New York to accept the bank's assistance in an effort to "establish losses for income tax payments."

Man Makes Bond In 'Borrowing' of A Brewery Truck

Litvinoff Sails For The United States

WAS GIVEN A FORUM RECEIPT HE DECLARES

Says Burck Threatened To Kill Him For Insisting On His Money.

AUSTIN, Nov. 1.—Joe E. Sims, 23-year-old Whitney grocery clerk, came to the governor's office and reported that he had bought a job, he told the house of representatives committee investigating reported state job trafficking.

Sims said he bought the job from E. H. Burck of Whitney. He exhibited a receipt for \$100 as a year's subscription to the Ferguson Forum. Burck, Sims testified, told him he had to give him a receipt that way to "cover up." The receipt bore the number 41. Sims said Burck told him that represented the number of the job he was going to get. It was a scale inspector's job, the young man said he was told.

He borrowed the \$100 from the bank and paid by check, Sims told the committee. That was Nov. 1, 1932. Not getting a job after the change of state administration, he said, Burck told him the legislature was holding it up and that as soon as the senate confirmed Frank Denison as chairman of the highway commission, the job would be had.

Finally, he said, he came to Austin, sat in the governor's outer office two days without being able to gain entrance. Then he told John Wood, then secretary to the governor, that he had bought a job. He said Wood went into the office and later returned, declaring Burck unknown.

Sims returned to Whitney and told Burck. Burck pretended to be "mad," he continued, and told him to give the check back to him and he would take it to Austin and get a Ferguson Forum stamp on the back of it. He delivered the check to Burck.

Failing to get the check or job, he became insistent. Burck came by and got Sims in an automobile on a promise to go to Burck's house and get the check, Sims testified, and when he was in the car, Burck threatened to kill him.

"When he went into the house to get a gun, I got out of the car and ran off," Sims said.

Plan a History of Newspapers

HARRISBURG, Pa.—"Bibliography of Pennsylvania Newspapers"—expected to be one of the most valuable historical records ever prepared in the state—is being compiled by the Pennsylvania Historical Commission, of the Department of Public Instruction.
A detailed record of all newspapers published since 1820 is to be contained in the bibliography. Department officials have enlisted the aid of publishers throughout the state as well as many civic organizations in compiling the records.

Rule, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, said "the record will be the most valuable historical record ever produced by the department."

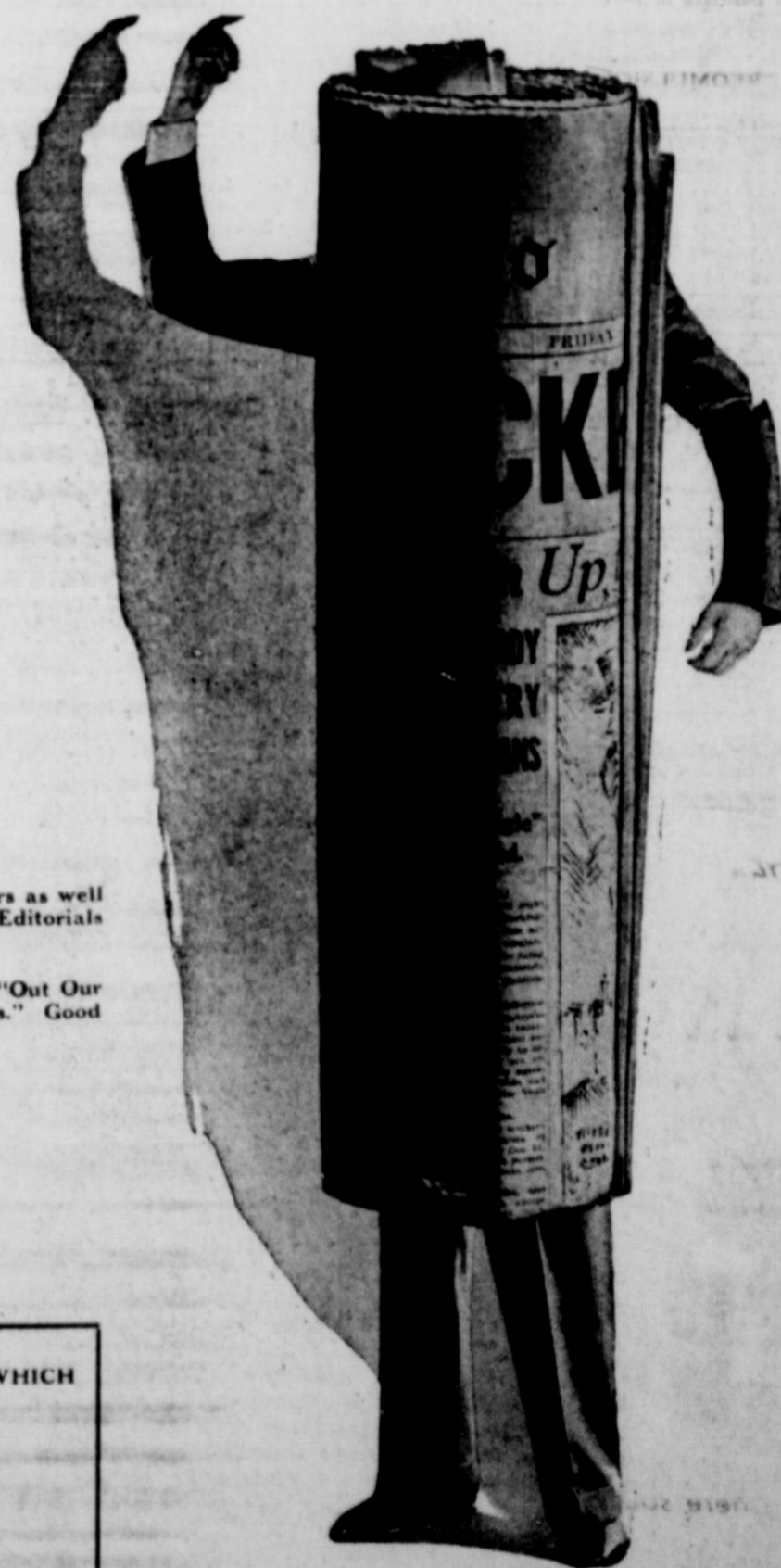
