

Sanitation Man Will Aid Schools Over the County

Fleming A. Watters of the state health department has been designated as supervisor of sanitation for Eastland county and is now in the county with headquarters in the Judia building at Cisco.

The civil works administration has set aside some \$15,000 for construction work in this county. School officials may have the labor furnished for the construction of sanitary pit toilets on the school grounds. Private individuals may also have this work done. It will be necessary for both trustees and individuals to furnish the materials for the construccion work. In most cases materials may be salvaged from old buildings in the neighborhood that may be used in construction of the toilets. The average cost of the material should be very small.


