The Panhandle and South Plains have lived up to their reputation, so far as weather is concerned, during the past week. There hasn't been much of any one kind of weather, but there has been a wide variety of all types of weather, in small doses that is. Over the area, there has been some snow, but not much; there has been wind, but not for long; there has been some rain, but hardly enough to notice; there has been some cold weather, but not for long, and we have had some warm springlike days just right for golfing, if you have the time. The weather we have experienced for the past week or two has caused it to be said of this area, "If you don't like the weather, just wait a little while there will be a change."

If you do much driving over Texas highways you will occasionally see sights that are unbelievable. When Viola and I were returning home last Friday from Central Texas a sight met our eyes that we couldn't believe until we slowed down and took a second look. Just a few miles this side of Hamilton, on Highway 36, the road passes through a number of relatively shallow cuts. It was in one of these cuts that our attention was attracted to what was evidently a freak accident. A huge transport truck, such as transports or other liquids, had left the highway and climbed the embankment and came to a stop with the trailer standing on the rear wheels at almost a ninety degree angle and plastered against the embankment. The tractor was still hitched to the trailer. However it happened there is no doubt that the old boy that was skinning that particular truck thought momentarily that he was going into orbit. I have been worried ever since about the problem of getting the rig out of its precarious position and rolling again. I am sure that neither the trailer nor tractor were damaged to the extent but what they could proceed down the road once they were pointed in the same direction.

That was the second, or indication of the second, truck accident we saw that morning. Just a few miles the other side of Hamilton large quantities of new lumber was scattered up and down both sides of the highway for quite a distance. A number of men were gathered around the lumber and loading it on small trucks. At Hamilton we learned that a large truck, loaded with lumber, had turned over on the highway when the driver lost control of the vehicle on the rain-slick highway. That accident occurred at the bottom of a shallow valley. Another truck approaching from the north was wrecked when the driver veered off the road and into an embankment rather than hit the first truck, and about the same time a car approaching from the south was wrecked when the driver attempted to miss the overturned truck. We are not trying to make a point here, or even establish and object lesson, however it does point up the fact that you are pretty lucky if you arrive on the scene later, just a little later.

A delegation of Dimmittites visited a number of Public Housing projects below the Caprock last week. I presume the trip was made with the idea in mind of studying the feasibility of a like project for Dimmitt. Any number of local people have shown interest in securing a Public Housing Project for our community, so that decent housing facilities would be available to people in the lower income group. Since the labor contract with the Mexican government has been cancelled by the Congress and total reliance will have to be placed on domestic labor, it is time that something be done about the housing problem. If we expect people to come to this area and to work for the prevailing wage scale, for farm labor, it will be necessary to provide housing at a rental that they can afford to pay. Many communities have solved their housing problem. My information is that the City Government can establish a Housing Authority empowered to enter into a contract with the Federal Government. Funds are borrowed from the government to pay for the construction of the multi-family housing units.

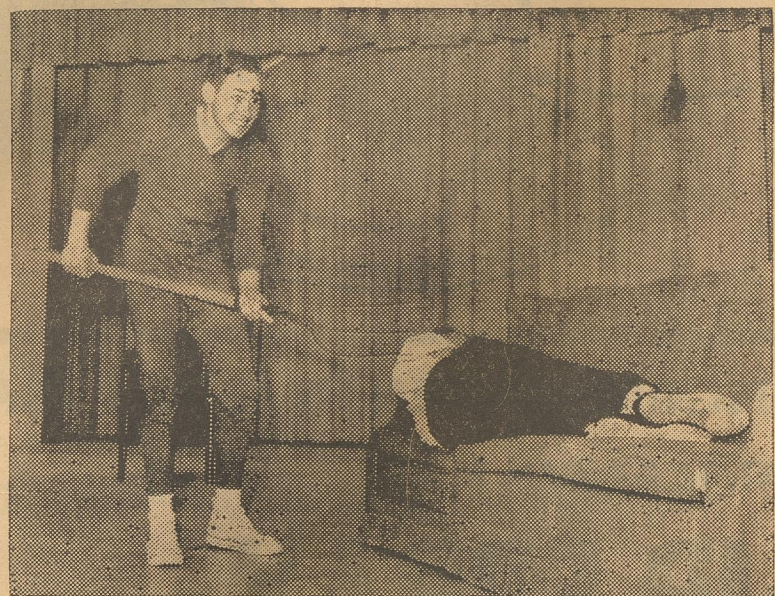
Administration of the project is left in the hands of the local Housing Authority, and all rentals collected, after expenses, is applied on the debt to the government. It is argued that the presence of a housing project would not have any effect on privately owned rental property because of the fact that people eligible to occupy public housing would not be able to pay the rent needed for decent housing facilities. This is another building program that should get under way in Dimmitt at the earliest possible moment. It is needed from a humane standpoint, and also for the good of the agricultural industry of the area.

School To Conduct Vocational Survey

As a result of expanded federal aid under the 1963 Vocational Educational Act, a planning meeting with twenty-three people in attendance was held in the Dimmitt High School Monday evening with Superintendent Paul Hilburn, presiding. Attending the meeting in an advisory and consulting capacity were Ray Barber of Austin, Texas Education Agency Vocational Education team chairman; Walter Labay of Plainview, area Vocational Agriculture supervisor; Ima Dora Hale of Plainview, Homemaking Area Supervisor; Ray Rushing of Plainview, Area Supervisor of Trades and Industries; also Joe Bradley, local representative of the Texas Employment Service.

Plans were made at the meeting for a community survey, beginning Monday, February 1, and continuing through February 24, of job opportunities under the 1963 Vocational Act. During the survey all industries, business firms, professional offices, etc., will be contacted in order to determine the type and number of job opportunities in the business community as occasioned by the increased demand for help and the turn-over in present employment. The survey will also determine the type of training required to fill the needs of local demands for trained and skilled labor. It was pointed out that the program is primarily designed for the benefit of students who are dropouts from public school, or for one reason or another are not able to attend college.

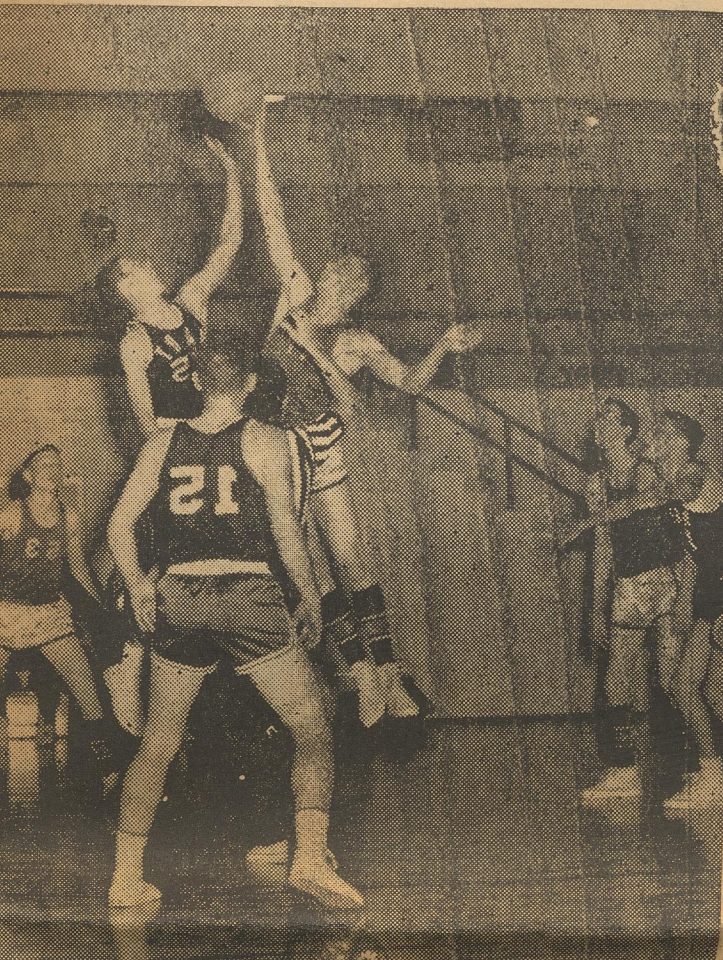

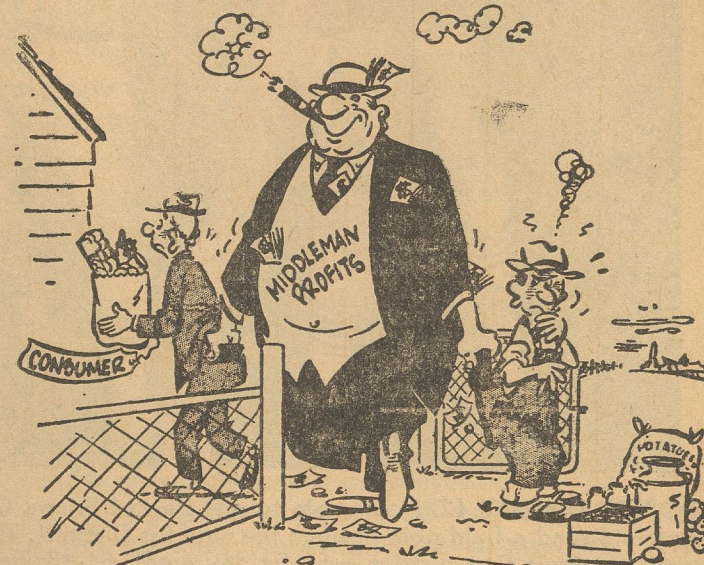

Free Washington Trips Offered Local Oratorical Contest Winners

All expense paid trips to the nation's capital city will be awarded to winners of an oratorical contest was announced this week by Mr. Leo Forrest, manager of Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative.

Interested young people may obtain an official entry blank from their school or the offices of Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative. The deadline for submitting entries will be February 15, 1965, Mr. Forrest said.

As participants in the Texas Electric Cooperative Youth Tour, local contest winners will travel by chartered bus to Washington, D. C., where they will spend three days visiting places of historical interest and seeing the nation's government in action.

On Wednesday, June 9, the Texas group will meet more than 600 students from 10 states for a program sponsored by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association and the Rural Electrification Administration. The program will feature presentations by officials of these organizations and other Washington personalities and possibly the Presidential staff.

The eventful day will end with a charter cruise down the Potomac which will include entertainment and refreshments.

Also included on the 11 day agenda will be visits to the following: George Washington's Mount Vernon home, Arlington National Cemetery, the U. S. House and Senate, the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Smithsonian Institute, the U. S. Bureau of Printing and Engraving, the Lincoln Memorial and other places of interest.

NOTES FROM YOUR COUNTY TAX OFFICE

All 1964 State and County taxes are due and payable on January 31, 1965. Penalty will be added to all unpaid taxes on February 1st, 1965.

If you wish to qualify to vote in elections during 1965 you will need to obtain your Poll Tax receipt on or before January 31, 1965. If you have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1964 you must obtain an exemption certificate at least 30 days before any election you plan to vote in.

If you were 60 years of age on January 1, 1964 or before, you need not obtain Poll Tax receipt and do NOT need an exemption certificate to vote in Castro County, Texas.

1965 Motor vehicle license plates will go on sale February 1, 1965 and must be on your motor vehicles on or before April 1, 1965.

Persons wishing to obtain a special license plate number are requested to bring their Certificates of Title and License receipts when making the reservation so we can issue the plates and mail them out when they come up for issuance. We hope this will eliminate some of the last minute confusion and will also help us keep our reports in order.

All persons, when coming to make application for 1965 license plates will be required to bring their Certificates of Title and 1964 license receipts. The law prohibits the Tax Assessor-Collector from issuing license plates without these two documents so if you have lost either of these, come by the tax office and we will help you get them duplicated before time to get the 1965 license.

All property tax payers are required to render their property for taxation and claim homestead exemptions before March 31, 1965. We hope you will keep this in mind and take care of it before the deadline.

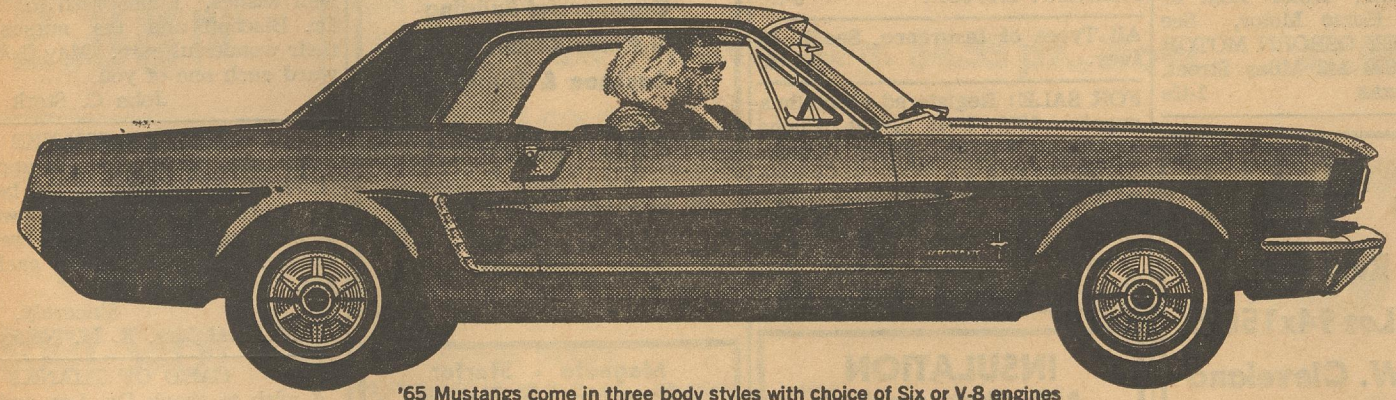

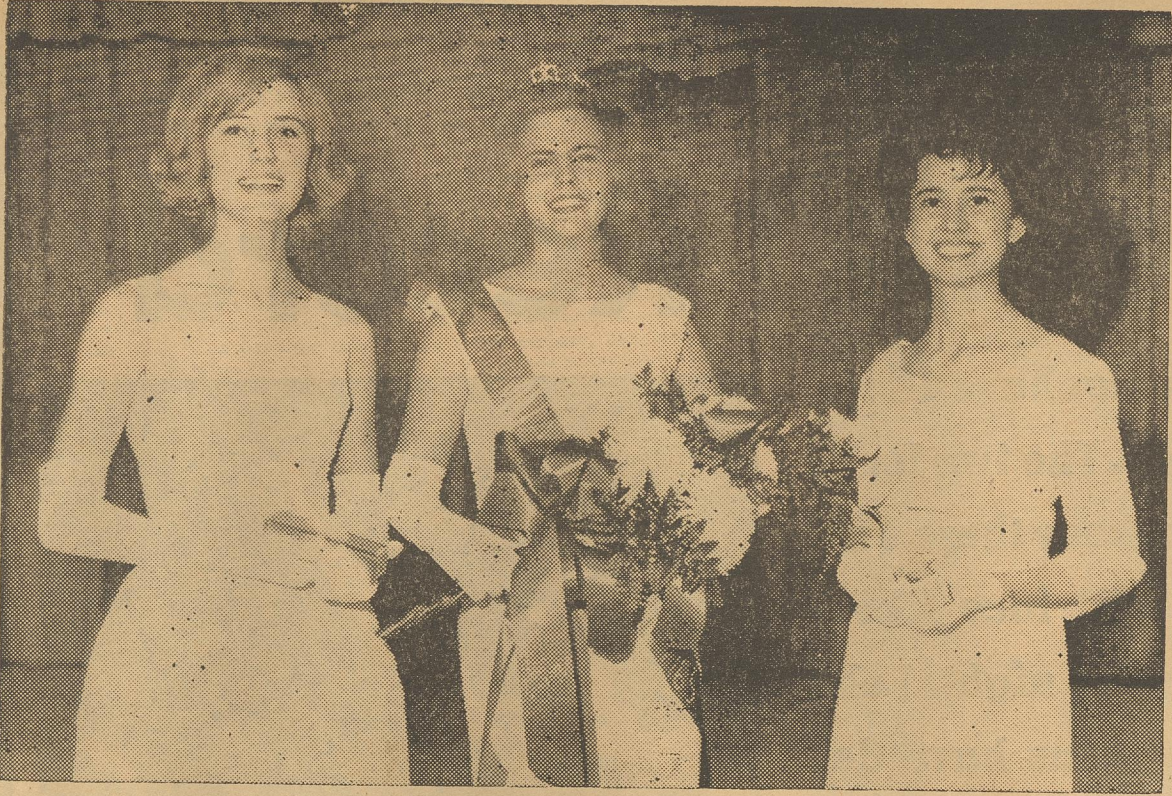

FALL TO FRIONA -- THERE

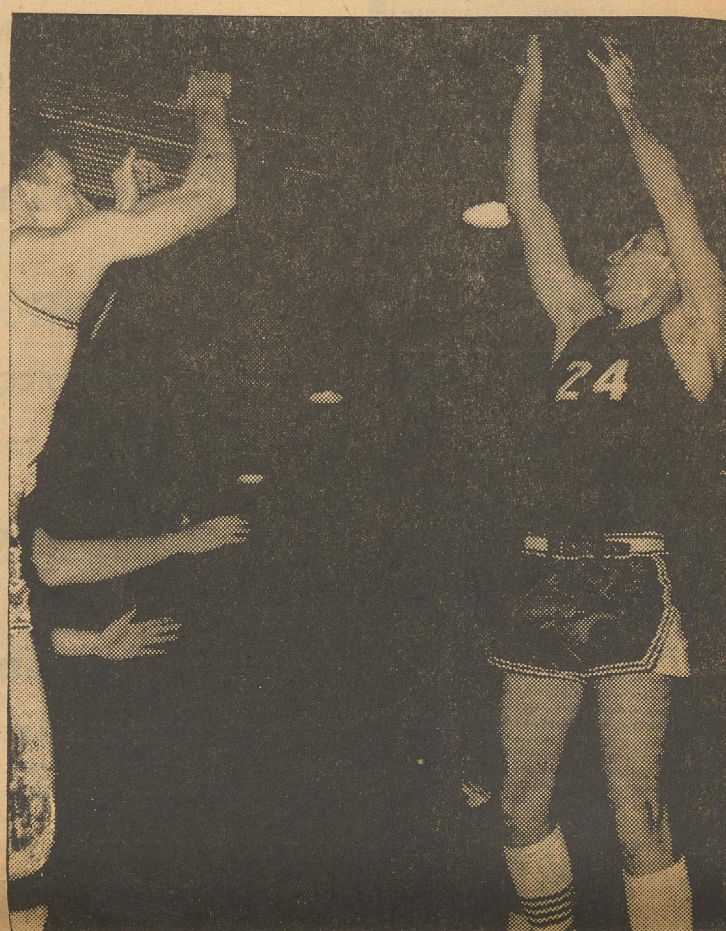
Bobcats were tied 48-48 with the Chiefs and only seconds remained in the game. Two fouls by the Bobcats set up Friona's last three points.

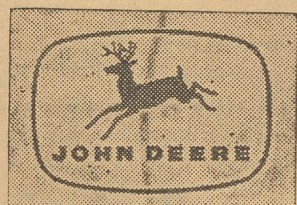


DIMMITT GUARD, GINNY YOKELY (left) and KAREN McCOLUM attempt to stop Friona girls from scoring.



DIMMITT BOBCAT, DICKY DYER, sends a jump shot toward the net in action against the Friona Chiefs, Friday night.

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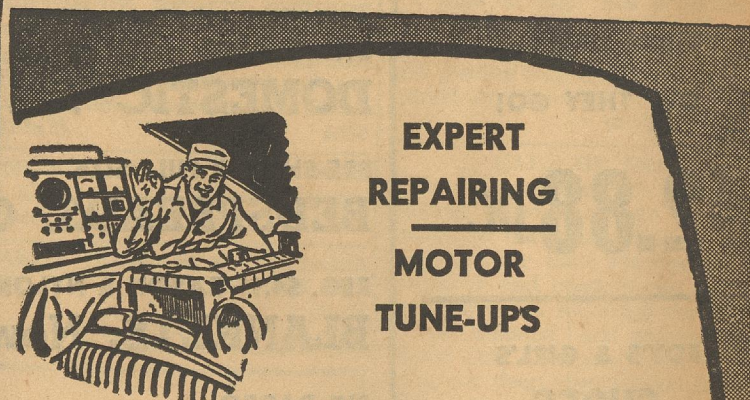
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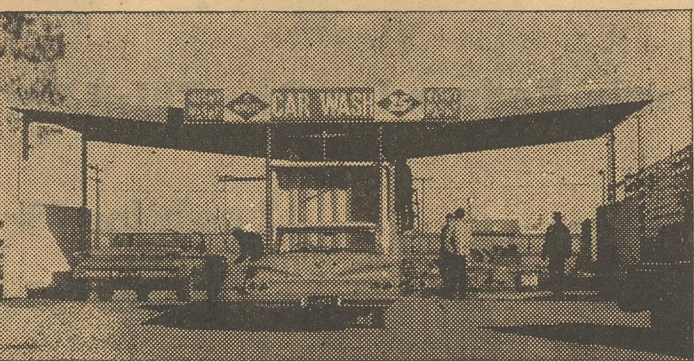
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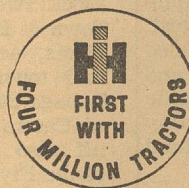
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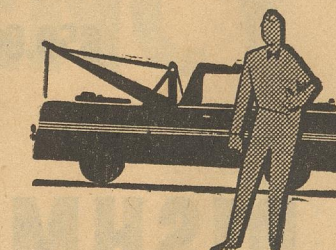

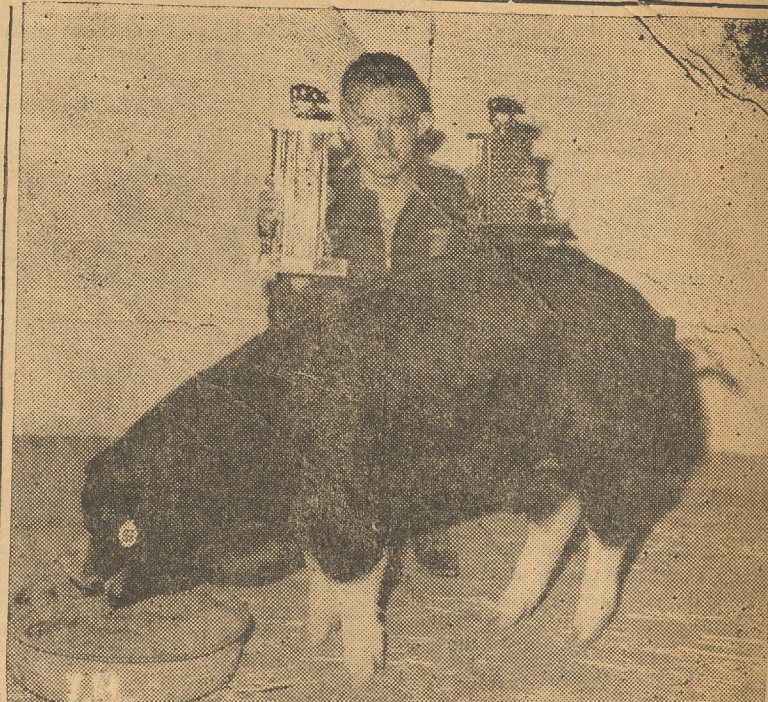
Their entries are among the record number of more than 6,000 head of livestock and horses which will be at the February 12th through 21st Exposition. An all-

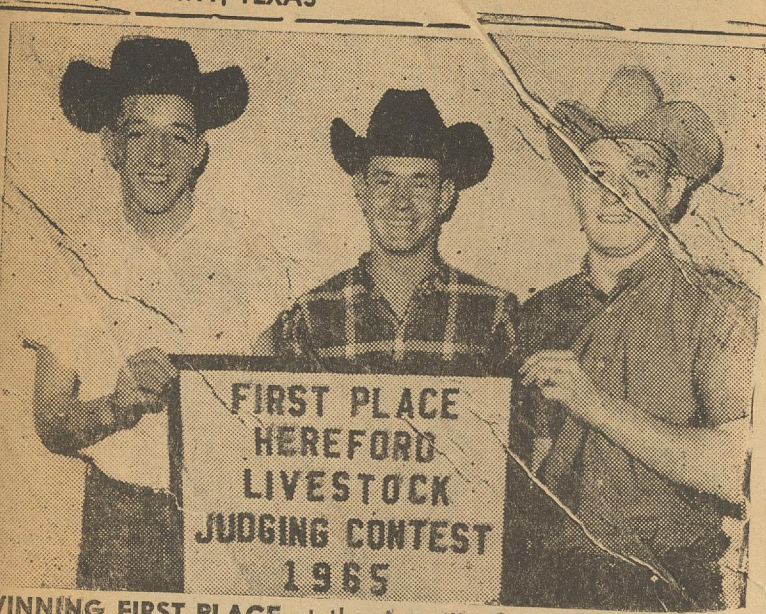
