MRS. WALTER GRAHAM GIVES INTERESTING STORY OF DEMONSTRATION WORK

I began my H. D. Club attendance in March 1933, the second meeting that I attended the Club demonstrator and helpers. Miss Rachel Burks, Mrs. Ben Fortner and Mrs. W. B. Russel made me a foundation pattern. I enjoyed the use of it even then and the sleeves fit a little bit awkward. I entered the June house dress contest, simply to help the report of Miss Burks, didn't attend any more club meetings until winter.

In the fall I needed a better fitting pattern as I'd lost some twenty pounds. I live so far from the club members I hesitated in securing their help especially since I was such an inactive member. My husband's hired hand had found a sewing manual on the highway, so that gave me the directions, and so we set to work to make the pattern, my husband, my helper. He first said "no" but helped when he saw I couldn't do the thing alone. He measured me, then pinned the pattern to fit, that wasn't so easy for a man, but he did a good job, then he marked it.

By its use I made a raglan sleeve pattern but wouldn't enter it in the May contest for the item, but by this pattern I made a sheer dress for County Contest in June and won first prize, rather to my surprise. I also made a slip for that contest but it was too tight to win. This event was only two months and about eight days before my baby's birth.

I missed meetings several times before and after the baby's birth in September. When I did begin attending regular again I was chosen Club Wardrobe Demonstrator for year August 1934 until August 1935, this was done I'm sure, for the reason, that I'd said "I need my closet remodeled but just don't have the incentive". They gave me the incentive.

BI decided that if that were to be my part I'd have to try to be 100 percent with each suggested home improvement that dealt directly or indirectly with wardrobe work. For this I turned daily to Miss Clark's demonstrations and by use of McCall's, Good House-keeping and Vogue magazines gained help from them all but Miss Clark's helps were used more by myself than any other.

Her demonstration on washing and caring of garments led to correctly yadded ironing board and sleeve board. I helped four outside club members on this too and fully enjoy mine. My ironing board and sleeve board are both built in in my kitchen and bought from the "Ideal Company".

The County clubs and individual clubs worked on bedspreads, the handkerchief variety, I have a white one, over one third made and find it easily made and very pretty work.

Then Miss Clark gave us a nice demonstration on collars, belts and this year's styles. Told us of a meeting to be held in Plainview with Mrs. Arnes in charge. Mrs. Virgil Norman, this Club's Class II Demonstrator and myself attended this meeting, it was on "color and its uses". Mrs. Norman and I tried to, as much as possible, to put on that demonstration to our club the following day, helping each club member present to pick becoming dress lines, etc. for

Being unusually busy cooking for hired help during four months I didn't have a thing done on that closet. Now, I began to yell for the money to begin and found the solution in six hundred cotton seed crake sacks, my husband helped get them together and sold them to the elevator for four cents a piece, the \$24.00 looked big.

I didn't know just what I could do but needed rods within the children's reach and hat racks and more and better space for all our shoes.

After seeing those pictures of closets in Miss Clark's office, she kindly lent me her book on closets and from it I found the shoe closet I wanted and from pamphlets she had I found the extension carrier rods I needed but to know just how I wanted it I had to start on it and plan and build as I went, knowing I needed a rod for myself, my husband and one for each girl and the shoe closet, I began.

AAA TO CONTINUE UNTIL RULING

TO FUNCTION AT LEAST UNTIL RULING BY SUPREME COURT ON PROCESS TAX

Assurance that the AAA would continue to function at least until a final ruling by the Supreme Court on the validity of processing taxes was given Monday by President Roosevelt.

That was his comment on the decision of the Circuit Court of Appeals at Boston Tuesday holding the taxes unconstitutional.

Mr. Roosevelt said at his press conference he thought it would be a good thing if the AAA amendments now before the Senate are passed. A vote may be reached today.

He agreed with their general objective and has so informed congressional leaders.

The President turned over to the Attorney General inquiries whether the AAA processing taxes can be collected in the jurisdiction of the Bonson court pending the final decision by the Supreme Court.

In an effort to speed action on Administration amendments to the AAA, the Senate agreed today to limit debate.

Senator Robinson, the Democratic leader, obtained the agreement limiting debate as the Senate neared the end of a week's debate on the disputed measure with little accomplished.

The limitation prohibits speeches longer than half an hour on the bill, or 15 minutes on amendments.

The house last week dealt a major political blow to the President in voting 258 to 157 against the "death sentence" provision of the holding company bill, although the members voted for the measure, on final passage, 123 to 81. The Senate's provision, favored by the President, passed the upper body by only one vote. It directed that existing holding companies cease to function as such by 1940, but authorized the Federal Power Commission to extend the life of those not more than once removed from operating companies for two years.

The more lenient provision of the House measure authorizes, but does not direct, the commission to dissolve the companies by 1940, and to permit indefinite continuance of any in the public interest. The Senate would wipe them out by 1942, except when the commission finds that continuance is necessary to an economically and geographically integrated operating system.

That the issue thus framed will be in the presidential campaign next year is the opinion of Senator Norris, and other Congressmen. The size and activity of the power company lobby caused some to remark that the efforts of the

MUST BE OKAYED FOR WPA RELIEF

MUST CERTIFY AND REGISTER WITH U. S. EMPLOYMENT SERVICE FOR WORK

Relief roll clients in order to receive benefits of work under the Works Progress Administration must be certified as to eligibility for work and be registered with the U. S. Employment Service, according to instructions received by Texas Relief Commission officials from the Federal Emergency Relief Administration in Washington this week. The social service department of the Texas Relief Commission will handle certification of employables to the Works Progress Administration.

The instructions pointed out that priority of workers within families shall be suggested by the social service department, based upon such considerations as health, disabilities, preservation of skills, and morale.

It was further provided that enrollment of a member of a family in the Civilian Conservation Corps shall not preclude the employment of another member of the same family on work projects financed in whole or in part under the Emergency Relief Appropriation Act of 1935.

Certification of a client for eligibility to employment under the new program will not mean that the client will be dropped from the relief rolls, but as soon as the first paycheck for such employment is received, the case will be closed and relief stopped.

The same regulation will apply to non-resident relief cases, or transients, provided the transient has been registered with a transient center or camp for two weeks or more, and with the exception that no certification may be made for transients registering after July 15.

BAKERS SHOW CLASS WITH THRILLING UPSSETS OVER G. M. AND LUMBERMEN

Along with the weather, the local softball league reached a high temperature the past week and upset after upset resulted as close thrilling games kept the customers gasping until the final plays. Starting off the week's finest offering of exhibitions as each of the clubs performance's took on the aspect of big league play the rejuvenated Bakers pulled a great contest out of the fire in the last of the ninth to down the General Motors outfit by a score of 6 to 5. Gladman and Rothwell hooked in a brilliant twirling duel and were accorded splendid support by their mates. The hitting power of the Bakers waked up in the last frame to score three runs after two were out and victory was apparently within the grasp of the mechanics. Only sixty minutes were consumed in playing this contest.

The feature game of the week between the Lumbermen and News set a new standard in softball Friday evening as the Builders hammered out a thrill-packed 3 to 2 decision. In playing this game the time required was only fifty minutes. Like the previous day's game it was a beautiful contest between Webb of the victors and Smith of the losers. Brilliant defensive games marked each club's performance in the field and apparent hits were turned into fielding gems as the players did their best to throttle the opposition. Webb's long triple in the seventh with a mate aboard drove in the winning tally and topple the News from its lofty position.

A thoroughly capable school man as superintendent, plus a splendid faculty working in harmony with a sympathetic school board is likely proof that Dimmitt High School will rise to new heights in scholastic and athletic activities.

Dimmitt bids you welcome Superintendent and Mrs. Clemons and may your work prove both pleasant and happy.

THE JOKERS IN THE REPEAL AMENDMENT

For fifty years and longer the whiskey interests have always sought to secure unfair advantages by legislation cunningly devised and concealing "jokers", which sometimes have been overlooked until too late to defeat their damny effects.

The liquor folks in the last legislature attempted to do just that sort of thing even in this enlightened age, and are hoping to get by with it. The intelligent citizenry of Texas, however, are waking up to the true intent of the purported "fair" repeal amendment, and the jokers are being pointed out in disturbing rapidity to those who seek to give liquor legal standing in Texas.

"There seems to be some confusion as to just what will be the effect of the repeal amendment, if it should pass. It has been said by some that the passing of this amendment would leave our local option laws just as they were before State prohibition was adopted. A careful reading of the proposed amendment shows that this is not true. The whiskey dealers are asking for MUCH MORE than simply repeal. They are asking that the LOCAL OPTION that was in operation before we had State prohibition be greatly weakened if not made worthless.

"The OLD LOCAL OPTION LAW gave the people the right to vote on ALL intoxicating liquors. Under this amendment they have the right to vote ONLY on 'intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes.' Under this law before a whiskey seller could be convicted for violation of a local option law, the State should have to prove not only that liquor was SOLD but that it was SOLD FOR 'BEVERAGE PURPOSES,' a thing very difficult to do.

"Again this repeal amendment requires that ANY LOCAL OPTION LAW PASSED 'shall contain provisions for voting on the SALE of intoxicating liquors of various types and various alcoholic content.' This would require EXPERT testimony from a competent chemist as to the alcoholic content and also proof that the liquor ANALYZED was the liquor SOLD, a thing practically impossible to do.

"And still again under our old local option laws, the people has a right to vote on the sale of liquor in 'such sub-division of a county as may be designated by the COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF SAID COUNTY.'" That right is NOT allowed in the amendment to be voted on in August. It is ONLY given to COUNTIES, JUSTICE PRECINCTS, or TOWNS OR CITIES. Under this enactment those districts and sub-divisions other than those mentioned above would automatically BECOME WET and would have to REMAIN so as no provision is made in the repeal amendment for them to vote liquor out.

"In the light of the above facts, it would seem that the whiskey traffic is asking TOO MUCH of a sovereign citizen, when it asks him to surrender these local self-government rights. The Clarendon News.

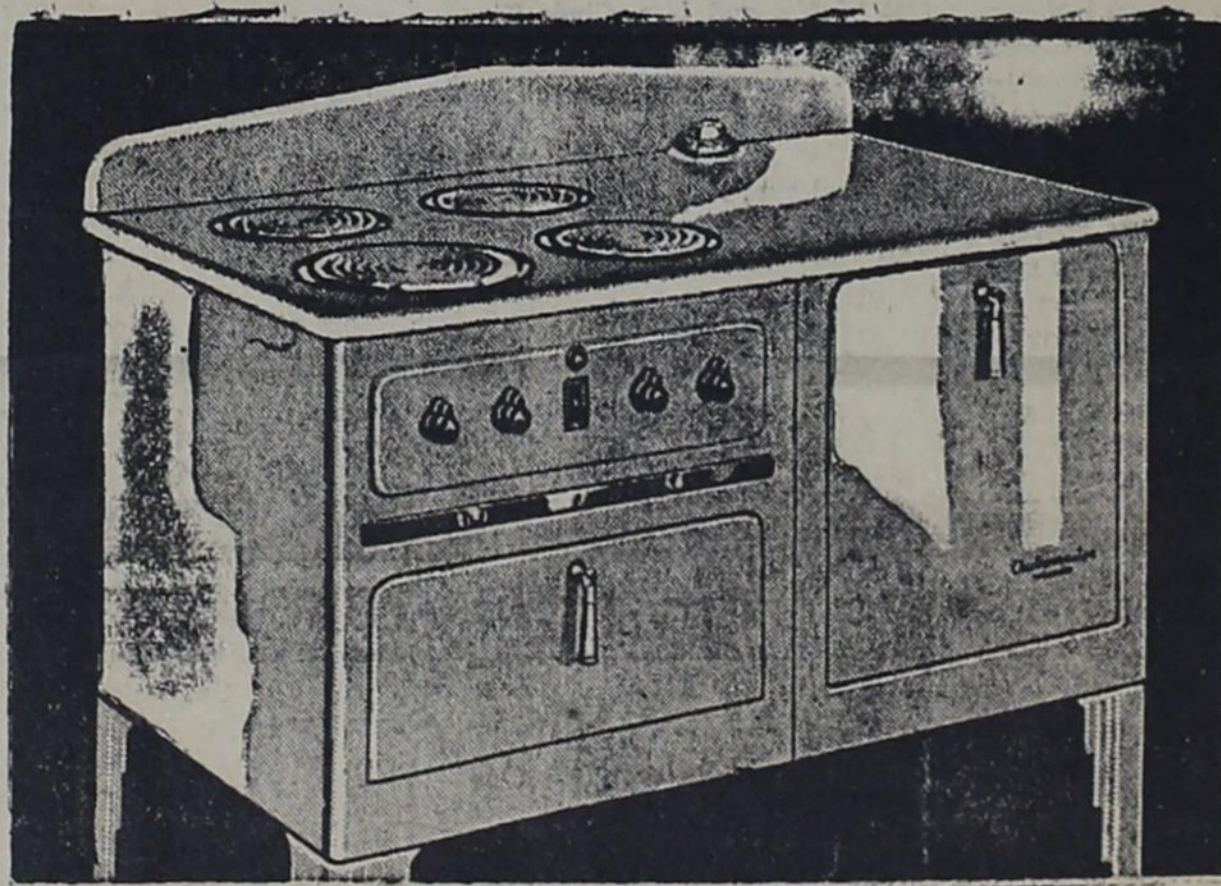

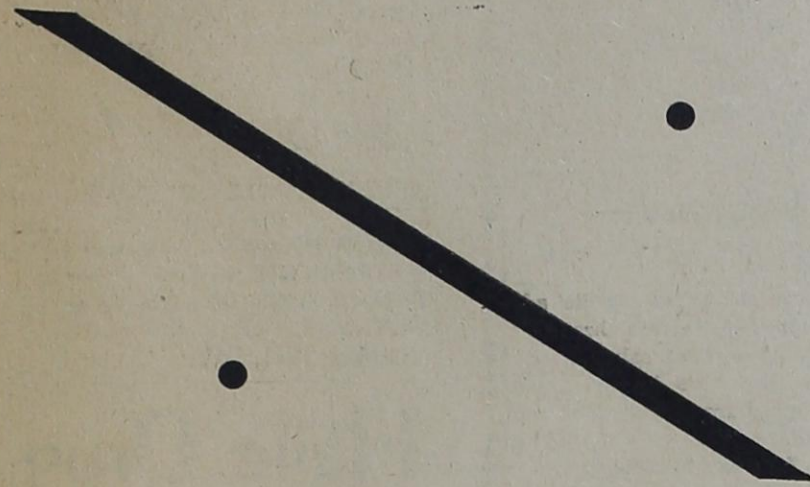

Commission and what this body will do to them remains to be seen. Once before the famous "power trust" won a great victory but it turned out to be costliest on record. When the Senate in 1927 voted to investigate the industry the companies had the inquiry turned over to the Federal Trade Commission, rather than the Senate itself. The result was a six-year study of malpractices, which created much of the popular strength behind the present demand for reforms.
