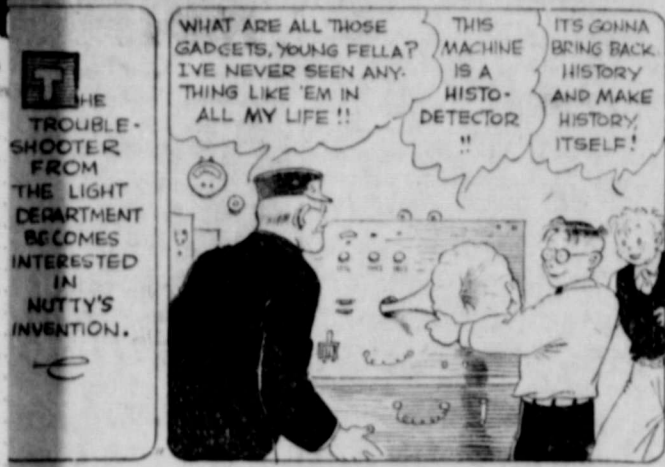

Heading For Last Roundup

PARIS.—Steps are to be taken 1934 to round up the last wild herd of European buffalo.

The average continental schoolboy would be as surprised as the average American to know that wild bison actually roam the plains of Central Europe. Likewise, it is not well known that these animals once ran free in great numbers west of the Urals.

The last wild herd is in the Ukraine, according to a survey published recently. These animals are survivors of a great herd which as late as 1913 inhabited the Lithuanian forests of Bielo-

as many, or more, bison in captivity. There are 27 on a ducal estate in Poland, 12 in the park of Count Amin in Prussia; as many in the Prussian government preserve, Hanover; 75 or more on the lands of the Prince of Plessis, Upper Silesia, and four or five in private parks in Sweden.

The European bison is smaller than its American cousin and has thinner, shorter hair and a more rounded head. It is as well armed with horns, however, and was regarded by the peoples of antiquity and the Middle Ages as particularly vicious.

Failures Show a Decrease Over Last November

AUSTIN.—Commercial failures in Texas during December as reported to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research totaled 25 against 27 in November and 39 in December, 1932, a decline of 7 per cent and 40 per cent respectively. For the entire year of 1933 failures totaled 484 against 911 in 1932, a drop of 47 per cent.

Liabilities of the bankrupt firms, totaling \$403,000, were 13 per cent less than the \$464,000 in November and 11 per cent below the \$453,000 in December, 1932. Liabilities for the entire year totaled \$11,714,000 against \$19,741,000 in 1932, a drop of 41 per cent.

Assets of the firms that failed in December were 56 per cent greater than of those in November and 9 per cent above those in December, 1932. For the entire year, however, assets of bankrupt firms were 59 per cent below of 1932.
