SPEAKING OF PETROLEUM AND DECISIONS AND CODES

Oil Adm. Harold L. Ickes is said to have admitted that a federal court decision in Texas had "struck a paralyzing blow at the oil stabilization program started by the New Deal administration." T. S. Hose, a noted petroleum engineer of New York, following the decision predicted that bloodshed and "a revival of vigilante law will return to the oil fields if minority interests are allowed to break down the new oil price structure."

Coming nearer home, two bills to give the Texas railroad commission increased power in regulating oil and gas production have been passed by the Texas house of representatives: One would allow the commission to inquire into records of refineries and check their run and storage tanks to determine if proration orders were being observed. Another would make penalties for violators who refuse to comply with those in the oil tax law. Neither of the bills received the required 100 votes to make them effective immediately. These bills are pending. Senate action is necessary to send them to Governor Ferguson.

E. L. Dohney of California in by-gone days was one of the high aces in the petroleum world. He was one of the exploiters of the Mexican fields. He had a very explosive saying, "Wherever there is oil there is hell." In the wide, wide world of today hell appears to be rampant in and out of the oil diggings of the world. There is a way to solve the oil problem, codes and regulations. Rush the Bryant-Atwell decision to the supreme court of the United States. Let the high tribunal of last resort say "the last word."

JAMES ROOSEVELT OPPOSED TO THE CHILD LABOR AMENDMENT

James Roosevelt, the son of his father, is a very active young democrat in the councils of the Massachusetts democracy. He has taken strong ground against the ratification by the Massachusetts legislature of the child labor amendment. Legislative committees of the Massachusetts senate and house submitted unfavorable reports as to ratification. President Roosevelt has asked for its ratification by the states. In an address before a large audience the son of his father credited the NRA with having brought this country through a period "in which there might have been revolt such as has been found in many parts of Europe." became a law and the Home Owners' Loan Corporation bill providing for home mortgage refinancing to the amount of \$2,000,000,000 was passed. On June 16, the special session of Congress ended and General Johnson was named chief of the National Recovery Administration.

In July the Blue Eagle movement was inaugurated. In August funds were awarded to the navy to start a peace-time building program. The gold embargo order was issued.

In September and October steps were taken to recognize Russia and on Nov. 16, Russia was recognized. In October the gold-buying program was inaugurated.

In November repeal of the prohibition amendment was accomplished. The silver pact signed at London was proclaimed and a program of buying newly mined silver inaugurated.

On Jan. 1, it was announced that all but 5 per cent of the banks in operation had qualified for deposit insurance. On Jan. 3, the President read his message to Congress and on the next day submitted his budget message. The movement to guarantee the principal as well as the interest of federal land bank bonds was inaugurated, and \$50,000,000 more for emergency relief work was requested. An investigation of air mail contracts commenced.

In February the air mail contracts were cancelled and the carrying of the mail was given over temporarily to the army. The result was the disclosure of the fact that the army fliers were not qualified to carry the mail and did not understand beam flying, thus making necessary in the near future a reorganization of the air service of the army. Steps are being taken to completely reorganize the air service by eliminating graft from the service.

A new year of the Roosevelt administration opens now with the recovery program well under way. Hope has come back to the nation.

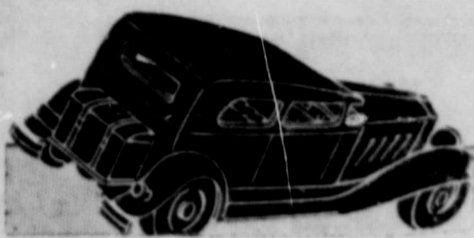

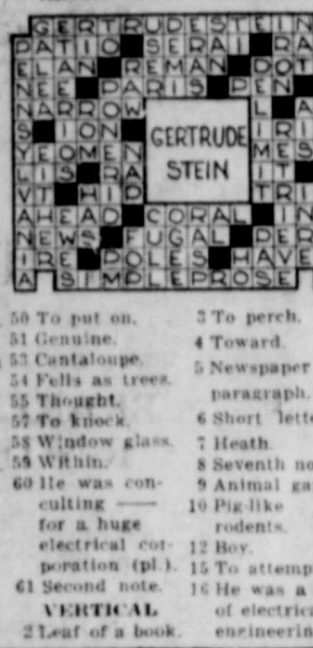

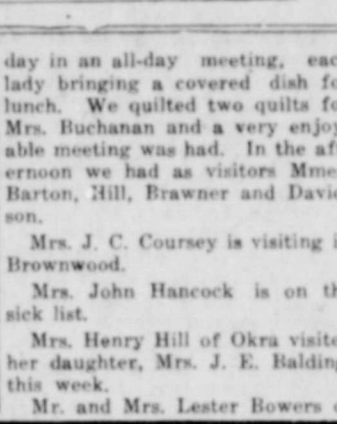
