"GASOLINE TAXES SHOULD BE LEFT TO STATES," CAPPER

Senator Arthur Capper of Kansas appears to be a level headed individual. He has introduced a bill calling for the repeal of the one cent a gallon federal gasoline tax. To be brief and obtain results he passed it on as a rider to the house revenue bill. His argument "Gasoline taxes should be left to the states." On the surface of things it is shown that the sales tax system or method of raising revenue has been left to the states by the federal government.

STATE CONTROL OF PUBLIC UTILITIES

A very important bill ran the gauntlet of its opponents and strenuous opposition in the final showdown of the special session of the Texas lawmakers. It was the adoption of a conference report on a bill to empower incorporated cities and towns to fix public utilities rates. It was adopted by both houses by a majority sufficient to put it into immediate effect if it receives the approval of Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson. An amendment adopted by the senate limiting the authority for the prescribing of maximum rates only was stricken from the bill by the conference committee.

SPEAKING OF STATE GASOLINE TAXES

Another important decision has been passed out by the supreme court of the United States. Contractors engaged on federal river and harbor improvements are subject to state gasoline taxes. The court of last resort sustained a tax of 5 cents a gallon imposed by Louisiana on gasoline brought into that state by the Trinity Farm construction company of Dallas, for use in the construction of levees along the Mississippi river.

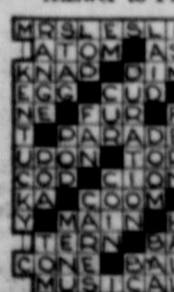

In it were numerous underlined lines and verses, especially in the Book of Genesis, where he has found what he believes to be proof that he is sole heir to the ark.

Entomologists Winning Fight Against Insects

HOUSTON.—Although unnumbered billions to one state entomologists are winning their fight against insects that destroy crops, attack livestock and carry disease. Reports made here by members of the Texas Entomological society revealed advancement on several lines against pests that have cost farmers of the southwest millions of dollars annually in products lost or damaged. Cotton wilt and root rot have been traced to their distributing medium by Dr. J. J. Taubenhau, plant pathologist of the Texas Agricultural Experiment station at College Station. Cotton wilt is positively a result of insect migration, he said, but insects have nothing to do with root rot. The pink cotton boll worm has been confined to West Texas, said Prof. W. E. Hinds of Baton Rouge, Louisiana state entomologist and a past president of the

Entomologists Centralized, the worms can be controlled to the maximum good of the southwest cotton farmers, he said.

One of the greatest victories against the insects has been in Louisiana. Hinds said, where a treatment costing about \$1 an acre has been developed to combat the sugar cane moth borer. By use of the treatment farmers have realized increased revenue of from \$15 to \$25 an acre, his report showed. Rev. G. Birkman, 80, of Huffman, is one of the oldest bug fighters in Texas. He became interested in entomology 50 years ago and has been active in that hobby in Texas for 46 years. He continued it through his service as a Lutheran minister in Lee county and during his 12 years since retirement.

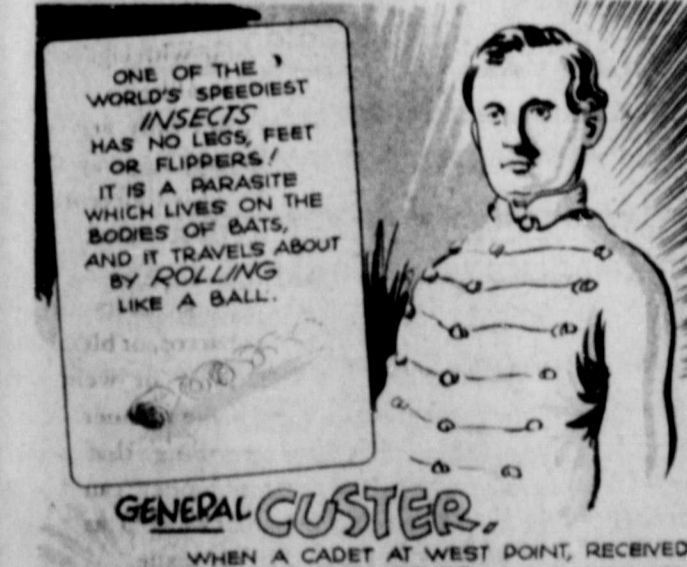

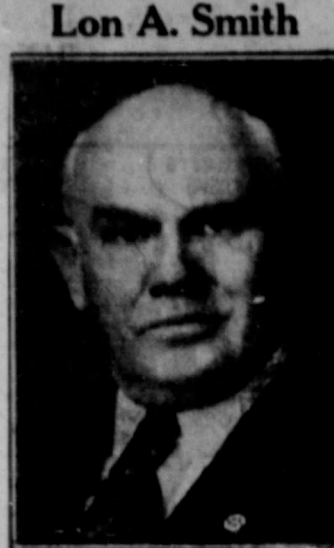

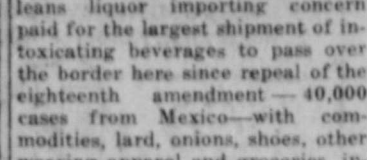
