DOY ARNOLD GIVEN SECOND DEATH PENALTY

WORK BEGINS ON THE CITY AUDITORIUM

Preliminary work on the city auditorium and gymnasium was begun this morning with seven CWA workers under the supervision of Bill Bourdeau doing the work. A large mesquite tree and a couple of smaller trees are being removed from the lot on the corner of Pine and Marston streets, where the building is to be located, and the old concrete flooring is being broken up and removed. As soon as this work is completed excavation work on the basement and foundations is to be begun. The committee appointed to make arrangements for purchase of the lot and the Revis building, across the street, which is to be razed and the material in it used in the erection of the auditorium, have reported that tentative arrangements for the two purchases have been made and the deals will probably be completed within a few days. In the meantime the work which requires little or no material is being carried on and as soon as possible additional men are to be given employment and the work rushed as quickly as possible, it was stated today.

After the meeting a conference with the Eastland county director, R. F. Cox, loan inspector, and E. R. Maxwell, secretary-treasurer of the association, will be held. The open meeting, to which all farmers interested in loans are invited, will be held at the courthouse at 7:30, and will be followed by the conference.

Oldest Citizen Is Charter Member of The Oldest Church

STEPHENVILLE, Tex.—The oldest person in Erath county is a charter member of one of the oldest churches in the county. Mrs. H. Miller, mother of Louis Miller, the late novelist, is 99 years old, and she is a charter member of the Millerville Church of Christ, an institution that is 58 years old. Only one other of the 26 charter members is living. She is Mrs. A. Giesecke. When the first Sunday in June comes, services will have been held at the church 3,016 Sundays in a row. There has not been a single interruption since the church was organized in June, 1876. The church was organized by a colony of people who moved to Erath county community from Williamson county. The group originally had come to Texas from Bates county, Missouri.

OFFICERS SAY DILLINGER IS BEING TRAPPED

PORT HURON, Mich., Mar. 16.—John Dillinger, notorious outlaw, was believed trapped in the thumb district of Michigan today. County, state and federal peace officers converged on this area immediately after Sheriff William Van Antwerp and two deputies shot and captured Herbert Youngblood, negro, who escaped from the Crown Point, Indiana, jail with Dillinger last week. Youngblood died a few minutes after his capture. As the young negro lay gasping in his hospital bed he whispered to prosecutor Telver that he had seen Dillinger and two companions last night and that Dillinger had a V-8 Ford sedan. Undersheriff Charles Cavanaugh and Deputy Lohr each shot through the abdomen in the gun battle with Youngblood, were given an even chance of recovery. Sheriff Van Antwerp's bullet wound in his arm was not considered serious. The negro attempted to resist arrest and opened fire on the officers. Sheriffs in adjoining counties were instructed to place blockades to halt the fleeing Dillinger should he still be in the area.

Texas Officers At Pistol Shoot Miss The Entire Target

HOUSTON, Tex.—Criminals may lose their respect for Texas law when word gets around about the results of a pistol shoot here at the close of the Texas Justices of Peace and Constables association convention. Two of the nine officers competing missed the target entirely at 50 feet and one of them even missed the board the target was on. All guns under .32 caliber were barred. Most of the officers used .45 automatics. Constable S. C. Cain of San Antonio won the silver trophy for the shoot with a score of 30 out of a possible 60. He beat Constable H. C. Buck of Washington after they had scored 29 in the first round.

Harness Stolen In Ranger On Thursday

Three sets of harness belonging to L. H. Flewelling and used by the trash haulers working in Ranger, were stolen from his barns Thursday night, it was reported to the police department today. Four sets of single harness were kept in the barn, it was stated today, and three of these were taken last night after the teams were unhitched for the night.

INSULL GETS ALMOST AWAY BUT IS CAUGHT

ATHENS, Mar. 16.—Samuel Insull, racing for freedom across the Mediterranean on a freighter, was overhauled by a Greek destroyer and captured off Egypt today, just as he was about to slip from the clutches of the Greek officials. The aged utilities operator was within an inch of freedom when the destroyer bore down on his ship, the Meotis, and ordered it to heave-to. The Meotis was about to enter Port Kesser, not far from Alexandria, and would have been under Greek jurisdiction. Insull was believed fleeing to Ethiopia.

Mrs. Dr. A. K. Wier Is Buried Today In Local Cemetery

Funeral services for Mrs. Ellen Wier, wife of Dr. A. K. Wier of Ranger, were conducted from the Central Baptist Church of Ranger, of which she was an active member, at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon. Rev. H. H. Stephens, pastor of the church, conducted the services, assisted by the other pastors of Ranger. Interment was in Evergreen Cemetery following the services at the church. Bro. Hamilton, who is singing at the revival at the First Baptist Church, sang a solo, "He Lives on High" at the services, which were attended by a large number of friends of the deceased. Songs by the choir included "Amazing Grace," "Asleep In Jesus," "There's a Fountain of Blood" and "Rock of Ages," all of which were favorite songs with Mrs. Wier. The decedent was born in Mason county, Mississippi, Sept. 23, 1878 and moved to Texas when four years of age. She moved to Staff with her parents 42 years ago and had been a resident of the county since that time, moving to Ranger in 1905 when she was married to Dr. A. K. Wier of Ranger. Survivors are her husband, one son Dr. D. T. Wier of St. Louis, who arrived last night for the funeral, one daughter, Miss Kenneth Wier and five brothers, all of whom were present at the time of her death. Active pall bearers were F. D. Hicks, Roy Gilbreath, E. A. Ringold, O. T. Hazard, Floyd Killingsworth, Lloyd Bruce, Wallace Wagner and C. E. May.

Three-Power Meet Considered Success

ROME, Italy, March 16.—Possibility of stability in Central Europe increased today when Italy, Austria and Hungary concluded a three-power economic agreement. The agreement will probably be signed tomorrow. It was the first fruit of Premier Mussolini's attempt at a new deal in diplomacy by direct, informal negotiations between powers.

Television Shown At Fat Stock Show

FORT WORTH, Tex.—The first real demonstration of television to be given in the Southwest is being at the Southwest Exposition and Fat Stock Show now being held here. Programs originating from the studios of a local radio station are being reproduced by television on a screen at the Manufacturers' Exhibit at the Livestock Show. The television apparatus represents about \$8,000 worth of equipment. Truett Kinsey, radio engineer who assembled it, said.

Ferguson May Be Next Committeeman

AUSTIN, March 16.—Former Gov. James E. Ferguson today declined to comment on reports a movement has been started to name him national democratic committee member from Texas. A recommendation will be made at a meeting of the state executive committee in Houston next Saturday. John Davis, of Dallas, who has been mentioned for the post, is reported to have indicated he does not wish the honor.

Army Air Chief In 'Tight Spot'

LINDBERGH IS STILL BITTER ON AIR MAIL

WASHINGTON, March 16.—Army air mail pilots were sent aloft without proper preparation or equipment, Col. Charles A. Lindbergh told a senate committee today. He explained that the army equipment is not designed for mail service. Lindbergh carried his air mail feud with the administration into the committee room with complaints the air mail contractors were convicted without trial. He told the committee that army pilots do not receive sufficient flying training and said the air corps could not carry the mails as officially as commercial operators. "The army was given 10 days to take over something the commercial operators had taken 10 years to build up," he said. "He condemned the administration air mail bill, especially the paragraph about letting of contracts involved in alleged collusion which asserts claims against the government because of cancellation of their contracts. He denounced that provision as "one of the most unjust acts I have ever seen in legislation."

Oil Code Case To The Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, March 16.—A recent decision in the United States district court for the eastern district of Texas, holding unconstitutional the NRA oil code, was appealed to the United States supreme court today by the oil administration. The appeal is based on the quashing by District Judge Randolph Bryant of indictment against several Texans for conspiracy to violate section C of the NRA act and other regulations issued under the oil code.

Hidalgo County's Most Cautious Citizen Is Found

ALAMO, Tex.—Found: Hidalgo county's most cautious citizen, C. Contreras of Alamo wins this title almost without any opposition. He arrived in San Antonio a few days ago with \$315 in cash in his pockets. Cautious Contreras told a friend he believed that was too much money to carry about on his person, even in daylight. He left the money in care of his friend. Strolling about the city, he chanced along Buena Vista street late one evening. Four men crowded Contreras closely and one of the men knocked him down with a club. They turned his pockets inside out, but found nothing. They ran before passersby could call police. Contreras returned to Alamo with a bump on his head, a wide grin on his face—and his \$315.

COMMISSION ORDERS ALL SLOT MACHINES IN CITY CLOSED OR OWNERS ARRESTED AND FINED

The Ranger City Commission, acting on complaints of a number of citizens of Ranger that children are playing slot machines, has ordered that all gambling devices of every kind in the city limits be put out of operation by the city police. The order includes marble machines where prizes of merchandise or cash are given for anyone making over a certain score, machines for which prizes are given if certain numbers are secured or if a hand stops on any indicated point or any machine of any kind operated on skill or chance where by the operator can secure a prize of any kind. Punch boards and all other lottery or gambling devices or games of chance are included in the order and the police have been advised by Judge W. S. Adamson, police commissioner, to see that they are all closed. Chief of Police Jim Ingram said today that every business establishment in the town where such machines are operating would be notified to have them removed and those who did not heed the order would be placed under arrest to appear before the city court, where they would be fined and the machines confiscated and destroyed. Vending machines which distribute peanuts, gum, stamps or music machines are not included in the order, provided only the merchandise vended by the machine can be obtained, but machines where gum or other merchandise can be obtained by depositing a coin and, under certain requirements, other prizes will be given are included in the order, it was stated today. The action was taken by the city commission because of complaints to that body by parents of children that they were playing the machines. Many of these children are given money for school lunches and instead they put their money in slot machines, the parents complained, and a spirit of gambling is being instilled in them. In speaking of the "clean-up" campaign on slot machines today, Chief Ingram stated that he had noticed in papers that similar action was being taken in many other cities and the devices which have become so popular are being destroyed. In order that no one would suffer any loss from having the machines destroyed the police were ordered to notify all business houses operating them to discontinue them immediately and those who did not comply with the request would be arrested and charges of operating a lottery in the city would be filed. The order covers only the city of Ranger and does not extend beyond the city limits, it was pointed out. The order was issued to the Chief of Police this morning by Police Commissioner Adams, but it was agreed that a little time would be allowed so that the owners might remove them before arrests are started.

Difficulties Of Tulsa Oilers Are Almost Overcome

TULSA, Okla., March 17.—The Tulsa Oilers finally have overcome a series of difficulties—mostly financial—and are ready for their second Texas League season. Manager Art Griggs hopes his team will finish at least as near the top of the heap as it was to the bottom (second) last year. As Shawnee was selected for the training camp during the week-end just ended, work on a new and real baseball park started here and a season-ticket sale campaign was making good progress. Seven pitchers, two catchers, a third baseman and two outfielders had signed contracts through March 11. The pitching staff now under signature includes Hank Thornahlen, veteran Texas leaguer with experience at Waco and Galveston, and also veteran Andy Bednar, Jim Biven and Frank Tubbs. These, with John Berger, veteran backstop, Eugene Powers, a good catcher and E. P. Conway, rookie catcher, will start workouts speedily. Salary differences with other players from last year's infield and additions thereto which have been offered jobs, are expected to be ironed out soon. Griggs' first refusal to play another season here in the old park—seven miles out and originally the center of a racetrack—almost led to loss of Texas League baseball for Tulsa, which entered the Lone Star circuit in 1931 from the Western League with Oklahoma City. But civic leaders, the civic finance corporation, even the Civil Works Administration, came to Tulsa's aid, and the crisis was passed. A minimum of 150 ten-year season tickets is being sold at \$100 each—some of them on the installment plan—to provide working funds; the Tulsa County State Fair donated a new park site; the Civil Works Administration is contributing labor in preparing the grounds. The grandstand will be started soon. The new park must be, and is expected to be, ready for use April 12 when the Chicago White Sox and Pittsburgh Pirates play an exhibition game here. The Texas League season opens a few days later, April 17, here with the Dallas Steers as guests. The new park is somewhat nearer to town and will be ideal, with equipment for night games. The pitching staff will include a heavy per centage of pitchers: Thornahlen, Jim Walkup (formerly Fort Worth, Detroit and Southern League, curve-ball only), Lefty Johns, Charlie Wood. Johns is not yet signed. Woods formerly played with Wichita (Western League). Bevin, who was with the Pittsburgh Pirates during spring training in 1932 and 1933, appears to be the ace pitching prospect here. A young right-hander, he is now Tulsa's property outright, has a mean speed ball and kept the Dallas sluggers in hand last year. His 1933 record here showed 11 games won in 40 participations, 16 complete, 23 starts, 11 finished for others. Berger is the best looking catcher. He was with Memphis several years, coming here in a transfer. In 1932 he fielded 982, caught in 100 games and hit 275. Sammy Hale, holdover third sacker, must beat out Red Rollins, newcomer from Atlanta by trade, to keep his hot corner regular position. Alex Hooks, former S. M. U. and Texas League player, has returned his first baseman's contract unassigned. Pete Monahan, Kansas City, offered a similar contract, also had not signed through March 11. No reply had come from Jim Corbin, regular second sacker. Outfielders under contract were Paul Easterling and Herb Kelly, John Stoneham and Chuck Hostetler, outfielders. Charley Montcrief and Skeet Newsome, shortstops, were still dickering. Berger was unassigned but was expected to offer no delay.

RECOVERY IS HINDERED BY LABOR STRIKES

WASHINGTON, Mar. 16.—The president's recovery program moved into heavy seas today threatened by widespread labor disturbances and opposition to a uniform 10 per cent increase in wages and reduction in hours. Indications were the president would be appealed to in an effort to avert what was described as "the worst strike the country has ever seen" in the automobile industry. The seriousness of this threatened auto strike was increased by the likelihood once started the disturbance would spread to the steel industry. The strike threat moved nearer today when the national labor board concluded a two day hearing on charges of American Federation of Labor against large car manufacturers, including General Motors and the Hudson Motor Co. The manufacturers refused to recognize or deal with the A. F. of L. and challenged the authority of the board. Sweetwater Will Close Refinery. AUSTIN, Mar. 16.—State Comptroller George Sheppard's office was notified today of the closing of the Nolting Refining Company refinery at Sweetwater. John H. Hubbard, Sweetwater, was named receiver for the company, in connection with a tax suit filed a year ago. Since then it has been operating under lease. The office was notified the lessee was giving up the lease. What further arrangements the receiver is making has not been made public. Two Arrested In Wire Theft Case. Two men were arrested Thursday in connection with the series of thefts of copper wire from the Texas Electric Service company. One of the men was arrested in Fort Worth and the other in Eastland. The arrests were made by members of Sheriff Virge Foster's office. The alleged participant in the thefts who was apprehended in Fort Worth has a previous police record, having been charged with two car thefts recently. Both of the arrested men are held in the Eastland county jail. TOYS ARE SPEEDIER. NEW YORK.—Toy automobiles for the 1934 season have been streamlined like most of their big prototypes, and also speeded up, according to advance information from the toy association. The new models are guaranteed to travel 100 feet a minute. The electric ones will travel five miles without new batteries.

JURY BRINGS IN VERDICT AT THIRD TRIAL

BAIRD, Mar. 16.—Doy Arnold, accused of beating and stabbing his wife, Zelma to death at Breckenridge, was assessed the death penalty by a jury here today. Arnold received the verdict stoically. He made no comment as he was led from the courtroom. The defense gave notice an appeal would be filed. The trial was the third undergone by Arnold. The first resulted in a verdict of guilty and a death penalty. The verdict was reversed by the court of criminal appeals. The second trial resulted in a hung jury. The case went to the jury yesterday afternoon. At 7 a. m. the jurors filed into the courtroom with their verdict. Counsel for Defense Notices Court An Appeal Will Be Filed. SAN ANTONIO, March 16.—An attempt to kidnap Harry Royster, Tulsa sportsman, star witness in the federal court trial of five accused of conspiracy relative to disposition of \$546,000 in stolen government securities, was revealed here today. Officials said Royster, also a defendant in the case, was with Deputy United States Marshal Sam James last night when the kidnap attempt was made. As Royster and James walked toward their car a man grabbed at Royster, but James seized Royster, drew his pistol and hurried the prisoner across the street. The kidnaper jumped into a car, which sped away. Larger Allowables Ordered In Texas. AUSTIN, March 16.—Larger allowables ordered today for West Texas and gulf coast oil fields, increase the state's total allowable oil production to 957,369 barrels daily. The federal allowable recommended for Texas is 947,500. The state railroad commission set West Texas' new allowable at 133,832 barrels daily, an increase of 1,450 barrels. The order was retroactive, effective March 7. After 500 Miles a Ranger Must Chase Bandits on Own Cash. AUSTIN, Tex.—Defeat of the emergency appropriation bill before the recent session of the state legislature left State Rangers with little funds for their pursuit of bandits. Under the existing appropriation a Ranger is allowed mileage for using his own automobile in his work. But he is limited to 500 miles a month. Bank robbers and bandits frequently travel that distance in a day. The Ranger pursuing them would have to stop at 500 miles or pay his own expense. If he overtook the bandits and shot it out with them he would have to pay for his own ammunition. If he should be killed the state might pay his funeral expense. Texas Exes Protest Razing Building. EL PASO, Tex.—Texas University alumni will protest the proposed razing of the main building to make way for a new structure, Coyne Milstead, El Paso alumni chapter member, said. The El Paso chapter is expected to split over the protest, he said.

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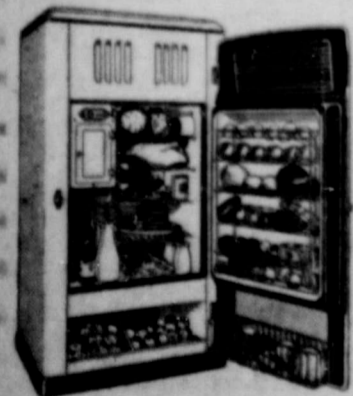

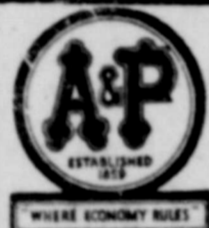

EMERGENCY CROP LOANS TO FARMERS

Farmers are interested in regulations for making emergency crop loans from a \$40,000,000 federal fund. Charles W. Sherrill is the manager of the southwestern setup serving the States of Texas, New Mexico and Arizona.

The maximum amount to any one farmer this year is \$250 and the minimum \$25. Interest rate will be 5 1/2 per cent per annum. Local emergency crop loan committee will be named within the near future.

The emergency act imposes a very severe penalty for using loans from the emergency fund for other purposes not specified in the act and its regulations. Speaking of penalties, the regulations restrict the amount that may be loaned to the tenants of any one landlord in any one county to \$500 and also restrict the amount that may be loaned per acre depending on the kind of crop being grown.

No loan will be made to any individual "who has shown lack of good faith" in repaying food and seed loans made to him in previous years. In the case of loans to renters or share croppers the landlord will have to waive his claim to the rent or share of the crop.

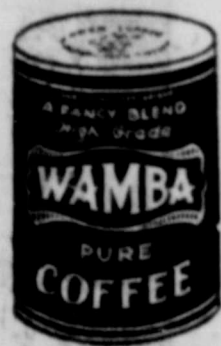

Commissioner Tells Voters How He Has Managed His Office

To the Citizens and Voters Of Commissioner's Precinct No. 1, Eastland County, Texas: After serving you as County Commissioner for about fourteen months, and as I am now asking you to support me with your influence and votes for a second term, I feel that you are justly entitled to know the financial condition of the Precinct when I took charge of its affairs, and what I have done during the first year of my first term so that you may determine for yourselves as to my qualifications to handle its business.

When I took office on January 1, 1933, I found that the budget estimate of receipts for my Precinct for the year 1933 was \$15,150.00, and that the Precinct owed approximately \$19,000.00. This debt consisted of \$12,436.67 in scrip warrants bearing interest and due on demand; \$1,999.49 in past due invoices of tin culverts; and the balance in time warrants given for road machinery, some of them due in 1933 and the others in 1934. I paid about \$9,000 on this indebtedness which left a balance of \$6,150.00 of the budget estimate to expend on building and maintaining public roads. However, the actual receipts during the year amounted to \$18,500 which increased the amount available for roads to \$8,650.00. With only this amount of available funds I could not construct new roads or make any expensive improvements on the old ones and have sufficient cash for maintenance purposes. Consequently I used this money where in my judgment it was most needed. During my term of office no deficiency warrants have been issued and none will be except in case of extreme emergency.

The budget estimate of receipts for this year (1934) is \$16,325.00. After paying the amounts due this year on these old obligations there will be an estimated balance of around \$10,000.00 for road maintenance. I hope to be able to keep the roads in a better condition this year than I did last year.

If you think I am capable of taking care of the affairs of the Precinct in a businesslike manner and to your best interests, I hope to have your support in the coming primary election.
