### CLYDE BARROW TRAIL GROWS COLD TODAY

### U. S. Launches a Grasshopper War

WASHINGTON.—An intensive campaign against grasshoppers will be launched immediately by the federal government in cooperation with eight affected states, Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace announced.

Agriculture department entomologists warned that, unless controlled, the grasshopper menace would be more serious this year than ever before. It is to prevent a threatened locust plague of proportions similar to that in Egypt of Biblical times that the campaign has been speeded up.

Congress has appropriated \$2,354,893 for the work, which Dr. J. R. Parker, chief of the entomology bureau's Bozeman, Mont., station, will direct. It is planned that each state shall have a grasshopper control committee.

Most of the appropriation will be used to supply poisoned bait to slaughter grasshoppers "sure to hatch this spring and summer from the millions of eggs left in the ground last fall," the department said. Farmers were advised to plow soil where grasshopper eggs are believed to be imbedded.

The Dakotas, Montana, Wyoming, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Nebraska and Idaho are threatened with serious grasshopper infestation, the department warned. Other states will be affected, officials said, unless adequate control measures are adopted.

### Spring Wool Sale Will Be Held On Saturday, April 21

Announcement was made today that a wool and mohair sale would be conducted in Ranger on Saturday, April 21, at the A. J. Ratliff warehouse.

A number of growers have already stored their wool and mohair and those who have not done so are urged to have it hauled to the warehouse as soon as possible, as buyers will be here on that day to make purchases.

It was pointed out that from three to four cents a pound more could be obtained where the clips were pooled and the buyers could grade and price the wool and mohair at one time than when sold in job lots. For this reason everyone who is a grower has been notified to have their product at the warehouse in time for the sale.

It is reported that several buyers would be present on Saturday, April 21 and that the entire spring clip would be sold at that time.

### Allred Opens His Campaign With An Address at Bowie

BOWIE, Texas, April 9.—Attorney General James V. Allred opened his campaign for governor here today with a call for a "new deal from a new dock."

"I am opposed to a general sales tax," he said. He declared it was a "tax on poverty." He added he will ask and aid the passage of a real graduated chain store tax. The tax question, Allred said, cannot be settled by general promises. He advocated steps to stop tax dodging so real estate tax might be lightened.

As to crime he declared "violent, lawlessness in Texas must cease. Our enforcement agencies are behind the times. He proposed modernization of law enforcement machinery with the highway patrol given general powers, establishment of a central bureau of identification.

### Ranger Man Heads County Singers

Roy Moore of Ranger was elected president of the Eastland county singing convention which met Saturday night and Sunday at Odien. Other officers elected were: Stanley Webb, Romney, vice-president; Clyde Fisher of Mangum, secretary.

The Odien meeting was one of the best and most largely attended of any meeting for a long time. The house was filled to capacity for each program and standing room in the isles and at windows outside was at a premium.

Singers were present from Calhoun, Palo Pinto, Stephens, and Comanche counties. The V. O. Stamps quartet, which included Freddie Martin and Robert Arnold, was present from Dallas. Also the noted Rippeet quartet was present.

The convention meets next with the Okra class on the second Sunday in July.

### REAL ESTATE VALUES GROW IN SOUTHWEST

Real estate, knocked out by the depression, is rapidly regaining consciousness in many of the country's major cities to cope with housing problems that range from an indicated demand for better grade homes to actual shortage of modest cottages and apartments, a United Press survey disclosed today.

Sections of the southwest, south and east, boomed by re-opened factories and government projects, reported a general thinning of vacancies.

Houston, witnessing the start of 260 new oil businesses in the past 15 months, found itself with a distinct scarcity of all types of dwellings.

### Highway Delegates Will See Famous Texas Bluebonnets

DALLAS.—Delegates to the seventh annual convention of the Broadway of America Highway association, meeting in Dallas May 8-9, will be given an opportunity to see the world famous Bluebonnets in full bloom.

The bluebonnet is the state flower of Texas. During the convention of the Broadway of America the hill sides for miles around Dallas will be covered in a blanket of blue.

There is a saying current in Texas that the bluebonnet is a home loving flower and never crosses the state line. Many legends tell of the origin of the flower, all associated with Indian lore.

One story recalls that a little Indian girl offered her doll as a sacrifice to save her tribe, from starvation. The following spring the bluebonnets bloomed from the ashes of the burnt offering.

Another recalls an Aztec maiden who offered her life as an atonement for the sins of her people. As she was led to the altar, her blue headdress fell to the ground, and the Great Spirit, in compassion for her sacrifice, caused thousands of flowers to bloom in commemoration of her sacrifice.

Texas has found that blooming bluebonnets are a great tourist lure. During the season when the flower is in full bloom, thousands of tourists visit the state to see this unusual wild flower.

### MANY PLANTS THREATENED SHUTDOWNS

Hudson Company Closes Its Doors Because of Strike At Parts Company.

Discontented industrial labor presented an ominous threat today against efforts at harmonious relations between workers and employers.

Union automobile workers charged the automobile labor board, set up by the president, was not enforcing terms of a truce which halted a threatened strike recently, while 18,000 mechanics in 62 plants threatened to strike Thursday night unless granted increased wages and decreased hours.

At the Motor Products Corporation plant at Detroit, where 5,600 men are on strike, union officials rejected a labor board compromise. Nearly 1,000 workers of the Detroit, Mich., Stove Co., struck today.

Business men of Haverhill, Mass., organized a vigilance committee to combat "communism" in ranks of 6,000 shoe workers who began the sixth week of a strike.

In Illinois more than 1,000 upholsterers picketed plants while representatives prepared to press their demands for higher wages.

Strike of 4,600 workers in the Nash Motor Company and the Seaman Body Company plant in Milwaukee and Kenosha, Wis., continued after employer rejected a settlement suggested.

All production in the Hudson Motor Car Co., was ordered halted at 1 p. m. today due to shortage of necessary parts resulting from a strike at the Motor Products Corporation. The order threw 18,000 temporarily out of work.

### "Red Plot" Inquiry Questions Made

WASHINGTON, April 9.—A "red plot" estechism directed at Dr. William Wirt, Gary, Ind., school superintendent, was submitted today to the house investigating committee before which the educator is to appear in 24 hours to name communist members of the Roosevelt brain trust.

Representative George Foukes, Democrat, Michigan, leader of the House anti-Wirt bloc, drafted 10 questions to be asked Wirt. One is "Are you directly or indirectly in the pay of the steel trust?" Another refers to Wirt's educational activities in New York City.

### Eastland Men's Sister Is Dead

Mrs. Bula Bishop Haynes died at Hamilton at 5:00 a. m. Monday. Mrs. Haynes formerly resided at Okra and taught school in this vicinity. She was well known in county educational circles.

### SCHOOL CANDIDATE SHOT

cratic national committee and the New York state central committee.

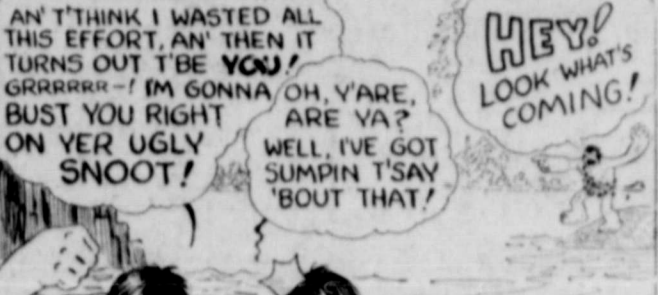

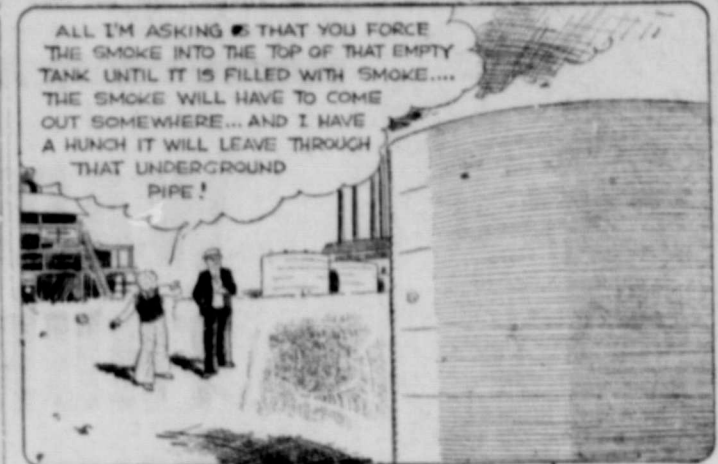
