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#### F. D. R. PROMISES NATIONAL PLANNING ON THE WAY

President Franklin Delano Roosevelt is facing the future. As ever he has taken the American people into his confidence. He sounded the warning that national planning "rather than legislative panaceas was the way forward." He smiled when he said it in an address to a group of the leaders behind the subsistence home program. He admitted he had little faith in legislative panaceas "advo-"cated as able to correct everything in 30 days." This was his advice not only to the leaders but to the American people: "By using gray matter, brain trust or otherwise, we can discover a lot of new things we can do. We want evolution. When you hear talk of revolution there is one letter too many in the word."

Bernard M. Baruch, known for years as a New York financier and economist, was on the platform when FDR met with the men and women who are carrying out the \$25,000,000 program "to provide homes and subsistence for persons stranded in industrial areas." The New Deal President said that national surveys had shown the population was out of balance, but he was emphatic in his words when he assured the American people "there would be no regimentation or transplanting of population by force."

Moreover, he said the aim of the administration was "to afford opportunity for those who wanted to help themselves." Those who do not want to help themselves in the American world should be called out of their trance and advised to march forward as their ancestors marched in all the great crises of American history.

#### **BROWNSVILLE SHIP CHANNEL PROJECT** ON THE WAY

Brownsville citizens have let it be known that the ship channel is on the way. Condemnation proceedings have been instituted in the federal district court by the United States government to secure right-of-way through two tracts of land for the project. Court proceedings were necessary in the case of the two tracts because the boundaries and titles are in dispute. In the not distant future Brownsville in the county of Cameron, nestling on the banks of the Rio Grande river, will be listed among the ports of the Gulf of Mexico. 

### **Detroit Plans Test** For New Street Lighting System

DETROIT, Mich .- Whether Deoit should be the medium for the test of a new form of highway lighting will be decided here short-ly, the public lighting commission as announced.

Sodium-vapor lamps, a comparatively new development, may be used for the test, both for street safety zone illumination. ouis J. Schrenk, superintendent, said these lamps never have been used here, but have been tried successfully in the east and in

"I have no doubt but that these sodium vapor lamps are the lamps of the future as far as lighting of highways and outlying sections are concerned," Schrenk said. "They are non chromatic and make for greater visibility by con-trast—light colors become lighter and dark ones become darker.

"These lamps could be used about everywhere except in cases where it is necessary to distin-guish colors. They would not be successful in a commercial area where show windows have articles of various colors, but they could be

The new lamps still are too expensive for widespread use, because their manufacturers have not begun making them on a pro-duction basis, Schrenk said.

According to Schrenk, the new amp now costs four times as much as an incandescent lamp, lasts for a shorter period, but con-sumes only about half the electric power. It produces a golden-orange glow with comparatively little


PHILADELPHIA-A "battle to the finish" against segregation of Negroes is urged by John Francis Williams, president of a Negro law club here.

ROME.-The room where the new Saint Giovanni Bosco, the founder of the Salesian Order, lived when here, is to be transformed into a chapel. The room forms part of the church of the Sacred Heart in Via Marsala, and the Chapel, which will take its place, will form a reliquary of the personal memories of Don Bosco.

The Church of the Sacred Heart in Via Marsala was founded by Don Bosco, and built according to the design of the architect Vespignani. The church, which was constructed with money gathered almost entirely through Don Bosco's efforts, was only consecrated and opened to public service a lit tle while before the saint's death.

Rome has a number of chapels, or sanctuaries, which were formerly rooms occupied by saints. Among them may be mentioned the rooms once occupied by St. Philip Neri at the Church of Santa Maria Vallicella and the room at the Church of Jesus wheer St. Ignatius, the founder of the Jesuits once lived.
