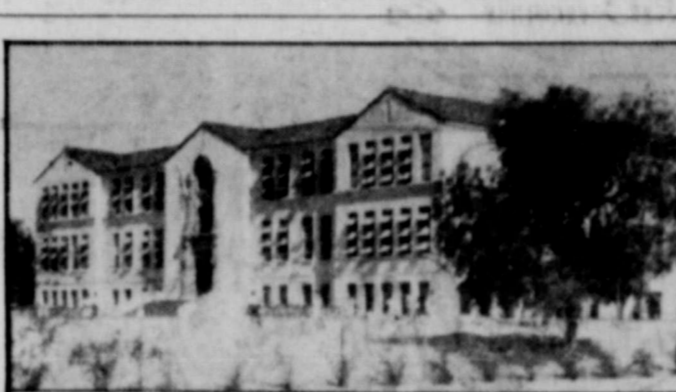

Spanish War Vets To Meet May 6th At Brownwood

BROWNWOOD, Texas, May 2. The thirty-fourth annual encampment of the United Spanish War Veterans will be held in this city May 6, 7 and 8.

Chief Justice C. M. Cureton of Texas, member of the national legislative committee, will attend, as will Chief Justice Edward S. Matthews of the supreme court of Ohio. John C. Foley, department commander of the department of Arkansas will also attend. Dr. Luke B. Stephens of Paris will be here to hold the annual banquet of the Texas Roosevelt Rough Riders. Senator J. W. E. H. Beck of De-

partment of the United Spanish War Veterans will be held in this city May 6, 7 and 8. The largest attendance in the history of the department of Texas is anticipated according to reports from Department Commander Wayne C. Shearer of Sherman, who has informed the local committee of Joe Wheeler Camp that Commander in Chief William A. Armstrong of Racine, Wis., will attend the meeting.

Kalb and Senator W. E. Thomson of Nacogdoches are other distinguished veterans who will be in attendance. The remnant of the famous Thirty-third Volunteer Infantry that captured Aguinaldo will hold their annual banquet. Also the Twenty-third, Twenty-eighth, Forty-fourth and Forty-fourth Infantry, all classed as Texas regiments, will meet again, besides the First, Second, Third and Fourth Texas Infantries and the First Texas Cavalry of 1898 will hold annual banquets. The Thirty-third Infantry was commanded by the late Col. Luther Hare of Sherman, and the regiment is commonly referred to as the "Fighting Thirty-third," which, in some manner, was engaged in practically all of the major engagements in the Philippines, as was also the Twenty-third. Judge Edward Marsh of Eldorado, Ark., will be another distinguished visitor, and many others.

Saints Room to Be Made Into Chapel

ROME.—The room where the new Saint Giovanni Bosco, the founder of the Salesian Order, lived when here, is to be transformed into a chapel. The room forms part of the church of the Sacred Heart in Via Marsala, and the Chapel, which will take its place, will form a reliquary of the personal memories of Don Bosco.

The Church of the Sacred Heart in Via Marsala was founded by Don Bosco, and built according to the design of the architect Vesputiani. The church, which was constructed with money gathered almost entirely through Don Bosco's efforts, was only consecrated and opened to public service a little while before the saint's death.

Rome has a number of chapels, or sanctuaries, which were formerly rooms occupied by saints. Among them may be mentioned the rooms once occupied by St. Philip Neri at the Church of Santa Maria Vallicella and the room at the Church of Jesus where St. Ignatius, the founder of the Jesuits, once lived.

Crosswise Grave Is Always Well Kept

STEPHENVILLE.—A grave, the mound of which is north and south, is well kept in the Duffau cemetery, the oldest burial ground in Erath county. The crosswise grave is an old one, but it was worked and kept in good shape along with more recent graves because of the incident that caused it to be turned the wrong way.

Shortly before the man who occupies the grave died, he requested that his head be turned north instead of west when he was buried, explaining that he always had been crosswise with the world and that he thought it appropriate to be buried that way. So his head was turned north; and his grave, although unmarked by a tomb, is well taken care of.
