CALIFORNIA FARMERS TURN TO FLAX SEED

A dispatch from Los Angeles reports that California farers have found that flax seed will yield about the same as half a bale of cotton to the acre, and they are said to be going to it in droves to make up for acreage reduction along other lines, chiefly on irrigated land formerly planted to truck crops and alfalfa. Imperial Valley farmers harvested only 300 acres of flax last spring. This spring they are harvesting 11,500 acres and this fall they expect to plant 60,000 acres. The yield runs around 20 bushels to the acre, and the present price is around \$1.70 per bushel. California mills last year used 425,000 to 500,000 bushels of flax seed-"imported flax seed." This year the home crop now being harvested will yield enough to supply about half the California demand and still give enough planting seed to care for the more than quadrupled acreage planned for next fall. In normal times the United States crushes about 40,000,000 bushels of flax seed, "only half of which is grown in the United States." A code of fair competition for the linseed oil industry, for which flax seed is the principal raw material, became effective April 30-this year.




