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**NOTED LAWYER AND BANKER JOINS VAST MAJORITY**

One of the closest personal and political friends of James Stephen Hogg has passed out of the picture. M. H. Gossett closed his eyes in the sleep eternal in the city of Dallas. He was 75. He was born in Cherokee county in the piney woods. He was educated in the public schools. He studied law in the office of two of the prominent lawyers of Kaufman county. He practiced law. He became a large landowner and banker. He had a flair for politics. He served two terms in the Hogg legislature. He was one of the most enthusiastic and loyal supporters of the great commoner. He was the co-author of the Texas alien land law. He backed to a successful finish the stock and bond laws. He moved to Dallas in 1906. He was one of the organizers of one of the first Texas life insurance companies. He was the first president of the federal land bank of Houston, which is a reminder that this federal land bank of Houston has been the most successful of all the 12 land banks established by the Wilson administration. He served as head of the Houston financial institution until 1934.

In many ways Mr. Gossett was a very remarkable man. He was modest and soft spoken. He was a success as a lawyer, a lawmaker, a banker and a farmer, but the two ambitions nearest and dearest to his heart were never fulfilled. First, he had hoped to wield the gavel as speaker of the state house of representatives. He was certain of victory, but the balloting came and he lost the honor. Next, he aspired to a seat in the federal house of representatives from the old Dallas district. This was in convention days. He had a fair and square majority of all the delegates but the smooth politicians stepped in and the prize was given to Robert Emmett Burke, for many years a district judge in the county of Dallas. M. H. Gossett was able, he was honest, he was clean, he was loyal to commonwealth and country and his friends were legion throughout the entire southwest—speaking of bygone days and periods of Texas history.

We read a lot of ancient history. Not that ancient history is not interesting, but too many on the payroll are taking up too much time talking ancient history. But I imagine the average taxpayer is supposed to foot the bills and listen and admire.
