### At Houston Grow

HOUSTON .- Tonnage over the Houston ship channel in April was the heaviest ever recorded in a single previous month since the port was built 19 years ago as a deep water terminal, Port Director Russell Wait reported.

The movement totaled 1,664,-674 tons, Wait said. Largest previous month was January of this year when a new high tonnage record was set at 1,625,527 tons. A total of 448 ships plied the water during the month of April, Wait said. Only 365 moved on the channel in April a year ago.

Ocean-going tonnage last month amounted to 1,541,134 tons, approximately 30 per cent more than was handled the same date a year

The hospital will have a capacity of 1,157 beds-more hospital beds for negro tuberculars than there are now devoted to that purpose in the United States.

The building also provides for the future for 600 more beds. The site of the sanatorium is

about eight miles north of El Paso. The building will depict a Moorish influence in Spanish architectures, and when completed will resemble an old Spanish feudal estate. There will be provision for about 27 units.



#### Court Decides a Banker Was Slain Twelve Years Ago

EL PASO .- Warren C. Spurgin, Chicago, Ill., banker, who disappeared 14 years ago when the Michigan Avenue Trust company closed, was slain near Canutillo, Durango, Mex., in February, 1922, a federal district court jury at Santa Fe, N. M., decided.

You can bake quick cookies You can bake quick cookies three different ways. One short-cut method is to shape the dough into a roll, chill it thoroughly and slice it with a sharp knife. These are known as ice-box cookies and if you are particular about neat shapes you can get the cookie molds and chill the dough ready to slice in the molds.
