The jury will be struck from a regular civil panel in District Judge Charles Wheeler's court. Two thirds of the panel are from rural communities without gas service. Others reside in Austin, which is not served by the Lone Star company.

They are about ready to recognize that there is more for them in a faithful and efficient administration of their government than there is in vain promises of material receipts or donations from their government. As stated by one of the leading newspapers of the state, "The announcements made so far by candidates for important office in Texas—with the exception of James V. Allred's announcement—consists of mouthings of issues worn shabby by endless reiteration on the Texas stump, and honored more in the breach than the observance by candidates after they get into office."

James V. Allred is making three speeches in Eastland county during next week. He will speak in Ranger Tuesday night, Eastland Wednesday at four o'clock p. m., and in Cisco Wednesday night. Frank Sparks is busy making arrangements for Mr. Allred's visit to the county, and urges the entire citizenship to hear Mr. Allred, at one or more of the above speaking engagements. "James V. Allred is campaigning with the same energy and thoroughness which has characterized his work as Attorney General," says Mr. Sparks, "and if elected Governor I believe he will in a comparative degree match our energetic President, Mr. Roosevelt, in 'doing things'—a new deal in Texas, from a new deck, and new dealers in the game" is a slogan pleasing to the average man and woman who is interested in the welfare of Texas.

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PASSING OF FREDERIC TAYLOR CONNERLY

Frederic Taylor Connerly has passed on to his reward. He was the clerk of the supreme court of Texas for many years. Indeed, he had served since 1888. He had as wide a list of acquaintances as any citizen of Texas. He was known to thousands of lawyers, who are living or dead. He knew all the public men in the life of the southwest for decades. He was prominent in various avenues of endeavor, speak of the social and political and fraternal life of the Friendly City. He was one of the noted sportsmen of the Southwest. He was a hunter, a fisherman, a golfer and a crack shot. This fame as a sportsman was nationwide in days gone by. He knew the history of Texas as well as the biographies of its earliest and greatest sons—all down the line. He was popular, he was lovable, he was patriotic and he was ever a man of his word.

Born in Alabama, Connerly was brought to Texas by his parents at the age of 14. He was educated in Texas. His active life was spent in Texas. His achievements were registered in Texas. He was only 19 when he received his first job in the office of clerk of the supreme court and when the messenger of death called him he had served 46 years of continuous service in that office under the big dome of the Texas capitol. His family will mourn him; his friends will mourn him; the bar of the state will mourn him; his associates will mourn him for the very good reason that when he closed his eyes the soul of a real man with the human touch has crossed the borderline to his maker in that world invisible.

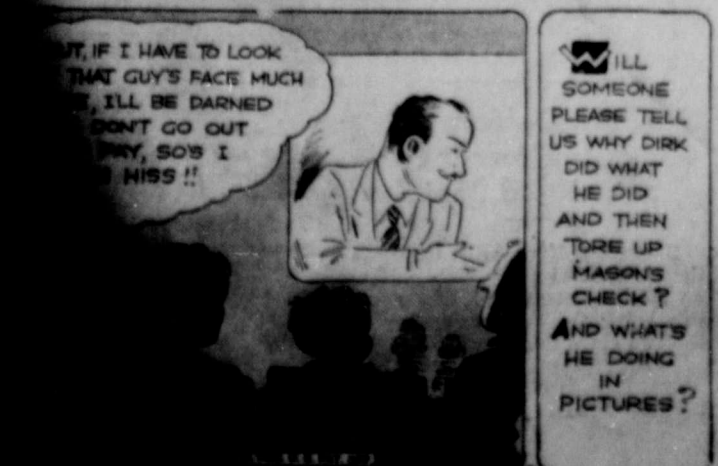
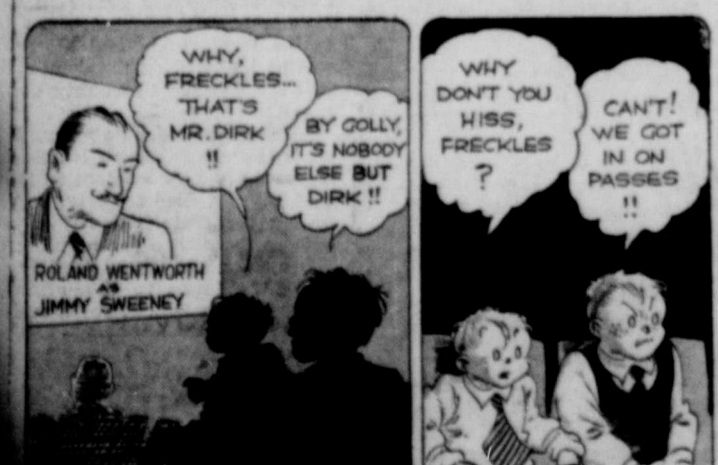
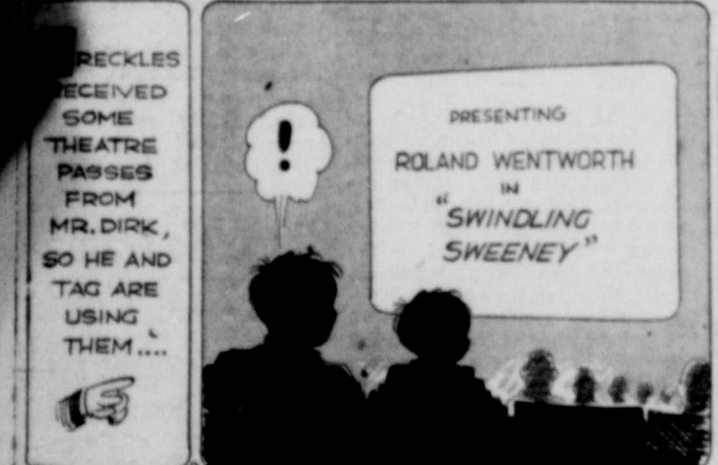

Scrubbing Boards Best Dirt Removers

PENNSYLVANIA COLLEGE, Pa. — The old-fashioned scrubbing board still sends the whitest shirts to the clothes line in the back yard. Penn State co-eds found in the study of home economics.

Ironically, the result of the investigation was reported by Dr. Pauline Berry Black at the annual convention of the Pennsylvania Laundryowners association.

The scrubbing board method took out 77 per cent of the dirt in shirts, it was found, but the texture of the cloth suffered severely, its strength being reduced 27.8 per cent in 50 washings.

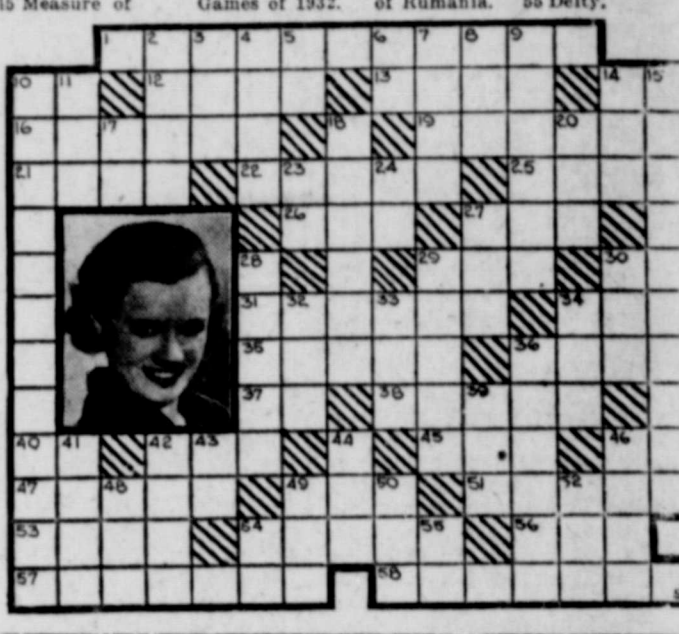
Each shirt was scrubbed 50 times, 15 minutes each time, to reach the average for dirt removed.

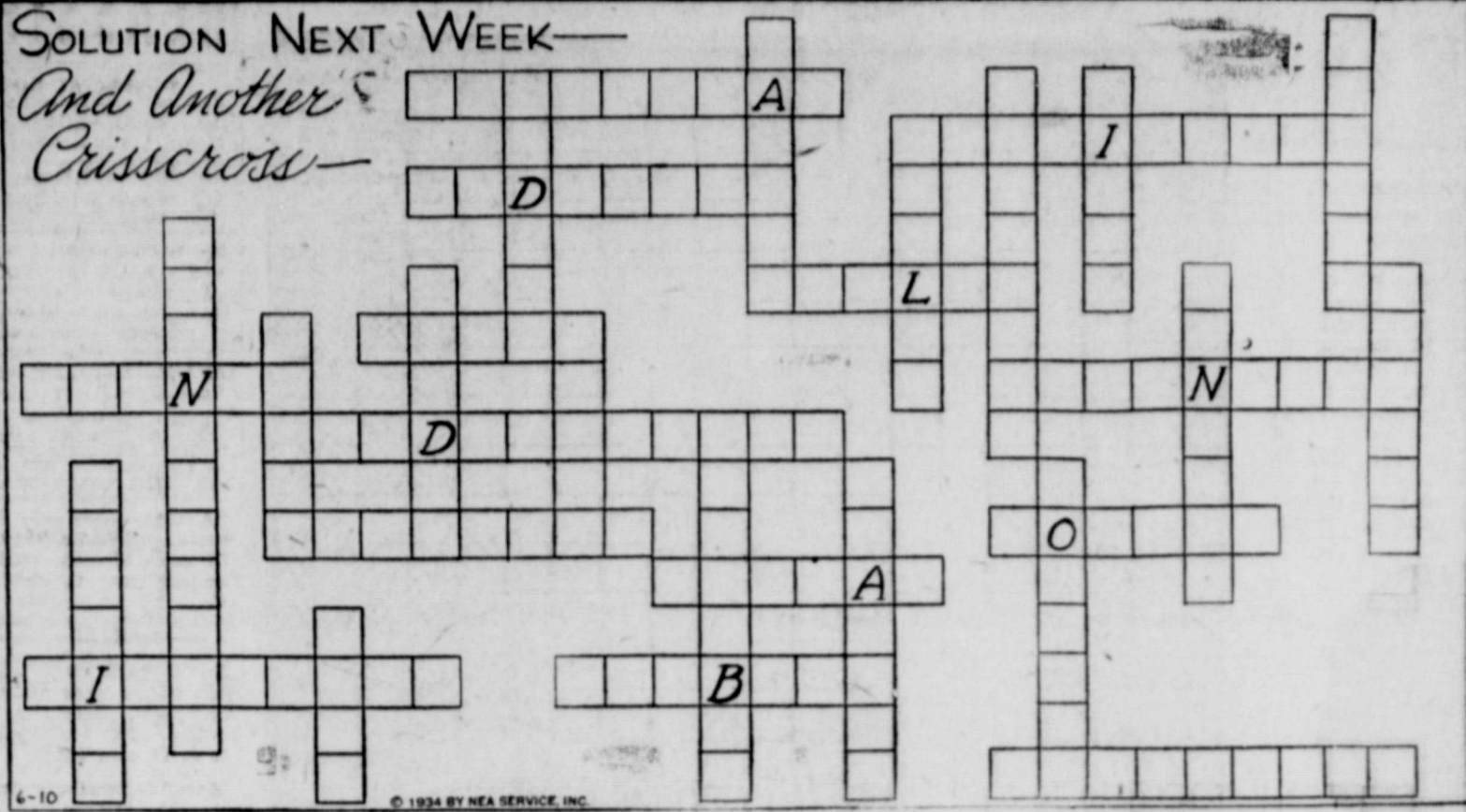
