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TAX BILL OF THE GASOLINE INDUSTRY

Director Baird H. Markham of the American Petroleum Industries committee in his recent report stresses that "gasoline bootlegging and tax evasion constitute a growing menace." He asserted that gasoline taxes alone have made motor vehicle operating costs so expensive in some sections of the United States that "there has been for two years a drastic and discouraging decline in the registration and use of motor vehicles." Readers are reminded that Texas leads all the rest as a petroleum producing state, that there is a \$2,000,000,000 investment, that the output of gasoline in the refineries of Texas is shipped to all other states and foreign countries. They are reminded that this is the natural treasure wealth of the commonwealth, that it was passed on to the commonwealth by the early pioneers and the founders of the republic when they changed to statehood and retained absolute control of the public lands of the new empire state domain.

They were home rulers, those early pioneers and Texans. They were for local self-government. They believed that the people wre the sourc of all power and not the top lords at the head of the federal government.

As for the Markham report it reveals that the average retail price for gasoline in 1933 was 12.4 cents per gallon; one-half the price of 15 years ago; but a rise of five and one-third cents a gallon in taxes not only has offset much of this reduction but "has prevented the consumer from getting the benefit of the lower cost." In 1919, the first year the gasoline tax was levied, the average tax rate was slightly more than one twentieth of one cent per gallon, while last year it was 90 times as much, or 5.4 cents a gallon. Director Markham states in his report that history reveals that a sales tax of more than 10 per cent is the highest that satisfactorily can be imposed and fully collected, and it is his viewpoint that the only possible method of ending the evils arising from high gasoline taxation and diversion is to reduce rates to a level which makes tax evasion unprofitable. A vast sum of money was diverted from the gasoline revenues originally intended for the construction of American highways and their maintenance. Indeed, the original purpose of the tax in Texas and elsewhere was to provide revenues for the construction, improvement and maintenance of public roads.

Texans pay \$100,000,000 annually to the makers of things-the manufacturers of the industrial states of the North and the East. Now their chief industry, oil, is being taxed more than the traffic will bear. What will happen to the people of Texas as well as the more than 1,-000,000 given employment in the petroleum industry should the federal government assume absolute control of this treasure wealth of the empire commonwealth?

What will happen to the million little fellows?

What will happen to the thousands of farmers who may have oil and gas beneath the surface of their hold-

What will happen to the army of wildcat drillersthe most daring of all the advance guard of scouts and prospectors and capitalists-who are directly connected with the industry?

Is it to be home rule along constitutional lines in this republic-commonwealth of Stephen F. Austin and Sam Houston or complete control of the greatest of industries lodged in the person of a federal official at the top of the government on the banks of the potomac river?


