Plainview Bond Election Carries

Balloting on two bond issues Friday by Plainview citizens resulted in their favoring a \$100,000 issue, by an overwhelming majority, for the purpose of constructing an air field and street paving.

For the \$50,000 airport bonds the vote stood at 781 for and 49 against. The issue for paving of residential streets was favored 771 to 59. Observers declared that it was as near unanimous as could be expected.

Next move will come from the county. Hale county proposes to call an election on a \$125,000 bond issue for improving of the airport. A petition must be presented to the commissioners court ordering the election.

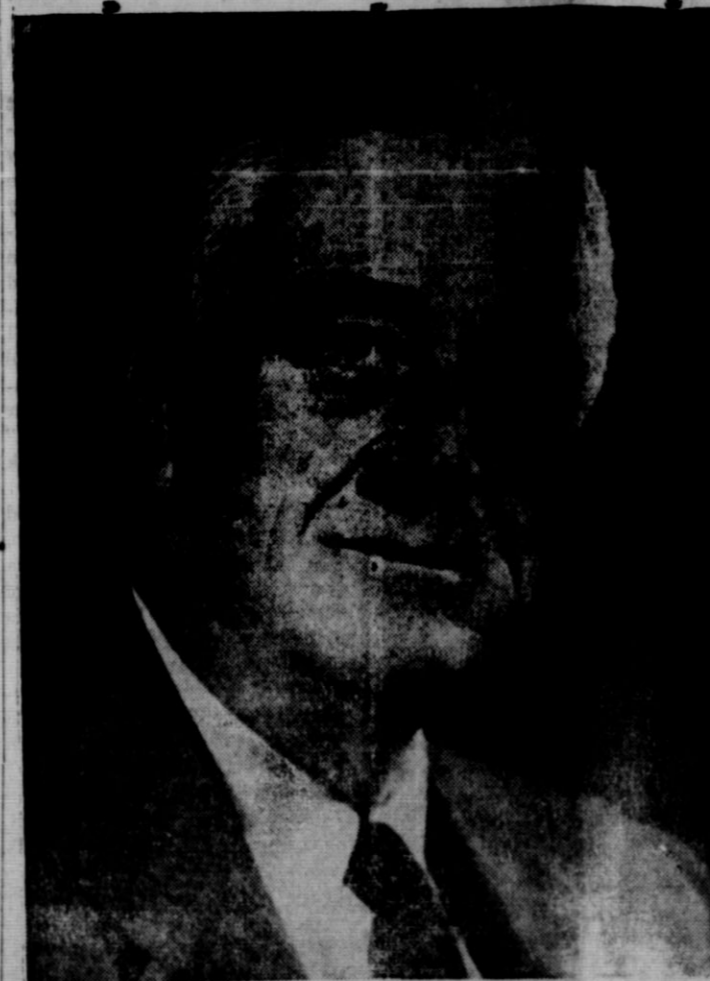

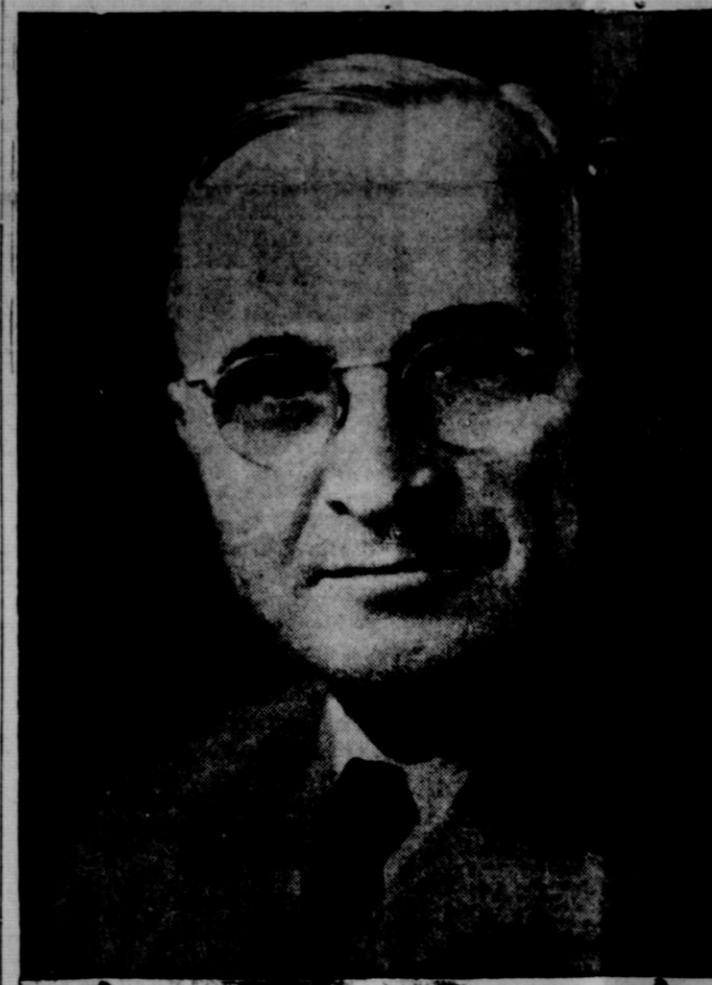

ELECTORIAL VOTE LANDSLIDE RETURNS DEMOCRATS TO POWER

With probably the largest vote in the history of the nation being cast Tuesday President Roosevelt was swept back into the Presidency for a fourth term with a vast majority of electoral votes. At the last report late today, the Democratic ticket—President Roosevelt and Senator Truman—were on the crest of a tide of 432 electoral votes to the Republican candidates—Governors Dewey and Bricker—99 electoral votes. The Democrats large lead in electoral votes was gained through a much smaller, well distributed percentage, in popular votes.

Castro county polled a large vote to give the Democrats 838 votes; Republicans 222; Texas Regulars 143; Socialists 0; Prohibitionists 2; enson 1013 to his Republican opponent, Peasley, 90. For Congressmen of the 18th District Worley received 1075 to Bybes 90.

Although all three Amendments to the State Constitution carried in Texas, Castro county voters voted no on the first two, pension amendments, and favored the last one, for empowering county commissioners courts to re-allocate county funds to the best advantage of local needs.

Soil Conservation News

Have you ever thought of your farm in terms of some areas being better adapted for certain uses? Despite the seeming uniformity of land in this area, few farms are uniform in soil, slope, and amount of erosion present.

For convenience in classifying different areas throughout the nation the following classes of land have been adopted:

Class I: Land suitable for cultivation on which no erosion is in evidence and which requires no attention to prevent wind or water erosion.

This class of land is not recognized in Castro county because of danger of wind erosion.

Class II: Land suitable for cultivation, on which erosion has been slight and a minimum of attention is necessary to prevent water erosion. Wind erosion must be controlled by some means every spring. A good vegetative cover is most efficient.

With few exceptions this includes the deep smooth soils having little slope. A notable exception to this is the flat areas sometimes found immediately above lakes. They have a dark gray color and bubble profusely when tested with acid.

Class III: Land suitable for cultivation but which needs special attention to prevent erosion.

This land is deep, has a slope ranging from 1 ft. to 3 ft. per hundred, and if it has been in cultivation several years usually has started gullying. In many cases this land is the steeper slope at the foot of the long gentle slope. Water erosion here is a problem

Milk-Maid Desserts Easy on Sugar Ration

TEMPTING to the eye and pleasing to the palate, milk-made desserts can be easy on the sugar ration and kind to the budget. That's the practical tip to home-makers given by Alice M. Cooley, director of home economics of the National Dairy Council in nationally circulated Capper's Farmer.

Try orange custard sauce on gingerbread squares. Replace 3 tbsp. of each cup of milk in custard with 1 1/2 tsp. orange juice and 1/2 tsp. grated orange rind. Serve chilled.

Spread chocolate pudding between sponge cake layers. Blit custard with sugar over paper dolly step cake. Lift dolly carefully.

"Prepare packaged cake and gingerbread mixes; try toppings of custards or fruit sauces. Add milk to packaged puddings; cook and serve chilled in pies or between layers of cake.
