In 1934 states rights means a broad basis of happiness for 6,000,000 people. It concerns an economic question and not the right of secession of a state or the defense of chattel slavery. It covers the right to divide between Mississippi commonwealth. husband and wife community property not only in connection with the division of possessions but the division of income in the payment of taxes.

It also involves such questions as high tariffs and low tariffs. 
