MAYOR McNAIR OF PITTSBURGH A MAN OF NERVE

Mayor William N. McNair of the important industrial City of Pittsburgh is a long time reformer and single taxer. He swept the Mellon crowd out of office months and months ago in their vast stronghold of roganized republicanism and a machine that was said to have been unbeaten for 40 years. Labor and all people who believe in good government elected McNair. Well, he believes in law and order. He applied the term "anarchy" to the San Francisco strike of dock workers. He called upon all of Pittsburgh's 6500 city employes who are union members "to quit their labor organizations." More than 1300 of the employes belong to labor unions—among them approximately 850 firemen.

McNair is a man of brains as well as a man of remarkable courage. He suggested that such action as he outlined would check any possible threat of disturbances "such as has occurred in strike-ridden cities." There is a vast public and this public believes in law and order and does not take kindly to strikes or lockouts or boycotts. This American public believes in arbitration. Mayor McNair may go down in defeat should he offer for re-election but he has set the pace for his brother mayors in the great industrial centers of America which include the seaport cities of the nation as well as the manufacturing centers.

Collective bargaining is here. It is the order of the day. Arbitration should take the place of strikes and boycotts and lockouts and all men who believe in the future of America, employers or employes, should accept the gospel advice of that apostle who said "Come let us reason together."

Border Patrol May Work with Mexico

JUAREZ, Mex.—Leopoldo Verdugo, customs collector, has devised a plan to divide border patrol work between Mexican and American officers to reduce smuggling and border killings. Verdugo suggested that Mexican and American customs officials reach an agreement on dividing the work to provide more vigilance along the Rio Grande. At present, patrols on both sides of the river often guard the same sections, while other sections go unguarded. He suggested that American officers guard one section, while Mexican officers guard another.

Bankruptcies Filed Show Big Decrease

HOUSTON.—Bankruptcies filed during the past fiscal year in the southern district of Texas were only half the number filed during preceding years, according to the federal district clerk's annual report filed to the attorney general. Between July 1, 1933, and July 1, 1934, there were 134 bankruptcies filed in Houston, Galveston, Laredo, Corpus Christi, Victoria, and Brownsville. During the preceding year there were 270 cases filed.

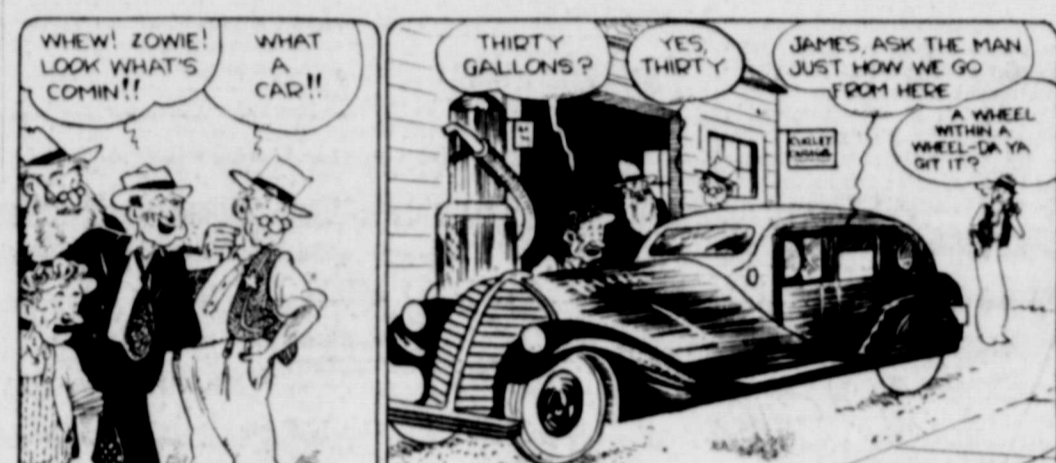
