Indians Friend Has Quit at 70

VANCOUVER, B. C.—Dr. Vernon Ardagh, 70, known throughout Northern British Columbia as "Old Doc," who went to school with

Rudyard Kipling, will spend the rest of days in the Old Man's home here.

Dr. Ardagh, who qualified in Edinburgh Medical school in 1885, has been the confidant and adviser of the northern Indians for the past 44 years.

Born in Jurungabad, India, Dr. Ardagh was a pupil of Westward Ho school in Devonshire with Rudyard Kipling, who was nick-named "Ginglamps" because he wore glasses.

Following graduation, Dr. Ardagh went to British East Africa, now Kenya colony, where he was sent by the Church of England Mission society. He was invaded home after a year and a half with malaria.

British Columbia was selected by the society for the young doctor's next field, and he arrived at the Indian village of Metlakatla in 1889, where two years later he established the first hospital in that territory.

The air-filled tires were said to have been much easier on both tractor and driver because of smoother riding and easier steering. They also operated in high or intermediate work that steel wheeled tractors could perform only in low. This meant higher average speed and lower gasoline consumption.



### Texas Rice Crop to Be Investigated

 BEAUMONT, Tex.—Charles G. Miller, chief of the rice section of the AAA, is scheduled to arrive here within the next three weeks to make an inspection of the rice crops and industry in Texas.

The rice section chief has already surveyed rice fields in Louisiana.

Miller's study was begun after Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace issued a proclamation in which he declared that a surplus of rice exists and recommended to the ERA the purchase of 200,000 pockets of 100 pounds each for relief purposes.

Another matter which called Miller to this section of the country is in connection with the new grading system of the product. All rice, under the new government setup, is to be graded throughout the states of Louisiana, Arkansas and Texas, before it is sold to the mills.

Some delay in declaring a surplus of rice was caused by the sharp upturn in rice exports, growers said. Exports of rice from the United States during June were doubled in comparison with the previous month, and ex-

ended by about 20 per cent the monthly average of exports for the first five months of 1934.

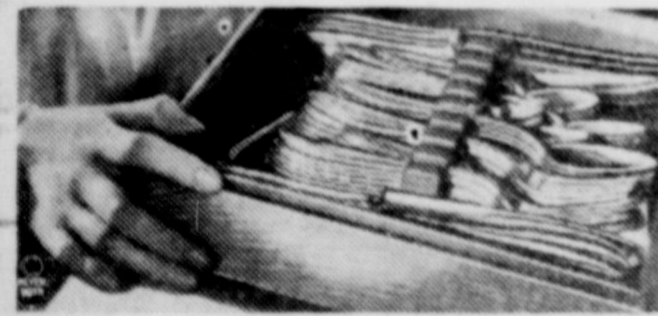

### "Buster" Disproves Red Fox Theory

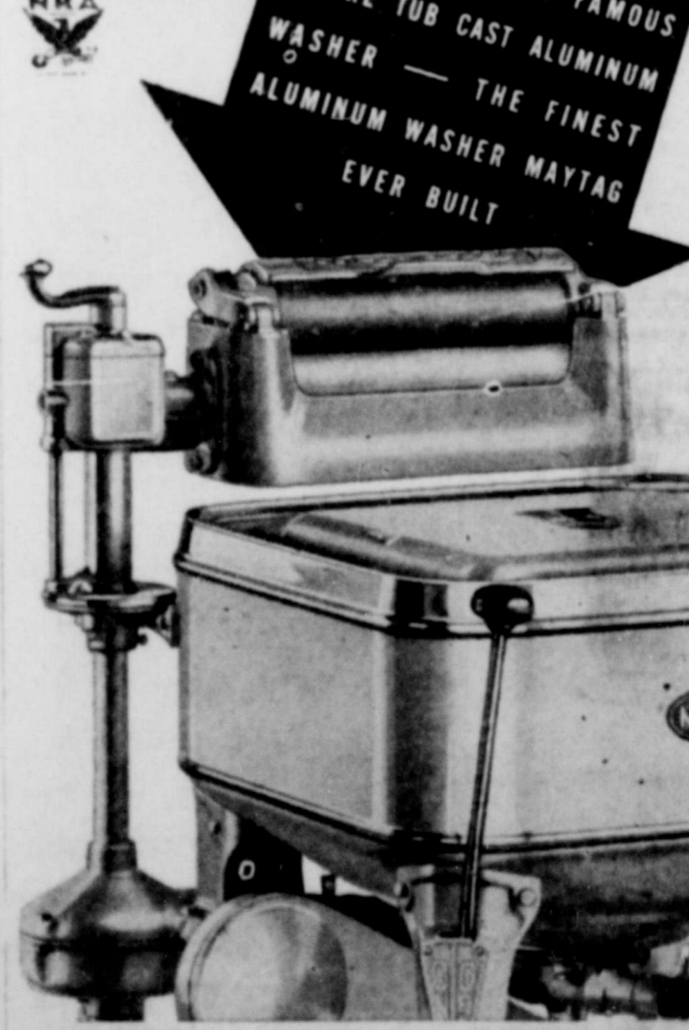
TRAVERSE CITY, Mich.—An idea that all red foxes are killers and surly brutes has been disproved by "Buster," a pet fox in the local zoo.

### Legislators Will Have Many Bills At Special Session

AUSTIN.—University of Texas professors will not visit the special session of the state legislature, except as spectators. The university regents have approved a faculty code that prohibits the professors discussing university affairs with the members of the legislature. The code was drafted by the faculty members themselves, and submitted to the regents. Under it President H. Y. Benedict is the official authorized to place the university's affairs before the legislature. The code specifically prohibits promotion by an individual of his own advancement or that of his department of the university. There will be a vacant seat in the state senate when it convenes Aug. 27. Senator Gus Russek,

Schulenburg, recently received a federal sentence on a charge of violating federal banking regulations. The district for which he is senator includes Fayette, Lavaca, Colorado, Austin and Waller counties.

Augustine Celaya, Brownsville, is one member of the legislature who thinks that providing additional relief money is not the most important thing that will confront the special session. "Devising means to get people off the relief rolls is the prime need," said Celaya. Fatalities which occurred when tons of canned foods were precipitated on the heads of relief workers by a floor collapse at the Austin cannery centered attention on the inability of relief administrators to provide compensation for such accidents. Industrial accident insurance has been proposed. It was found that federal relief funds may not be used to pay insurance premiums. Search showed that the state relief act also made it unlawful to use state funds for insurance premiums. A similar ruling was made when Tarrant county administrators asked for authority to insure equipment being used in relief employment. The week beginning Aug. 13 has been designated by Governor Ferguson as Texas Centennial Week. The week is suggested as a time for Texas to discuss plans for fitting observance of the proposed 1936 celebration of Texas independence from Mexico. Clubs meeting during the week were requested to make it a topic for their discussion. Lon A. Smith, chairman of the

state railroad commission, already foresees the time when the commission will be called upon to regulate air traffic. Detailing how oil and gas regulation was added to the original duty of the commission, then bus and truck supervision, he predicted that when aerial navigation is put under a regulatory body, the duty will be given to the same commission.

### Skeletons of Giant Lizards Are Found

WINNIPEG, Man.—The skeletons of two giant lizards which lived in the Cretaceous Sea millions of years ago have been found near Thornhill, Man., it is reported here. The discoveries were made by C. M. Sternberg, who was sent to Thornhill by the geological survey of the National Museum at Ottawa to search for the Mossasaur, marine lizards that lived in the Cretaceous Sea 60,000,000 years ago. The skeletons will be excavated and sent to the National Museum, where they will be assembled and placed on exhibition. The largest of the two skeletons is 35 feet long. The skeletons are the first complete ones found in Canada, although many specimens have been uncovered in Kansas, Sternberg said.

### Eels Ape Elephants In Leading Young

MYSTIC, Conn.—Capt. Neil Morrison's discovery that eels, like elephants, lead their young by the "tail-link" method, nearly cost him his life. He spared a mother eel and hauled her over his dory's side to find another eel clinging to the tail. Another, and still another was hauled into the boat until the craft shipped water and Morrison slipped and fell overboard. Still holding to the eel chain he climbed back into the boat, managed to break one of the "links" and steered his over-weight dory to port.

### Legislature Will Lose Professor Of Government

AUSTIN.—The Texas legislature will lose its professor of government as a member, but the place of Dr. George C. Hester, instructor of government in Southwestern University, will be taken in the House of Representatives by one of his former pupils. Wilson H. Fox, 30, Taylor attorney and present assistant criminal district attorney for Williamson county, will succeed Dr. Hester. The professor did not seek re-election. He supported his former pupil. Fox received a bachelor of arts degree at Southwestern and was graduated from the law school of the University of Texas. He will represent the floridal district made up of Williamson and Burnet counties.

### Splendid Card Offered Monday Night In Ranger

A wrestling match of unusual interest is scheduled at the Elks arena for next Monday night when Tiger Billy McEuin meets the rough and ready Jack Fields in a two-hour time limit match where holds in the jiu-jitsu art will be demonstrated. This promises to be good as both these men are fast and both go into the ring to win. Tiger Billy is a favorite in Ranger and is plenty hard to handle. The second wrestling match is between Bobby Davidson and Doc Pool. Bobby is known as "the strong boy," and is hard on his opponents, especially when they happen to take hold of his arms or legs. Ten rounds of fighting between Jumping Jodie Cason and Eddie Burke. The fans remember Jumping Jodie in last Monday night's fight when he licked Bobby Reed in the fifth round in what was scheduled for a 10-round affair.
