Secy. Henry A. Wallace has notified the farmers and the cotton trade that cotton consigned to the producers pool and eligible for sale upon approval of the department of agriculture "would not be dumped or permitted unduly to disturb the market."

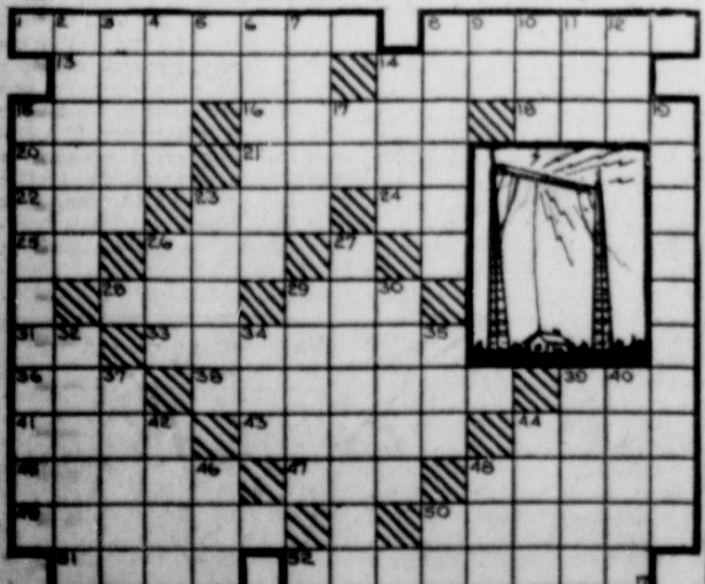

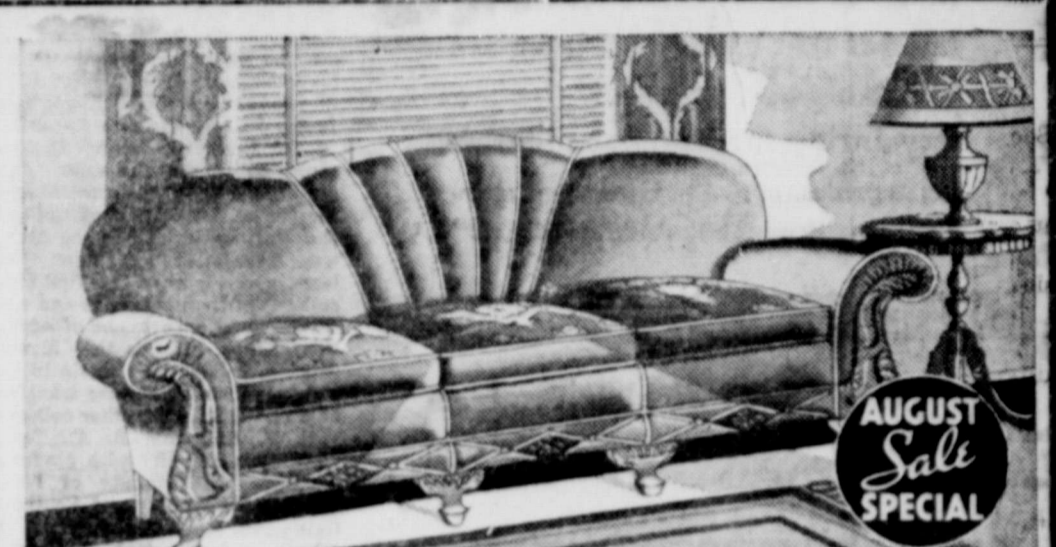

**Ranger Junior College Exceeds the Requirements of State Department of Education and College Association**

"As the faculty, so the school" may well be taken as an educational axiom; for in the final analysis the results achieved will characterize the teachers in a large measure. The state department of education and the Association of Texas Colleges as well as most other accredited agencies recognize this fact clearly in that they have set up very definite and rigid requirements regarding the faculty qualifications a college must meet before it may be recognized as a college of the first class. Ranger Junior College is more than meeting these requirements, and its faculty for the session of 1934-35 is somewhat above that of most junior colleges and also above that of the first two years in most senior colleges of the state. Ranger Junior College is a member of the Texas Association of Colleges and Universities and of the American Association of Junior Colleges, and it is rated as a first class college by these agencies and also by the state department of education. Thus, it holds the highest rating a college may attain in the state, and its credits are transferable at full value to other colleges.

By H. S. VON ROEDER  
As principal of rural and city schools together with his excellent training in the field in which he is teaching qualify him thoroughly for his position. In his last two years at the university he was holder of the Peabody Fellowship in Education and also vice president of Phi Delta Kappa, Mu Chapter, men's national honorary educational fraternity. During his last year at Texas university, Mr. Von Roeder was president of the University Educational association and he served as representative from the school of education on the men's honor council. He is a life member of both the Texas State Teachers association and of the National Educational association and a member of the Oil Belt Educational association of Phi Delta. During the past year he was vice president of the Texas Association of Junior Colleges, and he is now serving on one of the leading standing committees of this association.

R. F. Holloway, B. A., Texas Christian university with graduate work at the University of Texas and the University of Southern California, is superintendent of schools and president of Ranger Junior College. He has had an enviable record in both public school and college positions, serving in various administrative capacities and as teacher of mathematics in the University of Texas summer school and as head of the department of mathematics at both T. C. U. and John Tarleton college. Texas Christian university was founded by Mr. Holloway's father-in-law, Dr. Randolph Clark, and the latter's brother, Addison Clark, and Randolph college at Cisco was reorganized by Mr. Holloway and christened after his father-in-law.

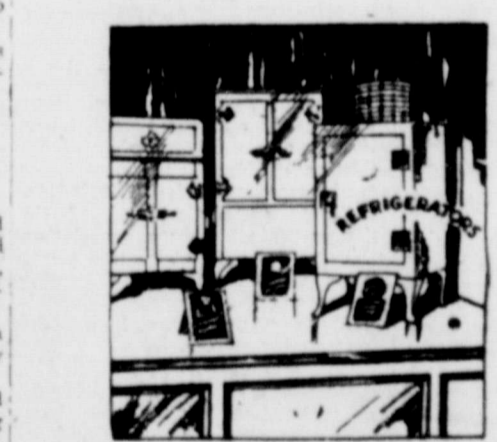
