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RAIL CHIEFS ASK FOR INCREASE IN FREIGHT RATE

Rail chiefs have petitioned the interstate commerce commission for an increase in freight rates. They base their demands for increased revenue to offset "forces growing out of the economic policies of the New Deal legislation. These forces are cited as wage increases to rail workers and rising costs of material and equipment and supplies. Proposed increases embrace almost the entire freight rate structure and range from one to 10 per cent by zones and by short and long hauls. Should the prayer of the petitioners be granted, the American public will be *forced to pay \$170,000,000 in increased freight rates during the next year.


