Prickly Pear to Be Made Into a Feed For Cattle

AUSTIN, Tex .- The wide cactus-covered expanses known to the Southwest Texas ranchmen as pear flats, may be invaded this winter by relief roll clients seeking sustenance for drouth stricken livestock.

The prickly pear, rid of its small sharp stickers, is a choice bit of vegetation upon which ranchmen have been known to fatten their herds during winter for many years.

Relief commission officials are considering a plan whereby an army of relief roll clients will go into the flats with pear burning machines, snige the stickers from the plants, and make the pears safe for consumption by the hungry herds.

Meanwhile officials are seeking thousands of acres of pasturage for cattle in acute need, most of them in the extreme western part of the state. Federal Surplus Relief corporaion has urged that up to 200,000 head of cattle be pastured but it is doubtful that sufficient acreage for that number can be found in the state, according to C. Z. Crain, head of the surplus commodities department, in charge of the cattle program.

said, "that the Relief Commission will not go into competition with the ranchmen in the matter of leasing land. If there is available sufficient pasturage at a price we know to be right, we will take it, but if owners begin to raise prices in anticipation of competition between the government and the private livestock owner also seeking pasturage, then we will get out of this program."

Many counties have been reluctant to offer pasturage bedrouth classification and fear they will lose such designation if land is leased for grazing purposes within their borders.

Crain explained that leasing for pastures will in no case have any bearing on the county's drouth

The leasing program also has been made difficult because of lack of grass in North and West Texas. Although there is some grass in South and West Texas, tick quarantine covering many counties will prevent movement of cattle into much of that area.
