JUST ONE GENERATION AWAY

By RONNIE PARKER You remember Joshua of the Old Testament. His were glorious days. He was the faithful minister of Moses, the bold and believing spy, the successor of Moses, the cap-

tain of the hosts of Israel, and the conqueror of Canaan. His influence was so great that "the people served the Lord all the days of Joshua." (Judges 2:7). But then at the age of one hundred and ten. Joshua dies "and there arose another generation which knew


not the Lord." (Judges 2:11). One generation serves the Lord . . . the next does not. How swiftly things can change. Apostacy is just one generation away. Israel allwed a crop of children to grow up without proper instruction. The order of pro-



Easter Seals aid 21,000 in 1970, chairman reports

Because of the steady growth in numbers of crippled children and adults in Texas, the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas has stepped up its rehabilitation services.

ACCORDING to Mrs. Walter Maynard, who is the Easter Seal representative for Castro County, over 21,000 handicapped Texans received Easter Seal treatments during 1970.

"Despite medical scientific advances," she explained, "the ranks of the crippled are growing. This is because of population growth, increased number of accidents and medical treatment which saves victims of crip pling diseases who might not have lived in past years."

Quotting the annual report o the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas, she said that 20 affiliated treatment centers are in operation in Texas. They include treatment and rehabilitation centers, sheltered workshops, recreation and educational programs, and many others.

"THROUGH these programs, persons with a wide variety of handicaps redeive the help they need to live normal lives," Mrs. Maynard said.

The largest group served includes those with major deformities of bonies and joints, severe speech defects, cerebral palsy. arthritis, muscular dystrophy and multiple scelerosis and stroke.

THE NEW legislation passed by Congress states that anyone refused employment, credit or insurance because of a bad credit report must automatically receive the names and address of the re-

The law also gives the consumer the right to require correction of any false information in his credit files. If the consumer disputes the information, the agency must re-investigate. The consumer also has the right to sue for damages resulting from negligence on the part of the creditreporting agency.

THE BEST safeguard a consumer can make is to be sure he has a good credit rating by making payments on time. A few late payments won't be considered a poor credit risk, but chronic late payments sometimes are reported against a consumer.
