New City Hall Bond Election Carries

Dimmitt voters went to the polls in record numbers Tuesday and passed a 100,000 city hall bond election and returned to office city commissioners Joe Benson and Glenn Ratcliff and corporation court judge John Broadstreet.

By far the most controversial was the bond election. It passed by a narrow two-vote margin, 199-197. It was a record turnout. Usually Dimmitt elections are conducted with less than 200 voters participating.

The commission met Wednesday night to canvass the votes and to give the go-head to the architect. Whenever his work is complete or nearly complete the city will call for bids from contractors for building the new city hall. Tentative date for calling for bids is June 15. There are many pre-building

details to be taken care of and city manager E. B. Noble said this week that he had no idea when work would actually get started.

Present plans call for locating the new city hall on the northwest corner of the block immediately southeast of the courthouse square (corner Southeast Second and Jones).

Most taxpayers will pay \$4 to \$7 per year more in taxes as a result of the bond election. Higher evaluations will bring corresponding increases.

With the passage of this bond election, Dimmitt is assured of having one of the finest city halls anywhere on the High Plains for a city any where near this size. It should be adequate for the city for many years to come unless a real population boom comes along.

Industrial Development May Depend on Federal Loan

"A community can obtain a loan through the Federal Government for an industrial development project so long as they meet the requirements which include putting up 20 percent of the required cost themselves," Mr. Jack Tiddie, representative of the Small Business Administration office in Lubbock told a group of Dimmitt businessmen in the Community Room of the First State Bank Monday evening.

Tiddie, here on invitation from the Castro County Chamber of Commerce, went on to say that the Federal government would loan or would participate in a loan to cities at 5 1/2 percent interest for development projects. He was referring to a situation whereby a city could obtain a site and build a factory-type building for subsequent sale or lease to a reputable manufacturer.

"This gives small towns an opportunity to bring industry and its payroll into their limited economies," Mr. Tiddie asserted.

He also touched on small business loans from the government. "We are interested in this type of loan only if all other avenues of borrowed capital have been explored," he said. "Usually this means that a small business operator will come to us when lending agencies whom he has contacted cannot lend him money for a period of up to ten years. Many men

we say a small business we mean a business which is independently operated and not dominant in its field. It must also have less than 250 employees and, generally speaking, gross \$1,000,000 or less per year. We can make loans up to \$350,000 at 5 1/2 percent interest to any one person or business," Tiddie continued.

Tiddie also listed several main reasons where his agency cannot loan money. They cannot loan if the following conditions exist:

1. If funds are otherwise available on reasonable terms from other lenders.
2. If the loan is to pay off creditors.
3. If it is to effect a change in ownership except where the owner is retiring or ill.
4. If it is for an eleemosynary institution or for charity.
5. If it is for recreation or amusement purposes, or if alcoholic beverages are sold.
6. If the loan is for a church.
7. If it is for a newspaper, magazine, or other public information media.
8. If the requested loan is to be re-loaned.

Walter Rogers' WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

The Congress will soon come to grips with an issue that bids to be more controversial this year than at any other time. It is the bill which will be designed for the purpose of carrying out the request of President Eisenhower for new obligatory authority for foreign aid in the amount of \$4.175 million. This is an increase of \$949 million over the amount provided for Fiscal 1960. The President estimated the expenditures for Fiscal Year 1961 to be \$3,450 million, an increase of \$100 million over 1960.

As most of you know, the foreign aid program has travelled under numerous aliases. Most recently, it has been called the Mutual Security Program, and the International Cooperation Administration. There are many arms to the program, having names very similar to the major title. However, under any name it is an aid program financed by the taxpayers of this country for the purpose of making grants, gifts, and loans to foreign governments. The controversial nature of such a program and the continuing criticism directed at the program through the years has caused many Members of Congress to take some long looks at what is going on. Hence, it would appear that this year the proponents of the foreign aid program will have a much tougher battle in obtaining the passage of a bill appropriating expenditures of an additional \$4.175 million of American taxpayers' money for foreign aid purposes. The long look which has been taken by some of the Congressmen has produced some startling facts,

which have not yet been fully documented. All of this will be brought out in the debate on the subject matter.

The Chairman of the Foreign Operations Subcommittee on Appropriations is Congressman Otto E. Passman of Louisiana. He has certainly done an outstanding job in the past in cutting down the requests which come to Congress for these foreign aid appropriations. He has done a magnificent job in trying to dig out much of the fat in these programs and will no doubt produce a lot of good results this year. He has just furnished me with a schedule of mutual security funds, by program and amount, available for expenditure during Fiscal Year 1960. That is, funds which are presently in the so-called foreign aid pipeline. Unexpended funds on June 30, 1959 amounted to \$4,837,708,750. New funds appropriated for Fiscal 1960 amounted to \$3,225,813,000. New funds from other sources available for Fiscal 1960 amounted to \$48 million. Therefore, the total amount available for Fiscal Year 1960, which ends on June 30, 1960, was \$8,111,521,750. Notwithstanding that this amount was available, foreign aid advocates have come back to Congress this year for \$4,175 million additional. Mr. Passman has very kindly furnished the Members of Congress with a breakdown of the funds which were available for Fiscal Year 1960 and has pointed out the vast amount of work which must be done by the Subcommittee this year in view of the request for additional funds. He especially points out that the Subcommittee is being subjected to tremendous pressure and propaganda from many quarters, especially from the 43,000 employees and 10,000 trainees of the Mutual Security Program, who are scattered in 76 nations of the world. He also points out that much pressure is coming from the White House and its prestige, the State Department and its prestige, the Defense Department and its power, and scores of large manufacturers who make big profits from the foreign aid program; also, many colleges and universities and literally hundreds of other organizations hoping to participate in this \$12 billion-plus pork barrel. He reassures the Congress, however, that the Subcommittee will continue to resist the unwarranted propaganda and pressure for excessive amounts for foreign aid and will try to provide only funds based upon actual need and not on desire. Congressman Passman and his Subcommittee are entitled to the plaudits of all American taxpayers for their tireless work in trying to protect the American tax money. They are doing a good job. In any event, you can look for some political fireworks when this bill comes up this year.
