AUSTIN, Nov. 6 .- Two amendments seeking to reduce a \$5,000,-000 state appropriation for the centennial to \$3,000,000 or \$1,-000,000 were tabled by a 19 to 9 vote in the Texas senate today.

The vote clearly indicated the senate stood for a total appropriation of \$5,000,000. The next question was the proper division of that sum between the central exposition at Dallas, and other communities planning celebrations.

Senator Tom DeBerry of Bogota offered an amendment eliminating Fort Worth from the bill, allotting \$2,500,000 to the central exposition at Dallas and an equal sum to local celebrations in various cities. His amendment did alter a proposed \$250,000 allotment to the American Legion museum on the University of Texas

NO NEW TAX LOBBY

The most numerous anti-tax lobby of recent years has massed in Austin, with only two gaps in its ranks.

The "no new levy" phalanx lacked only C. A. Jay of Dallas, foremost general exponent of state retrenchment, and spokesman of the three regional chambers of commerce boards which recently demanded a 50 per cent reduction in state ad valorem levies, future cuts in state expenses, and a constitutional limit on taxes for state pur-

But individual interests were abundantly represented: Petroleum, natural gas, sulphur, railroads, mercantile business, insurance business, gasiline and highway interests, investment and security interests.

Some of the "third house" battalion was here with respect to other matters than new tax levies, but ready to rush the fortress if taxation comes along. Some specifically were concerned with the remission of tax penalties and interests, as affecting the rights of foreclosure upon properties. Some were in Austin having official connection with other measures, including both public development programs and the Texas Centennial.

But the Centennial measure, calling for \$8,900,000 of appropriations which the state was asked to finance from source, and various proposals of house members for finding the revenue, was at the crux of the tax scare. Many of those who were defending specific lines of business or economic interests from new levies were not opposing, and some were favoring the Centennial and other proposals of

Investment interests were ready to smash any mortgage moratorium proposal that might follow that off ad valorem tax penalties.



Governors In Nine States Jeopardized

WASHINGTON. - Republican Sibernatorial tenure in eight of the nine states which kept G. O. P. governors through the 1932 Democratic whirlwind is jeopardized by the November election.

Delaware is the only state in which the present Republican administration is assured of remaining in office. The term of the Republican Governor of Delaware will not expire until January 1937.

The states now having Republican governors and where gubernaare: California, where Upton Sinclair is attempting to oust the Republican state leadership; Kansas; Nevada; New Hampshire; North Dakota, seething with the aftermath of the Langer ousting; Oregon; Pennsylvania, where Democrats are striving earnestly for the

governor's chair. Thirty-three governors are to be elected in all. Twenty-four of those states now have Democratic governors. Louis J. Brann, a Democrat, already has won re-election in Maine, Floyd B. Olson, Farmer-Laborite, is expected to be re-

elected Governor of Minnesota. The campaigns which have attracted ost attention are those in Cal' rnia, Pennsylvania, New North Dakota, Wisconsin and Ohio.
