A writer in the "Business Conditions Weekly," of New York, recently set out to collect a few of the doleful outcries which former depressions have drawn from discouraged men.

As far back as the time of St. Augustine, 1700 years ago, he finds a writer complaining that agriculture was decaying, purchasing power was dwindling, taxes were soaring, and commerce was collapsing; the conclusion drawn, of course, was that the world was going to the dogs for good.

He finds a distinguished French physician in 1832 voicing similar complaints, lamenting the tourmoil and confusion of the times-he had seen a post chaise rattling along at five miles an hour, and he said that "this madness of speed is wearing out men"-and he felt that his newlyborn son faced a life which could bring him neither prosperity nor happiness.

He finds an American editor in 1857 describing the "universal commercial prostration and panic" about him, and remarking that "it is a gloomy moment in history ... never has the future seemed so incalculable."







The mission of sauce is to enhance and supply any lacks in the pudding. It follows then, that a baked pudding with a tendency to dryness should be served with a liquid garnish. Flavorings should be added to hot sauces after they are thoroughly cooked and just before serving so that none of the taste steamed puddings.

Remember, too, that the rule for thorough cooking of starches helds good in pudding sauces. If a sauce is thickened with flour or cornstarch, it must be well cooked to make it palatable and digest-


