Dimmitt Rodeo Set for August 15-16-17

There was a time when Americans everywhere passed off high federal budgets with a shrug of the shoulders, figuring it would decrease shortly and even if it didn't, taxes were not too high.

But that was several years ago. Now we are faced with an expenditure of \$71-plus billion this year and further increases are expected to come. Things are beginning to get out of hand.

Income taxes this year are about \$38 billion and the estimate next year is \$41 billion. If you make \$5,000 a year your income tax will be about \$800 on the average. Other taxes will eat up an additional \$800 or so and leave you with about \$3,400 spendable income.

This might help explain why we sometimes think we should be a lot better off financially than before but can't see it anywhere.

There are many thoughts that can arise from the subject of our present-day taxation. One is where will it end? The thought of big government is not so bad if we knew it would stop getting bigger.

The federal budget this year provided grants in thirteen new fields—and once the government gets into a new field it never gets out. Try to recall one instance where the government stopped one program it once started, and you'll find yourself confronted with a task.

If this budget continues to increase, then what will be the end result? It is our opinion that taxation now has become too high on the national level. It has harmed the country by drawing off needed expansion capital from business.

Also scheduled next week will be two games with Olton on Tuesday beginning at 9 a.m. All-star teams will be selected from both towns from the Little and PeeWee Leagues for the games.

The tragedy of it all is that we can apparently do nothing about it. Voting will not help, nor will writing to congressmen or anything else individuals or groups can do.

Foreign aid, national defense, welfare work and administration are the costliest items in the budget. Very little of the money collected comes back to us here.

Dimmitt's annual Rodeo, which has become a tradition in this area, has been set for August 15th, 16th and 17th.

This will be the year's big activity for the Dimmitt Rodeo Association and it is expected to bring rodeo fans from many miles away.

Leading off the week ends activities will be a parade under the supervision of Jack Bradley. It will be composed of contestants, about half a dozen riding clubs, and local rodeo enthusiasts.

This will be the second year of service for the new rodeo grandstands. Considered to be one of the best in this area, the bleacher will seat about 600 people.

Concession stands will be operating during the rodeo, but no organization has yet been named. Each session of the rodeo will begin at 8 p.m. on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights, August 15, 16 and 17.

Two go-rounds in the following divisions will be held: calf roping, double mugging, bareback riding, saddle bronc riding, Brahma bull riding, and ladies barrel race. All divisions except the ladies barrel race will have \$100 prize money for the winner in each go-round plus one-half the entry fee.

Winner of the ladies barrel race will receive a \$5 jackpot plus \$20 added each go-round and a belt buckle for best average.

A saddle will be awarded for the best averages in calf roping and double mugging; and a belt buckle will be given for the best average in all riding events.

Entries will close at 12 noon Thursday. It is expected that between 50 and 60 ropers and about 40 riders will be entered in the rodeo, with 15 girls in the barrel race.

No public barbecue will be staged by the Rodeo Association this year. There will be a barbecue, but it will be for old timers who register for the old settler's reunion only. Time of this barbecue will be 12:30, Thursday, August 15.

Winning trophies and watches were for first places in their flights were Bob Lindsey, second flight; Johnny Etheridge, third flight; and Sam Gilbreath, third flight.

Presentations of the engraved trophies and 25-jewel watches were made Sunday afternoon following the end of tournament play. The golfing matches began last Thursday and the tournament included eight flights.

Field leveling helps by giving much more efficient irrigation and making it easier. Of course yields are higher where water can be applied uniformly and penetration is even from end to end.

Another kind of land leveling that is needed on large areas of our land is bench leveling. Usually, benching is done on steeper land and around lakes; however, it will pay on flat land. The California Experiment Station has shown that it takes a third less water for the same yield on borders as it does in furrows. They should be put in according to a design and watered according to a design for best results.

A great deal of time is not required on the part of the farmer in a land leveling job. The S.C.S. and the contractors will do most of the work. Anyone interested in land leveling may contact the S.C.S. for technical assistance and the A.S.C. for payment on the practice.

Coming up Friday night will be a game between the Yankees and White Sox beginning at 7:15. Immediately after that the Braves will make their bid for a tie for first place by taking on the Cardinals.

Three Men From Dimmitt Attend Firemen School

Rueben Mayfield, James Slough and John H. Wood, of Dimmitt are currently enrolled in the Texas Firemen's Training School on the campus of Texas A. and M. College. The week-long annual event will be completed July 26.

A total of 1100 students are attending the school. They represent fire departments and safety divisions of cities, industries and military camps located throughout Texas and 20 other states.

The school is sponsored by the State Firemen's Association and is conducted by the Engineering Extension Service of the Texas A. and M. College System.

In addition to the regular fire-fighting courses, special features of this year's school will include training in radiation and radiological monitoring, rescue operations, and field demonstrations of the latest methods of fire control.

Basic courses in firefighting are given for fire marshals, fire officers, fire department instructors, and military and industrial firemen.
