American Standard of Living Still Eludes Most of Us

One of the points at issue in any discussion of our return to prosperity is that famous old American standard of living.

The men and women who came to this country from Europe, in all the years since Plymouth and Jamestown were settled, came with the wistful notion that life over here could be easier and richer than it was back home. Because of that, the belief that our standard of living must be higher than anyone else's has always been one of our most cherished convictions. And in the main, averaging one period with another, that conviction has had a lot to support it.

Dr. Mordecia Ezekiel, brain-truster of the Agricultural Department, made this very clear in a recent speech at Washington. An American family that is to have a moderately full life, he estimates, must have an income of at least \$2500 a year. That is about the minimum price of a family life which measures up to our "American standard" a decently modern home, electric lights and appliances, central heating, up-to-date plumbing, an auto, and so on.

But in 1929, when everything was booming, fully 71 per cent of American families had incomes below the \$2,-500 mark, says Dr. Ezekiel.

In other words, between two-thirds and three-quarters, of us aren't able to get that American standard of living even in the most prosperous times.

It is doubtless a recognition of this fact which leads some people to insist that reform must go hand in hand with recovery. Such people are simply saying that it is not enough for us to get back to pre-depression conditions, but that we must go a long way beyond that point before we can feel that we are doing justice to ourselves.

The trick ought not to be quite as difficult as it seems to be. When you think of the marvelous productive capacity of this country, of the intelligence of its people, the energy and optimism with which the most baffling tasks are tackled, it does seem as if it should be fairly easy to find some way of introducing more than a third of us to that standard of living which we like to think of as typical of the whole country.

Nothing is more conductive to the continuous growth of a business than continuous advertising.
