GERMANY TO DEMAND AN **EQUAL ARMY**

Political Conference May Be Held At London To Promote Peace.

By United Press STRESA, Italy, April 13.— Great Britain, France and Italy have agreed to pursue a common policy for maintenance of Euro pean peace and inviolability of

treaties, it was said today. They have agreed, further, to invite Central European countries to a conference to be held in Italy, probably at Rome, to reach agreement for assurance of peace in the Danube area and guarantee the in-

tegrity of Austria. The agreement for common policy on peace and treaty fulfillment means Great Britain will approve, though it will not join, any nilitary measures France and Italy may take of whatever nature in pursuance to the common policy.

Now To Spend Relief Funds In Wise Way

It took a long time to do it, but the \$4,880,000,000 work-relief bill finally got passed; and the interesting question now is. What is all the money going to be spent

The prime purpose, of course, is to put men to work, and almost any program that accomplishes this end will be a good one. But there are ways and ways of doing it.

One way is illustrated by the CWA project of a year ago. This did give men work and it did get some needed jobs done, but there was a great deal of waste motion to it. As far as tangible accomplishments are concerned, it did not begin to be worth the money it cost.

Another way is involved in the large-scale construc- The Newfangles (Mom 'n' Pop) tion of neede dpublic works. And while a program of this kind is necessarily hard to start, because of the time taken by getting blueprints, contracts, and so on inshade, it is the sort of thing that pays for itself in more ways than

Think of the big jobs that a wait the doing in this country. We could very profitably spend hundreds of millions on flood and erosion control alone, for instance, in our great river valleys. We could spend as much more on the colossal job of replacing our urban and rural slums with houses fit for Americans to live in. We would be amply repaid for almost any sum we cared to put into reforesta-

There are dams and bridges to be built, grade crossing elimination schemes to be carried out, public recreational centers to be devised, highways to be built-a long list of things which would be well worth doing even if we had no unemployment problem at all.

Used on projects like these, the \$4,880,000,000 would have a double usefulness. It would accomplish its primary purpose of taking men off the dole, and stimulating private industry, and it would be an investment in the nation's physical plant would would pay for itself many times over in the coming years.

. We have allowed that plant to deteriorate pretty badly in the last few decades. To make it the magnificent productive instrument that nature intended, we must spend something for upkeep and repair.

The new work-relief bill gives us the opportunity of a lifetime. If the money is wisely spent, we shaol eventually




