Watch Out for The Peddler

With the advent of the peddler at hand, it is well for housewives to be on their guard. Most of these itinerant sellers offer products that are not worth the price and many of them are out to defraud the buyer.

Down at Lamberton, for example, housewives have just found that the "flower bulbs" that they bought from a peddler developed into nothing more than onions.

"Onions are flourishing in a number of homes here this spring-or did-while housewives keep an eye out for the itinerant persons who visited them a few months ago." says the news dispatch. "The housewives thought they were buying bulbs which would develop into flowers.'

The man who sold the "bulbs" is of course gone and won't be back. Therein lies one of the dangers of buying from peddlers. They are usually gone before you know what you've got, and with them has gone your money for something that often has little or no value.

The solution is, "Do not buy from the next peddler who comes along or from the others who follow.

Do not confuse the itinerant peddler with representatives of your local business people-these are home merchants and should be received as such

Vow Against Fighting Will Not End Wars

The recent effervescence of college lads in connection with the question of war and peace is one of the most saddening demonstrations of recent years.

For one thing, it is a living testimonial to the ghastly waste of the last year.

The young collegians who went out to speak and parade against war had an object lesson before their eyes. You don't need to have a college education to discover that whatever it was that we got out of our participation in the last war wasn't worth anywhere near what we put into it. With 1917 as a sample, is it any wonder that the youngsters decided that war costs more than it is worth?

But that is only part of it. All these pledges, these spirited resolutions, these high-hearted vows to have no part in any new conflict . . . what will they amount to, in sober reality, when the drums begin to beat again? Are When she had thought that fate not these young people in college deluding themselves in the old, tragic manner of ardent yout heverywhere?

For when war comes we may be assured that the conditions of 1917 will be repeated. Once we get into it, no individual's private viewpoint will be of any account.

Some of these lads will be swept off their feet by the waving flags and the brass bands, and will undergo a sudden, militant conversion. Others will be overwhelmed by the pressure of public opinion.

A handful may remember their non-participation pledge, and stick to it; and they will be carted off to some prison or other, very quietly, and no one will know the

Their fine enthusiasm for a warless world, in short, will be quite wasted; and it will be wasted because their opposition to war is taking a form which cannot succeed.

When war comes in this modern world, no man can simply say. "I will have no part in this." He will have a part in it whether he plans to or not, even if it is only the sad and hopeless part of an imprisoned conscientious ob-

War does not aris from pure human cussedness. It comes from the fact that the programs which nations follow clash in a way that makes settlement by force seem the simplest way out.

If youth is to lead us to universal peace, its cue is not to announce its unwillingness to fight, but to work for a revaluation of national aims and a new, more enlightened way of settling national disputes, which will remove war's

An anti-war program built along those lines would have some chance of success.


