JUDGE BLAINE IS SPEAKER AT EVENING MEET

An Unusually Good Program Has Been Worked Out For the Occasion. Judge James G. Blaine, assistant general counsel for the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railway, will be the principal speaker at the evening session of the Oil Belt safety conference, to be held in the new city auditorium and recreation building in Ranger. This will be the first affair held in the new building, which is not as yet completed, but on which construction has progressed far enough to permit its use by the companies sponsoring the safety conference. It is conservatively estimated that from 1,000 to 1,500 representatives of more than 50 companies operating in this section of Texas will be present at the meeting with a number present from Worth, Dallas, Eastland, Breckenridge, Thurber and other towns in the Oil Belt. The program will be begun in the afternoon with the showing of safety films at the Columbia Theatre, which has been secured for the day for this purpose. CRASH WRECKS PLANE, FLIER IS UNINJURED

A United States navy plane crashed Saturday at Eastland American Legion field when it motor stalled. The pilot, Lt. Commander H. V. Baugh, escaped uninjured. He was en route from San Diego, Calif., to Philadelphia, Pa. The accident occurred when the motor stalled while Baugh was attempting to take off from the field, one wheel of the plane hooking in a north boundary fence, causing the machine to turn over. Damage to the plane included a broken propeller, tail and wings, Baugh stated. The flier said the plane would be shipped to the navy field at San Diego for repairs, and he would continue sometime in the next few days by land. He is a guest of Dr. E. R. Townsend in Eastland until arrangements for the plane shipping are made.

PROHIBITION DISPUTE MAY HOLD SOLONS

AUSTIN, April 27.—Disputes over prohibition repeal today threatened to hold the Texas legislature in session after May 7, when its 120 days expire. Senators on the repeal conference committee asked to consider a house proposal for two elections— one on straight out repeal next August and one on establishing a state dispensary system Nov. 3, 1934. House members asked for quick decision, but offered to wait if it senators would agree to prevent adjournment on May 7. The proposition was neither accepted nor rejected. Instead the conferees adjourned until Monday afternoon. At today's meeting of the conferees a sub committee submitted rival plans for repeal, barring the "open saloon" and submission of a double barrelled plan for repeal, one with a stated dispensary system mandatory. All proposed a vote Aug. 24, 1935. All retain local option. All leave the present status of beer and light wines unchanged.

Roosevelt to Talk To Nation Today Over the Week-End

WASHINGTON, April 27.—President Roosevelt's fireside address to the nation will outline highlights of the administration program remaining before congress in addition to discussing work relief, the White House revealed today. Mr. Roosevelt will present his views on extension of the NRA social security and the utilities regulations. He also will explain how the \$4,880,000,000 plans to put the idle back to work will be operated.

Wrecking Yard In Ranger Is Robbed

Burglars broke into the John Wrecking yard Friday night and got away with a small amount of merchandise, it was reported Saturday morning by Ranger police. The amount of the loss had not been determined, but it was said that an automobile battery and a quantity of accessories had been stolen.

PWA IS OPEN TO RECEIVE APPLICATIONS

WASHINGTON, April 27.—The PWA announced today it was open to receive applications for non-federal projects under the new \$4,800,000,000 program. Administrator Ickes announced that for the first time in 13 months his organization was in a position to receive application, direct, and the coffins were low-loans only and grants only, and on the same basis as applications for allotments under the old \$3,300,000,000 program. Ickes said the terms and conditions on which the applications are received may be subject to revision when regulations are announced.

Special Message Delivered Friday At M. E. Revival

There was a large attendance at the Friday night service when Rev. Roy A. Langston, pastor-evangelist, delivered a special message to young people. The scripture used was "The Wages of Sin is Death," and a large number of young people pledged themselves to more faithful effort in the Christian life. The services will continue through next week. Tuesday night will be "Men's Night" in the revival. Several persons have already given their names for membership in the church, and they will be received next Sunday.

JUDGE ORDERS "HANDS OFF" OF BALLOT BOXES

All parties in the Eastland city election were ordered Saturday by Judge T. B. Patterson of 88th district court to refrain from any handling of the ballot boxes or recounting of votes. The order was issued when respondents in a mandamus proceeding, granted Friday at Abilene to O. E. Harvey, Ben Pryor, and J. M. Sherrill, sought to dissolve the order. Respondents were O. M. Hunt, J. F. Little, C. W. Hoffmann and H. O. Satterwhite. The injunction sought to be dissolved by Little, Hunt, Hoffman and Satterwhite, ordered that they refrain from interfering with the city commission of Eastland in its discharge of duties. The injunction was issued by Judge M. S. Long of Abilene in 42nd district court.

Ranger Boy Writes Father from Hawaii

R. B. Patterson, former desk sergeant of the Ranger police department, has received a letter from his son, W. D. Patterson, who is now in the navy, containing pictures taken in Hawaii. The scenes are ones of interest taken around the island, where the sailor is now stationed aboard the U.S.S. Sea Gull. The letter states that he is getting along nicely. He has been away from home since last May.

Man Is Sentenced In Woman's Death

SIERRA BLANCA, Tex., April 27.—Antonio Carrasco, today was under a death sentence for the killing of Mrs. Mary Smith. The bodies of Mrs. Smith and her husband, Reilly Smith, were found a year ago in the ashes of their burned home near Van Horn. The accused man claimed he killed Smith in self defense and Mrs. Smith was killed accidentally. He asserted the fire was accidental.

Negroes to Sponsor Entertainment at Ranger High School

G. R. Roberts and W. G. Glass, colored preachers of Ranger, are sponsoring an entertainment feature at the high school auditorium Tuesday and Wednesday nights, it has been announced. The feature of the evening of entertainment will be Prof. E. Williams, colored, of Lufkin, who has appeared in many of the larger cities of the state. Among the things the performer claims he will do is to take a thimble full of water and turn it into enough wine to give 1,000 people a drink, with enough for each to take home a bottle full. Everyone is invited to bring their bottle. An admission price of 15 cents for adults and 10 cents for children under 12 years of age will be charged, with white people especially invited.

LONG SCORES WALLACE AT RADICAL MEET

DES MOINES, Iowa, April 27.—Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace and Mordecai Ezekiel, AAA statistician, would have been hanged in the time of Moses for their economy of scarcity policy. Huey Long said today on his arrival to address 15,000 radical farmers. Long spoke to the farmer's holiday association annual convention at 2:30. Stepping off the train into the home town of the nation's agricultural secretary, Long directed his opening blast at Wallace. Third party talk was quieted when Long arrived sleepy-eyed and shivering in his light gaberdine suit. The damper was thrown by Father Charles Coughlin, who denied that there is a connection between his national union for social justice and the get-together of the radical element and new demagogues.

Roosevelt Urges Extension of NRA

WASHINGTON, April 27.—President Roosevelt was reported today to be insistent that the status of NRA be threshed out at the present session of congress. The move in the senate for a blanket extension of NRA with determination of a more rigidly outlined scope delayed for the time being, was understood to have met with White House disapproval.

NOTABLES OF STATE WILL ATTEND FETE

Eastland Selected As Site When Thurber Says Not Able. With many notables already having indicated their intention of attending the "Highway 89 Airline celebration" at Eastland, May 30, General Chairman Milburn McCarty Saturday was angling for other prominent officials over the state. The celebration, to mark the completion of the Weatherford to Ranger cutoff, was originally planned to be held at Thurber, but Thursday representatives of the city announced it would be unable to accommodate the expected large crowds. A committee composed of County Judge T. B. Erwin of Weatherford, D. W. Barnes of Santo and Judge B. L. Russell announced the site selection Thursday at Thurber. Harry Hines, new member of the highway commission, of Wichita Falls, and Judge W. R. Ely of Abilene, his predecessor, already have announced that they will attend. Judge Sam Russell of Stephenville is slated to make the address of welcome with response by Senator Grady Woodruff of Decatur. Assurance that the celebration is due to be one of the biggest in West Texas was seen by the fact that all towns in this section have agreed to cooperate in all ways, including financially. Estimates of the crowds to attend have ranged from 5,000 to 10,000. The celebration proper will be (Continued on page 2)

AUSTIN, April 27.—Work relief expenditures totalling \$34,642 were announced today by the relief commission, and included: Eastland county, city water well digging, erection of a school building, city and county road improvements \$4,929, to provide work for 46 men.

Reach Settlement As Judge Prepares Charge For Jurors

While Judge B. W. Patterson of 88th district court was preparing the charge for jurors in case of G. L. Berna vs. Texas Employers Insurance association of Abilene, announcement was made Friday afternoon by attorneys that an agreement had been made. The settlement was for the insurance association to pay Berna \$1,650. Case was an appeal from the industrial accident board at Austin. Plaintiff contended that, because of injuries for which he sought compensation, his "locomotion was impeded."

Cotton Association Urges a Survey of Processing Tax

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 27.—The American Cotton Manufacturers' association today urged a survey of the cotton processing tax. He made so that Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace's criticism could be eliminated. The association, composed of southern textile leaders, adopted at its annual convention, a stand on the tax and did not join the New England textile industry and seeking its abandonment. The resolution said the association enthusiastically favored President Roosevelt's guarantee of parity price for the product. The proceeds of the processing tax go to the southern farmers for curtailing the cotton acreage.

District Attorney Protests Clemency For Ray Hamilton

HUNTSVILLE, April 27.—District Attorney Max Rogers, youthful prosecutor, who obtained death sentences for Raymond Hamilton and Joe Palmer for the murder of a prison guard, today protested against interference with their executions on May 10. Rogers told the state board of pardons in a summary of evidence of the two cases he saw no reason "why the gentlemen should set aside the verdict of 24 citizens of Walker and Grimes counties and thereby imperil the lives of all Texans."

Sailor Is Reported Held In Hollywood Double Slaying

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., April 27.—N. C. McDermott, sought as a possible witness in the slaying of Paul Wharton, motion picture dress designer, was reported being held on the U. S. S. Pennsylvania, the sheriff's office said today. He said he was informed McDermott was being held at the request of civil authorities. McDermott is a sailor on the flagship. He had been absent without leave since April 23. Authorities believed McDermott attended the dinner party in Wharton's rooms where Wharton was shot to death.

GERMANY HAS ADVISED OF A SUB PROGRAM

LONDON, April 27.—Germany had advised Britain of her intention of building a fleet of submarines and it was understood today that French and British representatives would confer on this latest Reich violation of the Versailles treaty. French Minister Francois Pietri will come to London next week to attend the marriage of the daughter of Sir Bolton Monsell, first Lord of the Admiralty. But it was learned that he and Sir Bolton will exchange views on the German naval expansion plan, which aroused grave concern in the British Isles.

APPROVALS ARE ANNOUNCED BY H. E. DRISCOLL

Calls For Various Work In Many Sections of The County. Approval of 12 work relief projects to mean employment of 228 relief clients and expenditure of \$17,078.90 was announced Saturday by H. E. Driscoll, county relief administrator.

The approvals came from Austin. Many of the projects were submitted to Austin officials the first of last week. Road work was due to get the greatest of attention, according to a survey of the approval batch. One of the projects approved called for tearing down of the old Scripture Lumber company building in Eastland and erection of a school for negroes from the salvaged materials. A project to employ 12 men at a total cost of \$527.90 was approved for Ranger. Plans call for extension of two-inch water line to the T. F. Oil company addition. The following project for street work in Eastland will employ 60 men at a cost of \$4,304. Project calling for grading, ditching, surfacing with gravel of College avenue between Commerce (Continued on page 2)

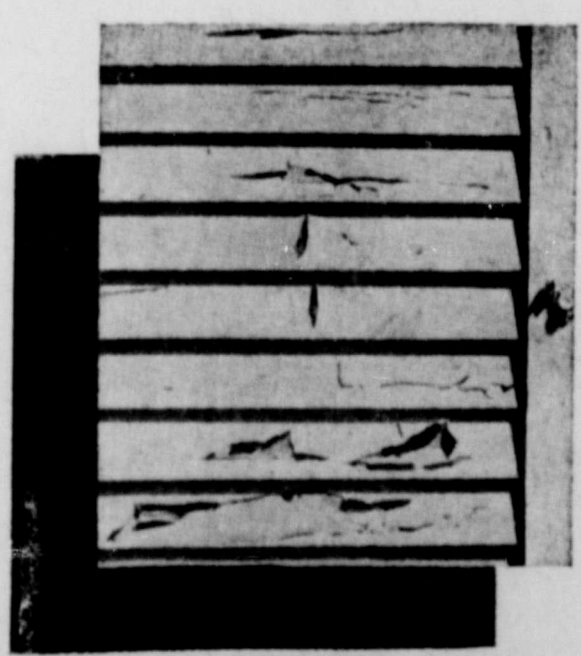

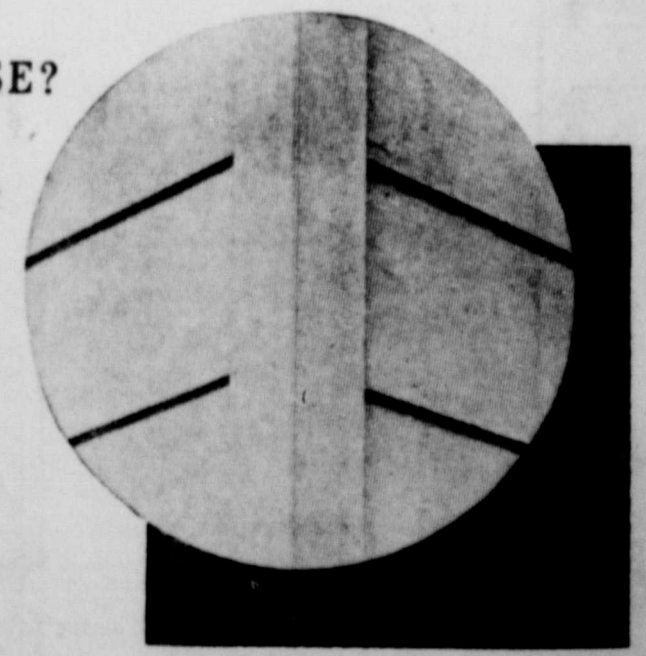
