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**Relations With Japan
Belie All War Talk**

During the last three or four years, the average American came to recognize the word Japan as a synonym for trouble.

Japan was doing this, that, or the other thing in China and Manchuria; Japan was refusing to abide by the Washington treaty; Japan was fortifying mandated islands in the Pacific; some day Japan and the United States would get together and fight it all out.

That was the burden of most public references to Japan in this country. And since cultivation of an attitude like that is a necessary prelude to war, it all had a pretty ominous sound.

But of late the keynote seems to have changed. We are beginning to hear talk about co-operation instead of talk about rivalry. Someone seems to have remembered that Japan is one of our best customers in the matter of foreign trade, and that fixing to fight your best customer is about the poorest known way of promoting a trade revival.

The recent argument over Japanese exports of textiles lends point to this matter.

Japanese textile mills have been working overtime. They have sent finished goods into such traditionally English markets as India and China. They have sent them to South America, where both British and American mills have done business; of late they have even begun to send them into the United States itself.

This has led to protests, and the protests have led to a re-examination of our trade relations with the Mikado's empire.

Now the Japanese foreign office points out that, whatever the Japanese mills may do with their finished product, they at least buy most of their raw material from American producers.

During recent years, for instance, America has sold approximately \$100,000,000 worth of raw cotton to Japan annually. These sales constitute the largest single item in America's agricultural export trade.

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In this connection it is worth remembering that Secretary of State Hull and Foreign Minister Hirota last year exchanged letters agreeing that there is no good cause for friction between the nations; and it is also noteworthy that the Japanese are anxious to conclude a new treaty with the United States working out a non-competitive basis for the foreign commerce of the two nations.

All this is worth remembering, for the simple reason that it points in the direction of peace instead of war. Our navy may feel justified in holding its maneuvers in the Pacific; these figures indicate that the danger of war is only superficial, and that underneath there are most solid and substantial reasons for keeping the two nations at peace.

Good roads mean so much to a community; they are worth every effort that is put forth to get them.

Common sense should point out to every citizen the importance and economy of buying at home.

Texas' Quota For CCC Is Doubled

AUSTIN. — Texas' quota of young men to join the Civilian Conservation Corps has been nearly doubled by an increase from 14,200 under the old program to 26,880 under a new program, it was announced by Neal Guy, enrollment supervisor for Texas.

Enrollment under the new quota will take place between June 15 and Aug. 31, Guy stated, at which time county relief administrators will receive applications from young Texans desiring to go to civilian conservation camps. Herebefore, applicants have had to be between the ages of 18 and 25, which has now been stretched to a 16-year bracket of from 18 to 28. Part of the men accepted will be sent to camps in nearby states, the rest to camps in Texas.

"Application should be made to the county administrators," Guy instructed applicants, "and not to

The Texas Relief Commission, The administrator is the selecting agent for his county's quota, and the delay entailed in making application through this office invariably lessens the applicant's chances of acceptance.

Increase of Texas' quota follows President Roosevelt's authorization to increase the national quota from 300,000 to 600,000. It will enable Texas officials to bring the old quota up to full strength and take in from 10,000 to 12,000 new men.
