Works Project Division is Ready to Function

ANNER WILL BE OPENED IN RANGER SOON

Arrangements have been completed by the Chamber of Commerce, in cooperation with the school board and the city commission, for installation of the new school building and the city commission has passed a resolution to furnish the building and the utilities, and the building is to be ready for operation within a few days, as the work is already started.

The project calls for 20 unskilled laborers to be used for 2,340 hours, at a wage of 25 cents per hour, or a total of \$5,760; five skilled laborers or sealers to be employed 1,152 man-hours for a total of 1,728 and one skilled laborer for 1,152 man-hours at a total of \$403.20. Trucking and maintenance calls for another \$100 and the supervisor, who is to be a non-relief man, is to be applied at \$12 a week for 24 weeks at a total of \$288, making a total for the project of \$8,496.

Persons or anyone who has guaranteed of any kind can take the relief canner and have it installed, with everything furnished by the canner, and receive 10 percent of the produce canned to serve, while the relief canner retains 60 percent. For men are being employed on the relief rolls to clean up the building and get everything ready for the opening of the plant, they are to start work Friday morning, it was stated.

Basic Law Necessary For Social Security

Failure of the railroad pension bill to get by the U. S. Supreme Court suggests that we shall have to revise the Constitution before we can put through any really comprehensive social security program.

As the Constitution stands, we have to go sideways when we want to embody social reforms in the national law. The railroad pension bill illustrates the process perfectly.

There is nothing in the Constitution giving the federal government any direct control over the railroads, for the very excellent reason that no one on earth had ever heard of steam railroads at the time the Constitution was written.

What the Constitution does do is give Congress power to regulate interstate commerce, and it is under that authority that all our railroad legislation has been devised.

In the pension plan, Congress tried to extend this power in a new direction.

It set up a social security program—for that is really all the pension plan was—to affect one particular group of employes and one particular industry, and put it through under the plea that such legislation was a proper part of the regulation of interstate commerce.

The supreme court didn't see it that way, and it is hardly to be wondered at. It ruled that the pension plan was not in any real sense an integral part of the regulation of interstate commerce, and not on an obscure legal point arising from a document which was drawn up before anyone imagined that social security legislation would ever seem advisable.

To do this would simply be to recognize the fact that the whole scope of government has changed since the Constitution was written.

It has to make its advances by indirect means, which means that any social program it puts through is apt to be upset by the courts.

The logical thing to do would be to amend our Constitution, giving Congress the powers it needs. Then when a social security law comes up, it could be decided strictly on its merits, and not on an obscure legal point arising from a document which was drawn up before anyone imagined that social security legislation would ever seem advisable.

To do this would simply be to recognize the fact that the whole scope of government has changed since the Constitution was written.

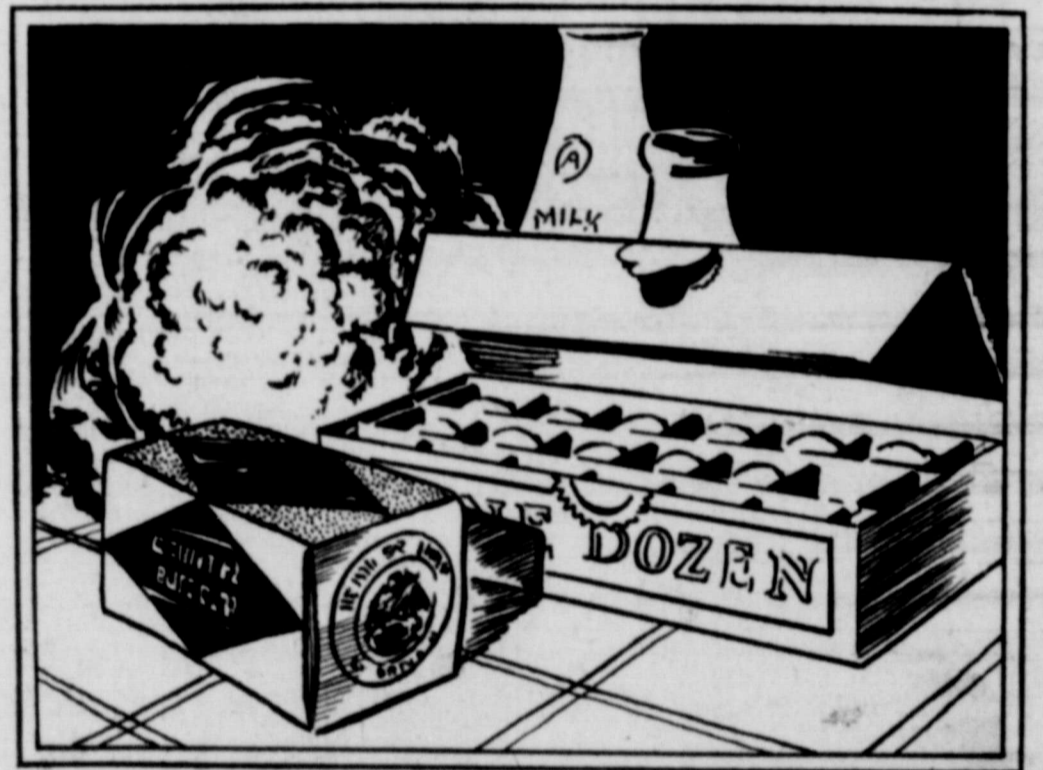

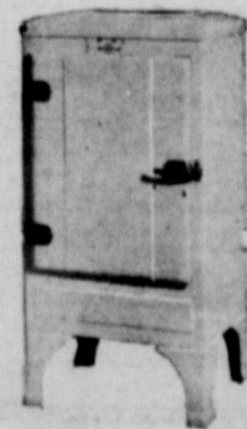

Adult Education Program Employed Many Teachers

AUSTIN. — Emergency adult education in Texas gave employment to 162 teachers during the month of April. It was revealed by statistics compiled by the rural department of Texas Relief Commission. These teachers gave vocational instruction to 29,495 persons during the month, and 8,023 visits to sustenance plots or farms to give special agricultural instruction.

"Emergency vocational education teachers working in connection with rural rehabilitation clients are employed to give instruction to subjects related directly to the problems and practices involved in the rural rehabilitation program," said C. W. Huser, superintendent of vocational training.

"Vocational education teachers fall in three distinct categories, namely: agricultural teachers, homemaking teachers, and work center teachers.

"Every vocational agriculture teachers' duties are to work on sustenance plots making surveys on what to plant, how much to plant, and to direct the planting and farming practices of our clients. They also work with the feeding of livestock care and management of poultry, hogs, and other farm animals.

"Vocational homemaking teachers' duties are working in the home giving instruction in home planning, home sanitation, home beautification, food production, preparation and preservation.

Greyhound Lines Improve Service

Additional service, effective May 16 to Abilene, El Paso and Los Angeles, and effective May 18 to Fort Worth, Dallas, Tulsa and St. Louis, was announced today by A. F. Balgus, general traffic manager for Southwestern Greyhound Lines.

This improvement in service consists of an additional schedule each way, making a total of four schedules daily to El Paso and Los Angeles; six schedules daily to Abilene and six daily to Ft. Worth and Dallas.
