Texas Safety Association

Forms were going out this week Texas industrial firms from the Texas Safety Association on which they will record accident data for the Association's Industrial Safety Contest.

E. C. McFadden of Dallas, chairman of the Safety Contest committee stated that awards will be given to the winners in the various industry groups on the basis of the least number of accidents per 1,000,000 man-hours.

"The reduction of accidents is very important and necessary to the furthering of the war effort," McFadden explained. "It is our thought that entrance into group safety contests will spur industry to greater success in the achievements of such a goal."

Industries employing 25 or more persons are divided into their appropriate divisions, and the industry in that group having the best safety record receives the Association's award.

McFadden said that "if just one life is saved as the result of this contest, then we will consider it a success."

This is the second year the contest has been held.

Mrs. Maggie Abbot, 67, was found dead in the dining room of her home in Lawn Thursday morning Oct. 14, death resulting from a heart attack.

Mrs. Abbot who operated the telephone exchange at Lawn had her living apartment in the rear of the telephone building.

Mrs. G. W. Carter, residing nearby who had assisted Mrs. Abbott with the exchange for some time, said she noticed the light in Mrs. Abbot's home and office, was burning about 2 a.m. Thursday morning the Lawn high school journalism class, led by the teacher, Scott Hickey, stopped at the telephone office as the first place on a news gathering tour of the town. Unable to enter or to find Mrs. Abbott, neighbors were called and her body was discovered.

Mrs. Abbott was a sister of T. P. Bearden, of Baird, who was in Chicago at the time. Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bearden went to Lawn immediately upon receipt of the news of Mrs. Abbott's death. The body was brought to Baird in a Wylie funeral coach.

Mr. Bearden reached home Sunday morning and the funeral was held at the Church of Christ at 4 p. m. Sunday afternoon and burial made in Ross cemetery beside the grave of her only son Bill Abbot who was drowned in the Bayou some years ago.

General Electric Employs 72,000 Women

General Electric and its affiliated companies sat present have approximately 72,000 or 38 percent women in its employ, four times the number before the war, a statement issued by the company today revealed. This number is equivalent to the total number of all employes of the company in 1939. Two of its apparatus plants have passed the 5 percent mark in female employes, one which is engaged in the manufacture of electric meters and aircraft instruments now employing 56 percent women.

Employes now total approximately 192,000, which is two and one-half times the total in 1939. At present approximately 36,000 employes are in the armed services.

WASHING MACHINES PARTS

Families whose washing machines are idle because they lack parts were offered a ray of hope last week by a representative of the War Production Baird's Office of Civilian Requirements who is traveling in Texas to learn where war-time shortages pinch civilians the hardest

With persistence, families or dealers can get parts for washers made by standard manufacturers, the WPB representative said. She was Mrs. Janet Dublin of Washington, D. C. who spoke recently before the home demonstration staff of the A. and M. College Extension Service at College Station.

Mrs. Dublin also visited in Orange, Gregg and Midland counties where she talked with rural and urban families of all income levels about the household merchandis they need most when civilian production production can be increased or resumed.

There is little hope at the present for families whose electric irons lack parts or repairs, but families whose electric refrigerators lack parts stand a pretty good chance of relief. No new family-size electric refrigerators are in sight, Mrs. Dublin said. She believes more wash tubs will be available for families now doing their own laundry for the first time. The new war-time glass wash board is proving quite satisfactory, the WPB has been informed

ome demonstration staff members told Mrs. Dublin how rural homemakers have had difficulty in obtaining boys overalls, baby clothes, seissors, safety-pins, and many other items. Asked about the prospect of getting elastic for repairing underwear, Mrs. Dublin said none could be expected before the latter part of 1944, and that would be synthetic. Homemakers might have to choose between elastic and tires, she commented jokingly.

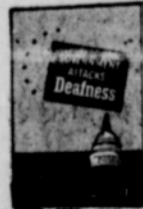
