Coming State-Wide Vote on Prohibition Repeal

Texas has 1,200,000 qualified voters. Texas has prohibition in its constitution. Texas has the drastic Dean law or enforcement act. Texas voters declared two years ago for the repeal of the 18th amendment. Texans by their ballots legalized the sale of beer. There is an election coming on constitutional amendments Aug. 24. There are two liquor control amendments on the official ballot. First, the citizen is given his choice to vote constitutional prohibition out of the sacred document which is said to be the guide of the people of Texas, the court of the state and those who are called upon to enforce the laws. Two years ago those who favored the sale of beer won an election permitting the legalized traffic or sale of 3.2 beer by a vote of 317,340 to 186,315. They voted to repeal the 18th amendment.

It is said that the bootleggers, and there are many in Texas who are rank violators of the law, are for the continuance of statewide prohibition and are willing to take their chances with the drastic Dean law as it was enacted years ago. It is said there has been a large increase in poll tax payments in recent years. In other words, there are more qualified voters this summer than there were two summers ago. Leaders of the opposing factions have figured it out that increases have been about equal in wet and dry territory and likewise they agree that the gain has been due to better times "rather than to interets in the repeal election.'

As for the never-say-die pros they are ever well organized in the rural districts. They are said to be ready for the battle in the closing week of August. It is admitted that money counts, and that it takes bundles of real stuff to perfect a thorough organization in the 254 counties of Texas. Moreover, it is said that pros and drys are not "kicking in" as in former years, and that the sellers of beer have not loosened their purse strings.

There are five or six important amendments, including pensions for all who are over 65 years of age and for the abolition of the fee system and the placing of county officials on a straight salary basis. To date a speaking campaign of importance has not been lunched by the repealers but the leaders of the dry faction are spell binding in many places and are sending their veteran campaigners out to make a searching appeal to the hearts and hands of those who are committed at all times to the continuance of the Dean law and who insist that prohibition should not be taken from its place in the organic law of the common-
