By Rev. Kenneth Carroll Christian principles remain the same regardless of denominational affiliation. Permissiveness and compromise seem to be popular in our deteriorating society, but in spite of this, many denominational leaders are taking a stand against sex, drugs and perversion which are being piped into our homes via tele-

Even though there are varying degrees of personal conviction about the flood of sex and profanity which invades our homes via the TV set. Christians and religious leaders are commencing to react against the filth which is becoming so frequent on the

TV shows. Jack M. Tuell, a United Methodist bishop in Los Angeles, recently had the following to say in his letter published in the NFD Informer: "Let me say a few words today about a very unlikely pair of people - Brooke Shields and Donald Wildmon. "Brooke Shields is the teenage actress and model

whose face appears on countless movie and TV magazines. She created something of a sensation in some jean ads and some B-grade movies, and I hold no particular brief for her. But now she is trying to prevent Playboy magazine from publishing nude photographs of her taken when she was 10 years old. I hope she wins, because Playboy is worse than hardcore pornography, because it masquerades under a veneer of respectability, and even gets quoted by sophisticated preachers at times.

"Donald Wildmon is a United Methodist minister from Tupelo, Miss., who heads a group known as the National Legion of Decency. He is fighting Playboy, too, but gets little support from many who like to consider themselves opponents of human exploitation. He has taken on network television in an effort to gramming. Networks and sponsors have used millions to try to ridicule him, but he has not allowed it to deter him in continuing his work. There are some signs that he has

made some progress. "These two persons raise some fundamental questions about our society. We have always abhorred censorship and believe in the free expression of ideas. But there is a social dimension to the kind of exploitation of humanity which goes on in the name of free expression.' When the money and resources behind such exploitation get so huge that our society is flooded with trash, a kind of decadence sets in which is fright-

"I think it is high time we let our views be know about purveyors of filth and exploiters of humanity. The volume and persuasiveness of their

output is creating a cesspool

in which we all must live.' Even though children at an early age are exposed to profanity and other types of grossness in our society at school or almost anywhere they may be, it is still inexcusable to allow it to be blatantly illustrated on televis-

It is not uncommon to both see and hear things on TV networks that should be embarrassing to any decent adult

For example, NBC ridiculed the Christian faith, made fun of Holy Communion, and mocked Christians on its Sunday Night Live program Feb.

NBC has decided to make a major mini-series based on the book "Princess Daisy." In addition to a general theme of adultery, fornication, promiscuity and sexual permissiveness, "Princess Daisy" also which are central to the plot: A 32-year-old woman seduces the son of her friends who just turned 14, or adult/child sex; sex between a brother and sister, or incest; and an affair between two women, one of

whom is married, or lesbianism/bisexuality. You might like to give your opinion concerning this special program to your local NBC affiliate as well as to RCA, the company which owns NBC. The fact that NBC/RCA decided that the book was worthy enough to make a miniseries from and bring into the homes of Americans says something about what NBC/-RCA thinks about the general

Donald E. Wildmon, chairman of Coalition for Better Television, is seeking a boycott of RCA/NBC by asking the public to refuse to watch the NBC network and refuse to buy RCA products. If the public will hurt their pocketbook, that is probably about the only way to get across to them that the Christian public does not want the trash they are piping into our homes via the TV set.

I think we should stand behind Rev. Wildmon in his stand for public decency, don't you?


Locals earn SPC degrees

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

Marshall attends judges' conference

Justice of the Peace Marshall Young of Dimmitt was among those attending the annual conference of the National Judges Association in Colorado Springs recently. States from Washington to Georgia were represented at the meeting.

Chief Judge David Enoch of the Colorado Court of Appeals gave the conference keynote address. The three-day education program featured Circuit Court Judge William Lohman of St. Louis, Judge Mar-tin Steinberg of Boulder, Colo., Professor Francis Jamison of the Denver University College of Law, and Dallas police investigator Sherri

An extended workshop was held on "The Drunk Driver," exploring sentencing standards, legal guidelines on arrests and prosecution, and rehabilitation. Douglas Lanford, Executive Director of the American Academy of Judicial Education, served as moderator.

The general concensus of the panel was that both the judicial system and state legislatures will respond to the growing outcry for stiffer penalties for drunk drivers, although numerous judges noted that legislative judiciary committees are generally dominated by defense lawyers who resist moves toward stronger penalties for their potential clients.

The conference ended with the presentation of the Mc-Eachern Award, given for outstanding achievement by a non-attorney judge nationwide. The 1982 recipient was Municipal Judge Roy Marcum of Farmington, N.M.

If approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT), the new rate would be effective July 1 and would be expected to provide additional revenues of approximately \$13.6 million annually from customers inside the

The agreement only covers the rates for service supplied within city jurisdictions. Rates outside the cities, which are regulated by the PUCT, would generate approximately an additional \$15.8 million annually at the 71 percent

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

View from the library

sent in previously printed columns for "View from the Library," (like Ann Landers) a spokesman from the library office responded, "He's written a new article every week for the past five years. There's every possibility that he hasn't figured out yet that old "View from the Library"

can be reused on occasion." When your librarian was growing up in the 1950's, C. S. Lewis was winding up a long and fruitful career as a professor, religious philosopher and popular author.

When asked if Mr. Autry After he died sometime later, other writers and critics discussed his work. Often they would ask "What kind of writer was C. S. Lewis?" Was he a children's book author, a science fiction writer, an inspirational literature author, an authority on medieval and Renaissance literature, a religious book writer? He wrote all of these.

The past year has seen a renewed interest in the work of C. S. Lewis. New editions of his children's books and his famous science fiction trilogy appeared in 1980 and 1981. they can of past works like "The Screwtape Letters" and "The Problem of Pain."

Though deep and mystic, Lewis was a fine writer. His work has been described as "rich" - that is rich in descriptions, rich in thought. He's an author that a reader has to stay awhile with. His books are hard to read rapidly and superficially.

Worthwhile reading can be found in Lewis' science fiction. Although it is science fiction like none other, the trilogy of "Out of the Silent Planet," "Pereladra" and "That Hideous Strength" is called a space story. Many readers feel it is fantasy instead of science fiction. Then again, some readers say it is a clever modern allegory with medieval echos. Some say Lewis expresses his spiritual beliefs through the triology. Whatever they are, the reader is still faced witht the question - "What kind of writer was C. S. Lewis?"

Born in a ranchhouse near Bowie, Mr. Taylor grew up in southwestern Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas, and moved to Amarillo in 1926. He worked as a truck driver for Erle P. Halliburton to pay college expenses, and later advanced to executive vicepresident and general manager of the famous oil-well service company.

In 1927 he married Imogene Herring, daughter of C. T. Herring, early-day cattleman who had established the Flagg Ranch in Castro County in 1904, after purchasing from Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Green the property that had been the 7-Up Ranch of the J. W. Carters, the county's original settlers.

Mr. Taylor learned the range cattle business from the Herring family and was made a business partner. Later he and Eddie Johnson purchased what is now the Amarillo Livestock Auction Co. and developed it into the largest such company in the world.

During the Depression, he visited personally with President Franklin Roosevelt and convinced him to authorize government purchase of millions of head of starving cattle to feed the nation's poor people. He was named a member of the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas by President Roosevelt in 1940, and later became chairman of

that board. He served as president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in 1940 and later was president of the American National Cattleman's Association. He gained the reputation throughout the Southwest as "Mr. Beef" because of his successful efforts to increase the nation's consumption of

Alongside his cattle interests, he also was a partner in Baker & Taylor Drilling Co. and was a director in at least seven national and international corporations.

He was inducted just last month into the Hall of Great Westerners by the National Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City, an honor which came just three years after he had been named the National Golden Spur Award winner for his contributions to the US beef industry.

He was still an active executive at the time of his

He is survived by his wife, Imogene; a son, Steve, of Amarillo; three daughters, Penny Rembe of Albuquerque and Sally Young and Jane O'Toole, both of Dallas; and 13 grandchildren.



Hard-water film can be removed

Spotting or cloudy appearance of dishwasher-washed glassware is often caused by a combination of hardwater and too little detergent - which can leave hard-water minerals to dry on the surface, says Linda McCormack, a family resource management special-

She suggests using any of several methods to remove the film:

-Soak glassware about 15 minutes in undiluted white vinegar.

-Wash glass in a basin of water using a generous amount of an automatic dishwasher detergent - and wear rubber gloves to protect your hands.

-Use a commercially designed product according to instructions.

-Use vinegar rinse in the dishwasher. Run a load of glassware through its normal cycle using detergent. Remove metal items from the dishwasher. Start the dishwasher again, but do not use detergent.

When the dishwasher comes to the main wash portion of its cycle, open it and pour one quart of white vinegar into the bottom. Close the door and let it complete its cycle.

On the other hand, hardwater film will gradually disappear when detergent is increased to compensate for hard-water minerals. Or you can simply use twice the recommended amount of dishwasher detergent for the initial film-removing wash to strip the film readily. To prevent hard-water film,

it may be necessary to use more detergent than the dispensing cups will hold. Add more detergent by opening the dishwasher at the time of the main wash and placing a tablespoon on the door or in the bottom of the machine, the specialist suggests. However, the best cure may

be to soften the water supply mechanically in the home so hard water is not used in the dishwasher.

[Continued from Page 1] with the weather reports, but

before they issued any warning for Castro County," he said. "The station we were watching didn't put Castro County in the severe storm area until afterward.

"It was the real McCoy," Mills commented, "but it was going the wrong durned direction - southeast.'

It was the second tornado to hit the Mills farm in two weeks, and the third one within the past three years.

"Two weeks ago Wednesday, one came right between our houses, picked up about 40 bales of hay and scattered them all over the place. It was in the daytime. Tammy closed her windows and just watched it go by."

Volunteer weather watchers equipped with CB radios reportedly spotted the tornado, and word spread quickly after it had hit. Tuesday morning, neighbors brought grain trucks and pickups to help clean up and

haul off the wreckage. Pitching in on the clean-up were Allen McLain (who owned one of the overturned cotton strippers), Cyril and Pierce Brockman, Kent Birkenfeld, Darrell and Denny Lacy, and Sam and Steve Albracht, along with the Millses' son-in-law, Ted

Robb, and the grandchildren. The storm system that spawned the tornado was one of many that roamed the Panhandle Monday night. The thunderstorm entered the county in the northwest corner and left rain and hail in a patchy pattern southeastward, generally bypassing Flagg, south Sunnyside and Hart.

Hail up to marble size caused moderate to heavy damage to crops west of Easter.

At the Clarence Behrends farm a mile inside the west county line near Easter, a heavy fall of pea-size and marble-size hail accompanied 1.8 inches of rain.

"It came straight down, and there was no wind with it, thank goodness, or it would have been a lot worse," Mrs. Behrends said. She reported that the hail destroyed their



Plant disease lab opens at Texas A&M

The Texas Plant Disease Diagnostic Laboratory at Texas A&M University is now. in full operation.

Open House.

Under the direction of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the lab is set up to handle all types of plant disease problems, from field crops to garden and landscape plants.

Larry W. Barnes, Extension Service plant pathologist, will be coordinating the functions of the new lab.

"We are pleased to have this new lab in operation to deal with a broad range of plant disease problems," said Barnes. "Each year diseases inflict heavy losses to agricultural crops in Texas as well as to garden and landscape plants. We plan to give full emphasis to plant disease detection, evaluation and control so that many of these losses can be averted.

"We feel this service will benefit Texas producers, homeowners, people in the greenhouse and nursery business, and anyone else with a plant disease problem," added Barnes.

Among major disease problems in Texas crops in past years have been root rot in cotton, powdery mildew and rust in wheat and a host of other crops, leaf spot and blight in peanuts, downy mildew and mosaic virus in grain sorghum, and blast and stem blight in rice.

"Through our network of county Extension agents in virtually every county of Texas, as well as our staff of Extension plant pathologists located at Texas A&M and at various field locations, we hope to keep close tabs on conditions that might lead to plant disease problems so that these can be detected and controlled in their early stages," noted Barnes. "Early detection and control

Plant disease specimens may be brought to the lab. which is located in Room 101 of ther Plant Sciences Building on the A&M campus, or they may be mailed to the Texas Plant Disease Diagnostic Laboratory, Room 101, Plant Sciences Building, Texas A&M University, College Station, Tex. 77843.

Information on collecting and mailing plant disease specimens is available at any county Extension office, added Barnes.



Social Security Castro County By JANICE GRANN



This week I would like to review some of the options one has when retiring. First of all, a worker who has completed the work requirement may draw social security as early as age 62. At 62, however, you will take a 20% reduction. If you wait until you are 65, your benefit will not be reduced.

Just exactly what is the work requirement? Well this varies from year to year. For instance a person born in 1917 needs 28 quarters of work credited to his record to be able to receive benefits. A person born in 1920 needs 31 quarters or seven years and nine months. You may determine the number of quarters you need by adding 11 to the year you were born. However, the maximum any person needs is 40 quarters or 10 years of work.

Once you apply for benefits you will be limited in the

amount you may earn. This year, if you are under 65, you may earn \$4440. After you make that amount, your social security benefits will be reduced \$1 for every \$2 over \$4440 you earn. If you are 65 this year, your limit is \$6000. Consequently, you can still work and draw benefits but they may be reduced if you are earning over the applicable limit.

If you come in, you will need to bring your social security card, your birth certificate and your last two W-2 forms or self-employment tax returns. However, don't delay if you don't have any of these. We will be glad to assist you
