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Neutrality Law Helps, **But Hardly Enough**

The neutrality bill passed by Congress is a step in the right direction-but only a step. If we expect too much of it, we lay ourselves open for an unpleasant surprise some i day.

Probably the best way to see how it would work in actual practice is to go back 20 years and imagine what would have happened if it had been passed in 1915.

Its chief provision is a ban on the shipment of munitions to warring countries. This would have had a very direct and marked effect in 1915 and 1916. Millions of the shell which burst along the German lines between Switzerland and the North Sea were made in America; their use had much to do with arousing German resentment to the point where unrestricted submarine warfare was declared.

So if we had had this law in 1915, our chances of getting embroiled would have ben substantially lessened. It must be remembered, also, that some of our great industrial concerns which found so many dividends and jobs in the munitions trade would have gone idle.

Next, the bill prevents American ships from carrying embargoed articles to the ports of warring nations, and forbids Americans to travel on the ships of belligerents except at their own risk. This would have saved us at least a little of the submarine warfare trouble; it might also have pulled a few of the teeth of the Lusitania tragedy, although the emotional shock of that affair would still have

The other provisions-barring the use of American ports to the submarines of belligerents which made illegal use of the American flag-would have been of minor conrequence.

It would not have kept us from selling millions upon millions of dollars worth of wheat, oil, autos, beef, copper, cotton, steel and similar commodities to the Allies, nor would it have kept American ships carrying such commodities from passing through the war zones. It would not have kept our bankers from floating billions in loans to finance those purchases.

And it was that trade, far more than the trade in munitions, which made us in effect the silent partner of the Allies, and persuaded Germany that the chance of victory by submarine warfare was worth the risk of bringing us in as an avowed combatant.

The law would have helped, undeniably. It is doubtful, however, if it would have helped quite enough. When

Congress reconvenes this winter it should give earnest thought to a possible broadening of the law, if it hopes to guarantee American neutrality.

Congress may wobble, delay and waste time in the preparation and passage of laws. It may indulge in a great deal of decidely ninth-rate oratory. It may get into silly squabbles over precedence, dignity and what-not. But it does do the country a decided service, every so often, by turning detective.

The whole country, for example, can discuss the question of American action in the event of war abroad a great deal more intelligently because of the Senate's munitions

Revelations that were made in that investigation told us much that we needed to know about things that happened behind the scenes in the last war. They gave us some profoundly important knowledge about the international combine which rolls up prifits when nations fight. They helped us to understand the subterranean forces which can make for war at a time when ordinary folk want

From the House and Senate investigation of the fight on the utilities bill we got valuable information about the war lobbyists can exert pressure on the elected representa- Barnsdall tives of the people. The grotesque antics of Mr. Hopson should not lead us to forget the more important phases of the inquiry-the discovery, for instance, of the way in Case J I which a small but wealthy coterie can launch a flood of Chrysler fake telegrams, letters, and petitions to beat down Congressional resistance and blind Congressional eyes.

A Senate committee, inquiring into the rather sickening squabble about the administration of the Virgin Islands gave a new insight into the way politics is played—and shed light, also, on our need for a new, foolproof system of government for our colonies and siland possessions.

This catalog merely hits the high spots of the inquiries Johns Manville of one session of congress. A brief review is enough to prove that investigation is one of Congress' most important jobs. The electorate must be informed about things Ohio Oil that affect its government and its economic and social life intimately. The only way it can get the information it needs is through Congress.






