Railroad Man Is Rotary Speaker at Luncheon Today

O. B. Webb, Assistant President, Texas & Pacific Railway, of New Orleans, was guest speaker at Wednesday's Rotary luncheon at Gholson hotel. Taking as his subject, "What About Our Railways?" Mr. Webb challenged the statement, sometimes heard, that the railways have not kept pace with the times, but through allegiance to obsolete methods and equipment have permitted their competitors to take from them traffic which a more aggressive and intelligent policy would have held to the rails.

"Just the opposite is true," he said. "Even the briefest study of what the railways have accomplished in the past ten years will convince any honest investigator of this."
Declaring the railways will always be the backbone of the nation's transportation system, and will be needed just as much 25 years from now as they were 25 years ago, the speaker gave illustrations and data to show what it would mean to try to handle a truck on the already congested road which a more aggressive and intelligent policy would have held to the rails.

Just one freight train in each direction in a 24-hour period. He also submitted data to show the relatively low cost to the public at which railways handle traffic.
"The average rate collected by the Texas & Pacific on all the millions of tons of freight it handled in the last year for which I have the figures was exactly one cent per ton per mile," he declared. "When you think of moving two thousand pounds of anything a mile down the road for a penny, and having to get your living out of that penny, I think you will agree with me that getting transportation down to an art."
According to the speaker it isn't the volume of traffic taken by the trucks that has hurt the railroads so. "It's the class of traffic they take," he said. "They skim off the cream—handling only those commodities which carry the remunerative rates, refusing the heavy, coarse tonnage, which yields a lower return—and in that way they help to pull down the average return to the railway, which under the law must take everything offered it."

Expressing his joy that at last the tide of passenger traffic is turning back to the rails, Mr. Webb said passenger earnings, after decreasing steadily for 15 years, are again on the up-grade. "Lower rates, infinitely greater safety, and air-conditioned trains are doing the job," he declared. In support of his claim that, next to being at home in bed, a railroad train is the safest place in the world, the speaker said the railways west of the Mississippi River handled more than seventy-seven million passengers last year, and killed only five.

"When one ponders the tragedies on the highways and in the air, that fill our newspapers and are taking place around us every day, and considers the joy of railway traveling has come to since the installation of our marvelous air-conditioned equipment, it isn't strange that the thoughtful man, planning a trip for himself or his loved ones, is again turning to the railroad," he said.

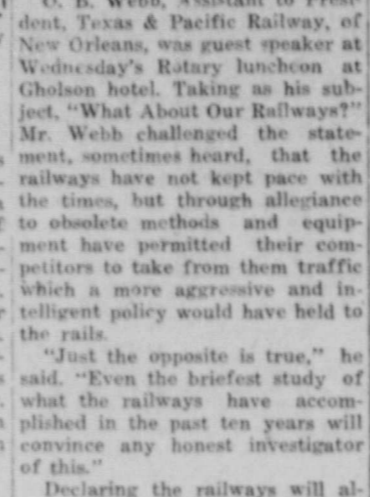

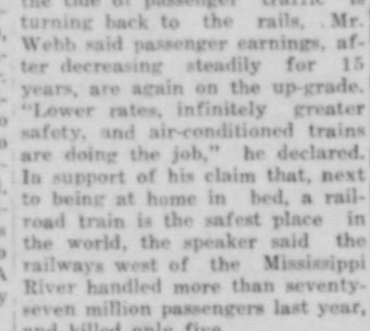

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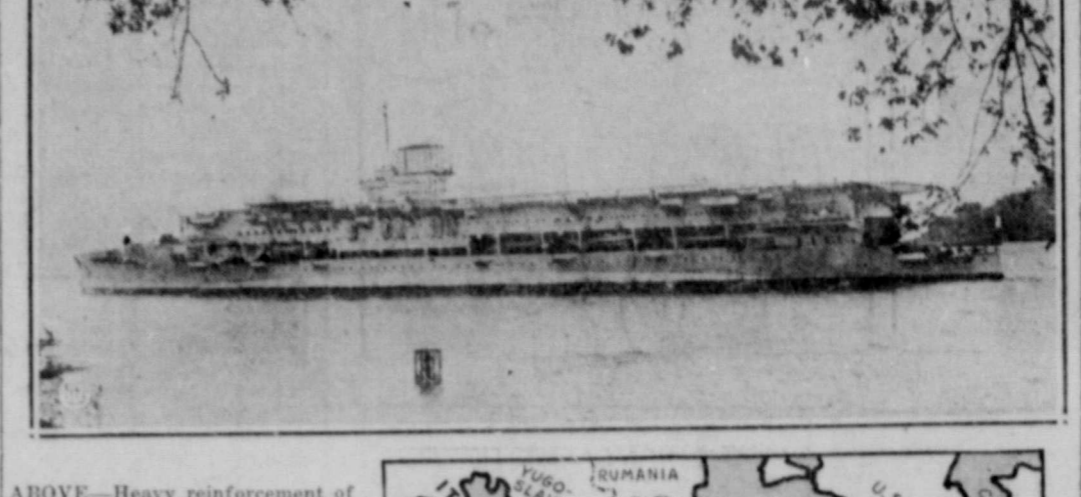
