While many homemakers have a recipe for this delicious relish, this one was given the Home Demonstration Agent by Mrs. John Crum of the Northedge Home Demonstration Club. 12 green tomatoes 12 sweet peppers 8 carrots 8 medium onions 1 medium head of cabbage Grind all together, sprinkle with 1/2 c. salt and let stand 3 hours. Put in sack and squeeze dry. Add 1/2 gallon vinegar, 4 cups sugar, 1 T. celery seed, 1 T. mustard seed. Seal at once.
