Castro County Short of Quota In 6th War Loan

As the 6th War Loan enters the second month of the drive Castro County is approximately \$47,017 short of its quota of \$120,000.00. According to a report from the First State Bank and the Dimmitt Postoffice today, Thursday, \$73,983 had been invested in War Bonds here during the Sixth War Loan which officially began November 1. Amounts sold by other postoffices in the county were not secured for publication. The Sixth War Loan will continue through the remainder of December, and it is being pointed out by Government and Army and Navy officials that huge stockpiles of war supplies, huge stockpiles of war supplies, far in excess of anticipated needs, are going to be required to finish the job of licking the remaining Axis partner and to finally liquidate the Jap war machine. Every individeal is urged to invest as much in this drive as possible, regardless of the amount that might be raised in excess of the County Quota. So long as one American by is fighting and dying on the battlefields there cannot be any slowing up in any phase of the war effort on the home front.

The pyrancantha (potted) runs from fifty cents to \$2.50, while the cy-press (balled and bagged) sells at \$1.50. Another tree suggested for this use is the flowering willow.






