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#### We Can't Join Geneva And Be Neutral, Too

It is only in circuses that you and people who can ride two horses at once. And when the horses start going in opposite directions, even the circus star has to give up-or take a serious header.

This homely and self-evident truth would not be worth mentioning here except for the fact that the American people seem to be in a fair way to attempt the stunt themselves; and before the ride really gets going, they ought to figure out, once and for all, just which horse they aim to

The last Congress passed a neutrality law banning shipment of war materials to warring nations. The idea back of this was that if we didn't have any truck with fighters, we wouldn't be nearly so likely to get drawn into the fight ourselves.

Now it just happens, from the way the cards lie, that this neutrality law of ours hits the Italians harder than it hits the Ethiopians. As a result, the United States gives every appearance these days of helping the League of Nations in its application of sanctions to Italy.

That wasn't at all what we set out to do. It may be a good idea, but it wasn't the idea that Congress had in mind when it passed the neutrality law, and the two ideas just don't mesh at all.

In the field of foreign relations, this nation can do one of two things. It can stay strictly at home, resolved to do every last thing it can think of to stay out of any foreign wars; or it can get down in the arena and do its level best to keep foreign wars from starting.

It can do one or the other of these things, but it can't possibly do both.



### Radio Bullet Is Ready to Aid Weather Man

BOSTON-A stratosphere radio bullet that is expected to revolu tionize the technique of weather-forecasting has been developed by Blue Hill Observatory attaches.

The instrument, similar to one ed at a cost low enough to be

The bullet, six inches long and gists need to know.

This device can go three or four information instantaneously, re-

The stratosphere radio bullet is olution every half minute. A fixed the top, and as it posses over a minute. Three other pointers touch the cylinder at lower points, each controlled by a different every half minute.

The thermometer-pointer is controlled by a tiny half-tube of metal, like a ministure stove pipe cut in two lengthwise. The metal is brass on the inside and steel outside. Brass expands in warmth and causes the little tube to open up, pushing the pointer an infinitesi mas distance higher in the cylin-

The pressure pointer is con-trolled by a pile of tiny disks, each rests on the one below. Heavy air causes them to settle and light air to rise, sending the points up or

The humidity pointer rests on a human hair suspended horizon-tally between two uprights. It stretches when moist and contracts when dry-thus moving the

To interpret the "click" sent in by the meteorograph, one must listen a minute to identify the constant 30-second click of the fixed cointer and then by the variations in time of the succeeding clicks, compute the data indicated by the





The modern fashion of serving vegetables with butter, instead of creamed, the light breakfast minus cereal with milk or eream and the general adult tendency to omit milk as a drink--all these factors make it necessary for the cook and home-maker to devise strategic ways for using the beverage in

Soups with milk, vegetables au gratin, creamed vegetables on toast and scalloped vegetables all lend themselves to luncheon men-us and the mild idea.

Work Milk Into Dinner

If the adults of a family are not at home for luncheon, then the dinner must be liberally diluted with milk. The canned and powdered brands will help the good work along.

Custards, junkets, cornstarch, rice and tapioca puddings will all do their share toward increasing the amount of milk in the diet.

Milk is such a cheap source of protein and calcium, as well as an economical container of phosphorus, that, we may almost consider the vitamins it also adds as thrown in for good measure. Not much iron in mflk but what there is, is potent and easily assimilated by the system.

Scalloped potoatoes use a large amount of milk, much more than do mashed ones.
