
Brother Says God Ordered Mutilation

Two cups diced rabbit, 1 cup finely shredded eabbags, 1-2 cup chopped green pepper, 1 cup diced grape fruit, 1 teaspeon salt, 2 teaspoons sugar, 6 stuffed olives, paprika, French dressing, mayonnaise.

Marinate rabbit in French

Marinate rabbit in French desairs for one hour. Drain and combine with cabbage, green pepper and grape fruit which have been sprinkled with salt and sugar. Add mayonnaise to make moist and toss lightly with a fork to mix. Arrange on a bed of curly endive and garnish with olives cut in slices.

Rabbit also makes an excellent stew. Onions, celery, carrots and petatoes combine well to make a savory dish for a cold winter evening. The rabbit is disjointed in pieces for serving and put on to cook for an hour before the onlines and celery are added.

Deep Dish Apple Pie

Fill a shallow baking dish with pared, cored and sliced apples. Sprinkle with sugar, using one cup to five medium sized apples. Rub I tablespoon four into 2 tablespoons butter and dot over apples. Sprinkle with cinnamon and cover with plain pastry. Dampen the edge of the baking dish so the pastry will stick to it and be sure to cut the usual gashes in the dough before putting it over the fruit. Press the dough closely against the rim of the dish with rolling pin and then print with the times of the fork. Bake in a hot oven (400 degrees F.) until apples are tender.







Lately, though, with the passing of the old-fashioned boarding house, bread pudding has assumed its rightful place as a good and nourishing dessert. When you serve bread pudding r dessert stress vegetables and

fruits in the remainder of the meal. For instance, try hearty soup with crisp crackers, followed by fruit salad, the whole topped off with a glorified bread pud-

Quality Pudding

Three eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup soft bread crumbs, 1 1-2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup chopped walnuts, 1 cup dates, few grains salt, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla.

Beat yolks of eggs until thick and lemon colored. Mix and sift sugar and baking powder and combine with bread crumbs Add with dates and puts to beaten volks. sugar and baking powers. Add with dates and nuts to beaten yolks and fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff. Add vanilla and spread about 3-4 inch thick in a shallow pan which has been buttered and dusted with flour. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for forty-five minutes. Cut in squares and serve with whipped cream slightly sweetened and flavored with vanilla.

Queen of Puddings

One cup soft bread crumbs, 2 cups milk, 2 eggs, 1-2 cup sugar, 1 lemon (grated rind), 1-3 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon vanilla, currant jelly 4 tablespoons powdered sugar juice 1-2 lemon. Soak crumbs in milk for half an hour. Best yolks of eggs weil with 1-2 cup sugar, add palt, specuful on each bowl of soup.


