Court of Last Resort Makes Important Ruling

Since the repeal of the 18th amendment the liquor problem is ever bobbing up. Now the supreme court has declared the government may not compel dealers in dry states to pay a special tax of \$1000 provided in the enforcement laws enacted in the reign of nation-wide prohibition. The case was a test case and came from Alabama on a stipulated set of facts. A federal district court upheld the validity of the tax and fined the Alabama dealer \$150. The fifth court of appeals set the conviction aside. It held that the tax fell with the 18th amendment because it was passed as a penalty for violators of national prohibition. The court of last resort ruled similarly in cases appealed from Oklahoma. This was regarded at Washington as a decision favorable to the dry states of the nation and was looked upon as very important to say the least to all the people the country over.

Automobiles and Lions




