

Ring in New Year for Economic Guessers

Right about now is the time when the prophet gets his rifle down from over the mantelpiece, slips it a bit of oil, and goes out to kill him a bear.

Unfortunately, the business of prophesying being somewhat uncertain, he is more likely than not to come back with a squicrel or Neighbor Jones' tomcat instead. But that never discourages him, and as each year ends he has at it again with undiminished enthusiasm.

This, in other words, is the open season for guessing about what is likely to happen during the new year. And to see how risky such guessing is you have only to look back at some of the guesses that were made about 1935.

First of all, we were assured that the slow death of NRA would plunge us into chaos. We had this on the excellent authority of General Johnson himself, with the added assurance of Donald Richberg-remember him?

So the NRA died, in the course of 1935, and chaos came not. Instead, the business community heaved a collective sigh of relief and went out to get some more orders, Mr. Richberg retired to wherever it is that ex-NRA directors retire to, and General Johnson set up a nice business as President Roosevelt's most friendly critic.

Then there were economists who predicted (a) that an expansion of bank loans would certainly follow the pumping of government money into the banks thereby stimulating business, and that (b) the new Securities Act would destroy business by making financing impossible.

Well, the government pumped and pumped all year long, and still bank loans have not risen appreciably; and this has been the best year for new financing, Securities Act or not, that has been seen in some time.

Now there may not seem to be much point in going into all these long-dead prohphecies, because most of them lie within the field of economics and that is a field where even the seventh son of a seventh son has to hang on to his rabbit's foot.



"The operating revenues," the ommission said, "have in 1935 continued above the lowest level of the depression, but there has been lacking the pronounced improvement which was necessary to absurb the increased level of wages and material cost."

It reported net railway operating income in the first eight months of 1935 at 12.9 per cent below that in the 1934 months although the operating ratio rose from 74.56 to 77.04.

In an effort to meet this situation, the commission said roads were active in extending pick-up and delivery service, replacing unprofitable trains with bus and truck transport, dominatnig bus transport lines, experimenting with lighter equipment, increasing comfort and speed of passenge traffic and seeking economie through pooling of traffic.

Fare Decision Soon

The commission revealed that a decision in its long-continu investigation of passenger fares may be expected shortly.

Without indicating the nature of the decision, the commissidid advise that southern and west ern railroads where experimental low passenger fares were adopted showed "steady and encouraging increases in both passengers carried and revenue received."

Meantime, eastern carriers where rates have been held at standard levels "are just about holding their own.'






