Maria Antonia Loredo Salazar Rosado, 19, of Dimmitt was indicted for failure to report income in applying for food stamp benefits back in July of 1991.



Bobbies, Swiftettes are headed to regional

Girls' basketball fans from Dimmitt and Nazareth will be making their way to Lubbock and Levelland this weekend to cheer on the Bobbies and Swiftettes, who will be competing in the Region 1-AAA and Region 1-A tournaments, respectively.

Both won their bi-district and area games, earning the trips to

Nazareth (23-8 overall) will take on Valley (18-10) Friday at 1:30 at South Plains College's Texan Dome in Levelland in a quarterfinal

The Bobbies (29-3) will square off against Dallas Southlake Carroll (25-4) in a Region 1-AAA semifinal game Friday night at 8:30 at Lubbock Municipal Coliseum.

Swiftettes



The No. 6-ranked Nazareth Swiftettes will be making their 19th straight appearance in the regional tournament when they take on Valley Friday in the quarterfinal round.

If the Swiftettes win Friday, they will take on either Sudan or Whiteface in a semifinal contest Saturday morning at 9:30. The regional championship match is slated for 7 p.m. Saturday.

Other teams qualifying for re-

gional are quarterfinalists Happy and Groom, and Vega, who will take on the winner of the Forsan-Rankin area game.

Of the eight teams qualifying for regional, three are ranked in the Top 10-No. 5 Sudan, Nazareth and No. 6 Happy.

The Swiftettes have played Sudan and Happy this year, losing to the Hornets once and splitting two games with Happy.

Nazareth will have to get by Valley Friday before it can look ahead to either of those teams.

Valley, District 12-A champ, is 18-10 on the season. The Lady Patriots are paced by all-state wing Katy Browning, who has demolished opposing defenses in the playoffs. In Valley's 72 - 36 bi district win over Hedley, the 5-6 senior forward scored 25 points. Then in area, she led her team to a 43-37 win over Follett, scoring a game-high 13 points.

The truck bid that was selected was for \$126,213 from Casco Industries, Inc. of Pasadena. The bid was the lowest and met all of the specifications.

The First State Bank of Dimmitt proposed two options for the handl-Approval was given for purchase ing of the county's accounts. Plan A would make the checking accounts non-interest bearing. The rate paid on interest-bearing accounts would be one-fourth of a percentage point less than a 13week average of the Treasury Bill rate as published in the Wall Street Journal.

> Plan B would treat the checking accounts as Super Now accounts, which are interest bearing at a fluctuating rate (currently 2.65%). Super Now accounts require a minimum balance of \$2,500 per account to avoid a service charge. Regular interest-bearing accounts would accrue interest at a rate of 1% below the T-bill rate.

With either plan, overdrafts would incur a charge of \$15 each plus interest on the amount of the In approving payment of the overdraft. Short-term loans would be available at the prime rate as published in the Wall Street Journal. Also, the plan could not be switched during the two-year period of the contract.

First Bank of Muleshoe offered one plan that included allowing the county to take advantage of whatever services are offered to regular customers. The county (Continued on Page 14)

Bobcats, Swifts ready for bi-district battles

The Dimmitt Bobcats and Nazareth Swifts will continue in their quest for a trip to the state tournament tonight when each plays its first playoff game of the season.

Both teams advanced to the bidistrict round after capturing their respective district championships-2-AAA and 13-A.

Dimmitt, 13-15 on the season, will take on Canyon tonight (Thursday) at 7:30 at Hereford High School in a Class AAA bidistrict showdown while the Swifts, 20-6, will meet Amherst at 7 p.m. at Olton High School for a Class A matchup.

Dimmitt Coach Ken Cleveland describes Canyon as a "big team with good shooters."

Dimmitt will be missing a key element of its game as it enters playoff action tonight—6-3 senior forward Jeromy Casey.

"Jeromy's been a key player for

us in a lot of ways," said Cleveland. "He's been a good leader and great defensive player. I just hope his absence doesn't affect the rest of the team."

Cleveland said he watched the Eagles in their District 2-AAA playoff game with Dalhart, and he said Canyon performed well.


"They were deliberate, took their time and kept the game at their pace," said Cleveland. "They've got a big 6-6 post man inside, and he's their ownly returning starter. Then they've got a 6-3 sophomore who's a good outside shooter."

Canyon finished the regular season as the runner-up from District 13-A after beating Dalhart, 47-31, in a playoff for the second seed. No. 3-ranked Perryton won the district.

Cleveland said Canyon is "comparable in size and talent" to Petersburg, which beat Dimmitt, 68-60, in a warm-up game Saturday.

Hasie talks about school finance

"You will be threatened," said Monte Hasie, who is a member of the State Board of Education (SBOE). He was addressing a town hall meeting in Dimmitt on Feb. 17, sponsored by the Castro County Republican Organization of Wom-

Hasie said the state legislature will threaten the voters with school consolidation and a state income tax if the legislature's proposal for continuing the County Education District plan is not approved by the voters in the constitutional amendment referendum planned for the May 1 elections.

"We can fund education in Texas without a tax increase," Hasie said. He pointed out that the biennial budget for the current term of the state legislature represents a \$13 billion to \$15 billion increase over the previous biennium.

"I say the state needs to cut spending enough to fund education to the level that we can have a world - class educational system," Hasie said. He said that State Commissioner of Education Skip Meno estimated that that would take \$1.8 billion.

Hasie said the legislature needs

to pass legislation that would make the CED amendment more "palatable" to the voters. He said that should include some relief for school districts in funding state mandates. He said any mandates from the state should include the necessary funding to implement them. He also said that should include past mandates, as well.

House Bill 72, which was passed in 1984, established a "Price Differential Index" which in effect said that it costs more to educate a child in a city than in a rural area. Hasie said that money was taken from rural school districts (mostly poor ones) and was given to those in big cities. This resulted in the original "Edgewood versus Kirby" lawsuit that brought the matter before the state courts.

The "Robin Hood" plan was proposed that would take funding from the rich school districts and give to the poor districts. However, Hasie said the legislature devised a different plan that would take funding from small rich districts and give it to poor districts, but would leave the big rich districts alone.

A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$45,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on Jan. 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$5,000 homestead exemption to lower their school taxes this year... and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax **exemption** on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.)

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1992, you won't need to reapply for 1993 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home—or if you've moved to a new home-you'll need to file for an exemption for 1993. And if you turned 65 or became disabled during 1992, you need to file for the additional exemptions.

When and where should I file?

Applications should be filed by April 30 at your appraisal district office. If you need more time, contact us by April 30 at:

Protect your rights! "Render" your property by March 31st. A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the

taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office... or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1992. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1993.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing or postmarking 1993 renditions is Wednesday, March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing by the March 31 deadline.

The Castro County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Committee will review and approve requests for cost-sharing on eligible conservation practices during its regular meeting on Wed-

Practices to be cost-shared include reorganizing irrigation systems, constructing sod waterways, constructing terrace systems, installing livestock pipeline, livestock storage facilities and establishing permanent grass.

Producers are asked to sign up now, not wait until the last minute. Applications received after Friday may not be considered during

this approval period. Technical determinations needed to determine eligiblity may not be able to be completed if a producer waits until the last minute to apply.

Sign-up for the 1993 farm program will begin Monday and will continue through April 30.

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The 1993 target prices are \$4 per bushel for wheat, \$2.75 per bushel for corn, \$2.61 per bushel for sorghum, 72.9 cents per pound for cotton, \$2.36 per bushel for barley and \$1.45 per bushel for oats.

Producers may plant soybeans on optional flex acres in 1993. Producers can plant designated crops on flexible acreage that does not exceed 25% of each crop acreage base enrolled in the farm program. The crops planted on flex acreages can be credited as "considered planted" to the program crop. The first 15% is called "normal flexible acreage" and the other 10% is called "optional flexible acreage."

Deficiency payments won't be made to optional flexible acreages planted to a crop other than that for which an acreage base has been established. However, producers who plant program crops of oilseeds on optional flexible acres may receive price support.

could use regular checking or Super Now accounts. The Now accounts could have unlimited activity, but would require the minimum balance of \$2,500.

Interest-bearing accounts, such as certificates of deposit, would accrue interest at a rate one-fourth of a percent below the T-bill rate. Overdrafts would be charged 18% interest or \$1 per day per account that is overdrawn. The loan rate would be the prime rate plus 2%.

In other business, the commissioners accepted the audit report from Don Ashmore of Davis, Kinard & Co., P.C. of Abilene. Ashmore said the county's accounts all looked in good shape.

The commissioners viewed a list of options for fixing First Street in Hart, and agreed to go out for bids on seal coating and repair of the

Hasie said the legislature has been criticizing local school boards and administrators, saying that they are "wasting money." But Hasie said, "That's not right. Not all local districts are perfect, but they have tightened their belts."

He pointed out how state spending has increased. He said state employees were given a raise, and the number of state employees increased by 20,000 people during the last two years. He said the Governor's Office alone has gone from 185 employees to 337.

Hasie said he thinks the CED amendment will be rejected by voters if the legislature doesn't try to make it palatable. He said if it fails, the legislature will have to come up with a plan quickly or face the closure of the schools on June 1.

"If the schools close, I predict no one would be reelected. It would be the biggest turn-over ever seen," Hasie said. He added that voters need to contact their state legislators and let them know how they feel. He said it helps for this area to be represented by State Speaker of the House Pete Laney.

"I hope Pete will lead us out of this wilderness," Hasie said.

Hasie also spoke about the recent uproar about sex education proposals for the schools. He said voters need to contact their state legislators and let them know how they

He said the 15-member SBOE had a 10 to five vote to defeat the proposed guidelines, but he added that the SBOE does not propose legislation. He said House Bill 20 does have some recommendations for sex education guidelines.

Another matter Hasie addressed was errors in proposed state textbooks. He said selection of textbooks is very politically charged, with the state spending from \$100 million to \$200 million every year on textbooks.

Campaign contributions may have made it easier to overlook textbook errors in the past, Hasie said, but due to the efforts of individuals and the media it has become an important issue. He said the extraordinary level of errors pointed out last year will be corrected, or the publishers will be

Hasie was complimentary of new education commissioner Meno. He said in the past the education commissioner's attitude had been, "It doesn't make any difference how well the children do, we want to use this program."

He said Meno's attitude has been just the opposite, "It doesn't matter what program we use as long as the students do better." Hasie said this resulted in the emphasis on Site-Based Decision Making.

About 40 people turned out to hear Hasie.




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
